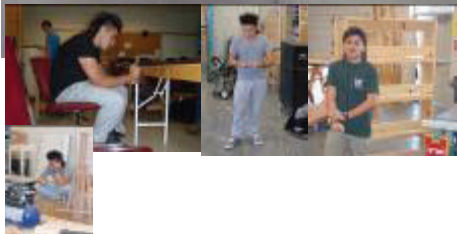

The 5 pillars that are the essentials to the program would be: Safety, Teamwork, Decision Making, Problem Solving, and Conflict Resolution.

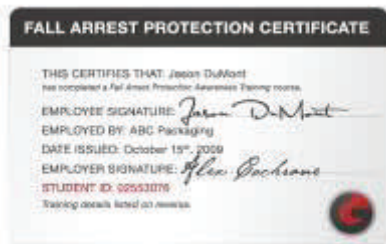

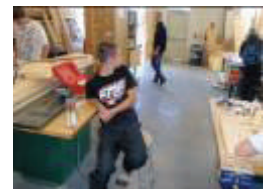
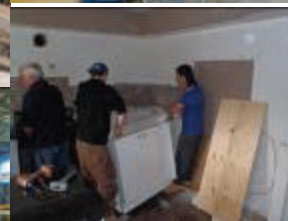
The teachers are great. You can have fun with them, and at the
