



# SCHOOL COUNCILS 2013-2014 YEAR IN REVIEW

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## DATA ANALYSIS SUMMARY OF ANNUAL REPORTS

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# School Councils Report 2013-2014

## Executive Summary

A total number of 177 school councils completed the annual report. This consisted of 149 elementary school councils and 28 secondary school councils (see **Table A** for response rates from each CEC area).

- In their efforts **to support parent, family and community engagement**, a large number of school councils in both panels noted that they kept parents and the community informed through flyers, school and council newsletters, electronic bulletins, emails and council meetings (see **Table 1** for other activities to support parent, family and community engagement).
- In their efforts **to support positive school climate**, a large majority of elementary school councils reported their involvement in promoting healthy living to students. The most common activity to support positive school climate by secondary school councils was to support school spirit and student social events (see **Table 2** for other activities to support positive school climate).
- School councils from both panels indicated that their main activity **to support the diverse school community** was respecting religious holidays when planning their events (see **Table 3** for other activities to support the diverse school community).
- The majority (91%) of elementary school councils indicated that they had been involved in **fundraising** this past year. In contrast, only eight (29%) secondary school councils noted that they had been involved in fundraising (see **Table 4a** for number of school councils involved in fundraising).
- **Fundraising money** was most commonly used by school councils to provide technology resources or programs to schools and to support school events (see **Table 4b** for the list of activities where funds were used).
- Many school councils in both panels noted the need for the Board to **allocate additional resources** for technology in their schools. The need for upgraded computer software and hardware as well as access to SmartBoards, tablets, and other digital devices were the areas identified by most of the school councils. As indicated in the responses, additional resources were also needed for staff professional development and for students with special needs (see **Table 5** for other areas identified as needing additional Board resources).
- In the next school year, both panels would like to receive more information regarding speakers, programs, and resources from the Board (see **Table 6** for other areas where both panels would like to receive additional support or training from the Board).

**Purpose**

To provide trustees, school councils, principals and senior administrators with the status of school council initiatives and a summary of the annual reports received from school councils.

**Summary of School Council Annual Reports**

School councils representing 177 schools completed the Annual Report and their responses are summarized in this review. Annual reports from 149 elementary school councils and 28 secondary school councils were received, representing 87% of elementary schools and 88% of secondary schools. The overall response rate is 87%.

Table A below summarizes the number of responses received from each Community Education Center (CEC) area and the respective response rates.

The following sections summarize the information provided by school councils in response to the questions asked in the annual report template.

## Which of the following activities was your School Council involved in this past year?

### 1. Activities to Support Parent, Family and Community Engagement

In their efforts to support parent, family and community engagement, a large majority of school councils noted that they were engaged in activities such as: **keeping parents and community informed, hosting or supporting workshops, presentations and/or social events, recruiting more parents to their school council and requesting input from parents** (see Table 1 below for details).

### Other Information/Activities:

Several school councils reported that they focused on promoting parent, family and community engagement through organized seminars on mental health (for both parents and children), invited parents to participate in the parent engagement evening and YRDSB Parent Symposium, and collaborated with local businesses to support fun fairs and to request donations.

## 2. Activities to Support Positive School Climate

The most common activities to support positive school climate by both elementary and secondary school councils were the **school spirit and student social events** and the **promotion of healthy living to students**. In addition, a large number of responding elementary school councils indicated that they supported a positive school climate through **technology resources and school programs**. Furthermore, over half (57%) of secondary school councils responding indicated that they supported positive school climate through **school safety** activities (see Table 2 below for details).

### Other information:

A number of school councils also noted that activities to support a positive school climate for students, parents and staff included events like: internet safety and awareness for children, seminars on nutrition and healthy eating, toy and food drives, character building, bullying prevention and staff recognition with the Award of Excellence.

### 3. Activities to Support the Diverse School Community

School councils from both panels indicated that their activities to support the diverse school community most commonly focused on **respecting religious holidays when planning events** (see Table 3 below for details).

### Funding and Fundraising

#### 4a) Was your School Council involved in fundraising activities during this past year?

The majority (91%) of the elementary school councils indicated that they had been involved in fundraising this past year. Secondary councils were much less likely to indicate the same with only eight schools (29%) noting that they had been involved in fundraising (see Table 4a below for details).

**4b) If yes, please list the activities for which the funds were used:**

For this open response item, only a few secondary school councils provided a response so they were combined with the elementary school councils for the summary below. Fundraising money was most commonly used by school councils to purchase **technology resources or programs** for their schools. Almost half of responding school councils also indicated they used their funds to provide financial support for **school events** (see Table 4b below for details).

**5. In which areas do you see the need for the Board to allocate additional resources? (e.g., ESL, special needs, technology, staff professional development)**

Many school councils in both panels noted the need for additional Board funding for **technology** in their schools. A need for upgraded computer software and hardware as well as access to SmartBoards, iPods/iPads and other digital devices were identified by most school councils. Other areas needing additional resources were: **staff professional development, support for special needs students and support for English/French Language Learners** (See Table 5 below for details).

## Building System Capacity

**6. Identify below what additional support or training your council would like to receive in the next school year?**

The most common additional support or training selected by schools was the **provision of information regarding speakers, programs, and resources** from the Board. Some elementary school councils indicated that they would also like to receive **additional funding** for resources and programs. Some secondary school councils indicated that they would like to receive **training/information and strategies to increase the effectiveness of school councils and guidance on how to recruit new school council members** (see Table 6 below for details).

### **Other suggestions/issues regarding additional support or training from the Board**

The need for additional support or training by School councils was varied. Several school councils suggested that additional support was needed to improve communication between parents and council members. They recommended having easy online access to school council information and the ability for parents to contact the school council directly without having to first contact the school office.

School councils from smaller and/or newer schools also required additional financial support for their playground equipment. In addition, several school councils requested having clearer guidelines on what can be funded by the Board, and what the school council can fund.

Additional resources to support participation for not just some, but every student in programs and workshops to develop literacy and numeracy skills outside the classroom was also requested.
