



While attending Dr. G. W. Williams S.S., I always saw Co-op posters on the wall around the school and saw how much fun the Co-op students had learning in a workplace environment, which made me want to take Co-op too. But where? I knew one passion I had was towards designing luxury goods from Design Tech class, and I thought...*Hey, what about watches? Rolex had posted a video on careers in watch making, and I loved the precision of the


After my Cooperative Education experience, I have decided that I would like to pursue the accounting career path in the future.

My Co-op placement was in the finance department of the **Southlake Regional Health Centre**. On a daily basis, I would update patient accounts, create financial documents using various programs, organize data using an electronic database, and charge patients for various services performed by the hospital. collecting payments from patients. I even managed to take part in a meeting with the hospital executives where my findings were presented in order to help with decision making.

I have grown from my experiences drastically in terms of my understanding of the real working world and what it is like in my trade. Waking up early, driving myself to and from my Co-op / OYAP placement has helped me grow as an independent young man, and I now see the world in a different light. High school, in my eyes, is fantasy compared to the working world. One of my most valuable learning experiences this semester would be everything I have had to balance in one semester. Looking back at my experiences makes me realize how much I have accomplished and how real life is once you get out there. Most of my friends have not yet experienced what it is like outside of school. Because of this, I feel that I am at a big advantage, and am prepared to deal with life's future endeavours. I have had real world challenges throughout the semester, including going for more than 1 interview to find a placement and having a tough Co-op supervisor. Justin Chan, Co-op / OYAP Student, Pierre Elliott Trudeau High School OYAP Student at Home Depot, 2011-12. OYAP Student at Drain Plus Plumbing & Heating, 2012-13, and participant in the Dual Credit Accelerated OYAP Plumbing Program at Humber College, Semester 2 of 2012-13. I met with Justin when he applied for a 2-credit Co-op in Grade 10. Expressing interest in the trades, and after a variety of discussions, self assessment tests and some pathway planning, he decided to try the trades with his first placement at Home Depot in the Plumbing and Electrical Departments to get to know the products, and learn about plumbing and electrical aspects by working alongside licensed trades people. He made his decision to pursue plumbing based on the knowledge and work he did for Home Depot, and solidified that with a satisfying Rich Performance Task where he designed an underground irrigation system using computer aided design tools and identifying products and pricing. After this successful experience, he was accepted for a position with Drain Plus Plumbing & Heating while at the same time being accepted for the Dual Credit Accelerated OYAP Plumbing Program at Humber College. Being signed as an apprentice, Justin was able to accumulate credit towards his apprenticeship and was highly successful in the Humber Program. Asking Justin how he has felt about these experiences he says, "Co-op really allows you to know what you want to do in your future." His advice? "Try something out, and see if it's right for you."

Where are they now?

Kevin Cheung is an example of a youth's success story built from ambition and determination at a young age. The 23 year old started his career in Grade 11 as a Co-op student under Ms. Janet Davis' instruction at Pierre Elliott Trudeau High School. In 6 fast years, he has graduated from a sheet metal worker for Co-op at **Trent Metals Inc.**, to a licensed journeyman, and now, a business owner.

Driven to realize his goals, Kevin got accepted into the Dual Credit Accelerated OYAP Program offered through the York Region District School Board. During his Grade 12 year, he attended George Brown College to take his Part I (Basic) as a Refrigeration/Air Conditioning Systems Mechanic, along with working 400 hours at **Aire One Heating & Cooling** in Markham. Kevin graduated in 2006 as a signed apprentice, and he continued to work in the industry, returning to College for his Part II (Intermediate) and III (Advanced) and his Gas Fitters 3 and 2 licenses and wrote his final exam just 5 years after graduating from high school.

"In terms of my overall experience, the journey was definitely a bumpy ride," said Kevin. "The whole process of becoming a skilled tradesman is quite the challenge on its own. But, it has become a very positive experience nonetheless and I do not regret making this career choice."

Kevin was steadfast in his goals, and makes time to visit his high school periodically to share with other students how to pursue a career as an apprentice and the advantages of starting young and taking advantage of the programs in our high schools.

Finally independent and fully licensed, Kevin, with his company, Airwise Mechanical Ltd, is ready to take on the world at his mere 23 years of age. "If you have a dream, make it come to life," Kevin stated. "Put your heart and soul into it and prove to the world what you're capable of."
