

## SCHOOL COUNCILS 2012-2013 YEAR IN REVIEW

## DATA ANALYSIS SUMMARY OF ANNUAL REPORTS

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### School Councils Report 2012-2013

#### **Executive Summary**

- A total number of 115 school councils completed the annual report. This consisted of 99 Elementary School Councils and 16 Secondary School Councils. (See Page 2 Table A for response rate from each CEC area)
- In their efforts **to support parent, family and community engagement**, a large number of School Councils in both panels noted that they kept parents and the community informed through flyers, school and council newsletters, electronic bulletins, email, and council meetings. (See Page 3 **Table 1** for other activities to support parent, family and community engagement)
- In their efforts **to support positive school climate**, a large majority of Elementary School Councils reported their involvement with technology resources and school programs. The most common activity to support positive school climate by Secondary School Councils was to support school spirit and student social events. (See Page 4 **Table 2** for other activities to support positive school climate)
- School Councils from both panels indicated that their main activity to support the diverse school community was respecting religious holidays when planning their events.
  (See Page 5 Table 3 for other activities to support the diverse school community)
- Many Elementary School Councils indicated that they had been involved in **fundraising** this past year. In contrast, only a few Secondary councils noted that they had been involved in fundraising. (See Page 5 **Table 4a** for number of school councils involved in fundraising)
- Fundraising money was most commonly used by School Councils to provide technology resources or programs to their schools. In addition, some School Councils also noted their school events were financially supported by the fundraising money.

- Many School Councils in both panels noted the need for the Board to allocate additional resources in the area of technology in their schools. The need for upgraded computer software and hardware as well as access to SmartBoards, tablets and other digital devices were the areas identified by most of the school councils.

- In the next school year, both panels would like to receive information regarding speakers, programs and resources from the Board.

#### Rationale:

To provide trustees, School Councils, principals and senior administrators with the status of School Council initiatives and a summary of the annual reports received from School Councils.

#### **Summary of School Council Annual Reports**

School Councils representing 115 schools completed the Annual Report and their responses are summarized in this review. Annual Reports from 99 Elementary School Councils and 16 Secondary School Councils were received, representing 58% of Elementary schools and 52% of Secondary schools. Overall response rate is 57%.

Table A below summarizes the number of responses received from each Community Education Center (CEC) area and the respective response rates.

The following sections summarize the information provided by School Councils in response to the questions asked in the annual report template.

### Which of the following activities was your School Council involved in this past year?

#### 1. Activities to Support Parent, Family and Community Engagement

In their efforts to support parent, family and community engagement, a large majority of School Councils noted that they were engaged in activities such as: **kept parents and community informed**, **hosted or supported workshops, presentations or social events, recruited more parents to their School Council and requested input from parents** (see Table 1 below for details).

#### **Other Information/Activities:**

Two Elementary School Councils also mentioned that they had established a school resource library for the parents to search and borrow useful information and resources from their schools. One Elementary School Council had planned to reach out the families and parents by arranging a series of three evening presentations for parents at three different community sites in the 2013-2014 school year.

#### 2. Activities to Support Positive School Climate

The most common activities to support positive school climate by both responding Elementary and Secondary School Councils were the **school spirit and student social events** and the **promotion of healthy living to students.** Furthermore, a large number of responding Elementary School Councils reported their support in **technology resources and school programs.** (see Table 2 below for details).

#### **Other information:**

One Elementary School Council also noted that the school spirit was not at its highest due to the lack of extracurricular activities during 2012-2013 school year.

#### 3. Activities to Support the Diverse School Community

School Councils from both panels indicated that their activities to support the diverse school community most commonly focused on **respecting religious holidays when planning events** (see Table 3 below for details).

One Elementary School Council has indicated that a community/family resource room was established at school last year to support their diverse school community.

## **Funding and Fundraising**

#### 4.a) Was your School Council involved in fundraising activities during this past year?

The majority (96%) of the Elementary School Councils indicated that they had been involved in fundraising this past year. Secondary councils were much less likely to indicate the same with only four (25%) noting that they had been involved in fundraising (see Table 4a below for details).

#### **4.b**) If yes, please list the activities for which the funds were used:

For this open response item, only a few Secondary School Councils provided a response so they were combined with the Elementary Councils for the summary below. Fundraising money was most commonly used by School Councils to provide **technology resources or programs** for their schools. Nearly half of responding School Councils also indicated their financial support for **school events** (see Table 4b below for details).

## 5. In which areas do you see the need for the Board to allocate additional resources? (e.g., ESL, special needs, technology, staff professional development)

Many School Councils in both panels noted the need for additional Board funding for **technology** in their schools. A need for upgraded computer software and hardware as well as access to SmartBoards, tablets and other digital devices were also identified by most school councils. Other needed areas for additional resources were **staff professional development**, **support for special needs students** and **maintenance of school and grounds** (see Table 5 below for details).

# 6. Identify below what additional support or training your council would like to receive in the next school year?

The most commonly selected category for both panels was to provide **information regarding speakers**, **programs and resources** from the Board. Some Elementary School Councils indicated that they would also like to receive additional funding for IT resources, books for libraries, tools for teachers to implement Living School initiatives and resources for Parenting Programs. Some Secondary School Councils indicated that they would like to have the opportunity and financial support to attend School Council, Board Forums, conferences and workshops on topics of interest (see Table 6 below for details).

#### Other suggestion/issue regarding additional support or training from the Board:

Several School Councils suggested that additional training is needed especially on new school council members and on building an effective team. In addition, workshops for School Council members to develop and implement community outreach strategies and to increase parental engagement are also required.

Assistance or support from the Board on some inclusivity projects to promote diversity and acceptance of special needs would also be of great help.
