At AMHS we continue to offer high quality programs and a large variety of academic and extra-curricular opportunities for students. These opportunities help students acquire a rich preparation for their post-secondary endeavours.

Last year, 91% of our Gr. 9 EQAO Math academic math students scored at level 3 or 4. On the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test, 90% of our first-time writers were successful, an increase of 3% from the previous year. We were excited to send the offers of acceptance to students who were successful in their application for the Preparatory International Baccalaureate Program for the 2017-2018 academic year. This is an opportunity to embark on an exciting journey with intellectually curious peers in a program that is respected and recognized throughout the world.

Our Technology Department continues to offer courses in Hospitality, Cosmetology, Construction, Design Technology, and Auto Mechanics. Our ARTS program provides opportunities in Visual Arts, Drama, Dance, and Music (Vocal, Strings, Band and Musical Theatre).

Thank you to the many staff members that provide leadership experiences for students, including involvement in the Student Activity Council, The Presidents' Council, Arts & Culture Council, Athletic Council, Music Council, Dance Council, and Drama Council. # **Business Studies Department**

Our International Business students have recently completed their research and presentation on International Trade concerning 29 different countries across the world. Student's compared their country's business competitiveness to Canada's as a way to help international investors make informed business decisions,

Our Entertainment and Fashion Marketing students, along with our Introduction to Business students, were taken on a field trip to the Eaton Centre after the Fashion Marketing Unit. Their assignment was based on shopping for a fashion item where they could get the best deal/value. They were also asked to evaluate and comment on clothing displays.

The Introduction to Business students were part of a two day workshop "It All Adds Up Free Financial Education Student Workshops" offered by Royal Bank. Session one was called "Making Cents of Savings" and session two was called "Making your spending count" These sessions were provided after our class completed in Finance Unit and it tied in well with our learning.





Students participated in the Junior Achievement Stock Market challenge. They enjoyed trading stocks within a virtual \$100,000 portfolio. They had to make decisions on what stocks to buy and sell, which stock market to trade in, keeping in mind foreign exchange impact on trades on non-Canadian tock exchanges.

On February 22, a number of our Grade 12 computer science students completed in the Waterloo Computer Competition. Students have completed their application process through the Ontario Colleges Application Service (OCAS) and Ontario University Application Centre (OUAC). Responses from individual universities and colleges will take place over the next few months.

Students in Grades 9 ~ 11 explored their future Pathways options through Career Cruising completing their IPP (Individual Pathways Plan). Students are reminded that this plan is fluid and are encouraged to revisit their plan on a regular basis to change or update their plans through Career Cruising.

Course selection process for next year has already begun and Career Cruising is now open for submission as of February 1st, 2017. On Friday, January 20<sup>th</sup>, Grades 9 to12 students attended assemblies on the course selection process and Grade 10 students in particular have been provided information about the three SHSM programs available as of Grade 11. The three sectors are Business, Health & Wellness and Transportation.

Course selection submission deadline is **Wednes**day, **February 15<sup>th</sup>**, **2017** through Career Cruising and the printed form will be due to homeroom teachers on **Friday, February 17<sup>th</sup>**, **2017**. If there are any questions regarding course selections please have your child see their Guidance Counsellor.

Students are reminded that 40 hours of community involvement is a requirement of attaining a graduation diploma. Students are encouraged to complete their hours before the start of Grade 12. Any graduating students who have not completed their hours are reminded of the importance of completing these as soon as possible. Volunteer opportunities are posted outside Guidance Services or students should speak to a counsellor for more information.

# Literacy at AMHS

#### **Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test**

The Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT) is a requirement for all students who wish to graduate with a secondary school diploma. The test is written by all grade 10 students across the province. The test will take place on Thursday March 30th, 2017. The school day on March 30th will be modified as per past practice in support of student success.

As a school, we are taking many steps to assist our students in completing the test successfully. Beginning the week of February 13th, all students writing the test will attend an information assembly where they will receive a workbook containing information, a series of tasks and skills and practice tests from EQAO. Students will bring the workbook to class where they will begin an intensive application and review of these skills through a series of lessons as well as two practice sessions before the actual test day. A copy of the scheduled lessons included in the workbook.

The workbook also contains information for both parents and students about what the test is, why students must take it and gives an overview of the types of reading and writing tasks students will encounter on the test. We encourage you to review this workbook with your child and discuss the strategies in the workbook together.

#### <u>EQAO</u>

The provincial Grade 9 math test was written in math classes on January 23<sup>rd</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup>. Preparation for the EQAO test started a week earlier and also prepared our students for the Math exams in January. Part of this test was marked and counted towards students' final mark in the Grade 9 Math Applied and Academic courses. Official results for this test will be available in September. Our results for the EQAO test written in the 2015-2016 year were great, as 91% of our academic students were at provincial standard or higher.

#### We wish success to all our students in the next semester.



This semester, students learned about the lives of students in other francophone countries. Students compared their lives with those of other students living in various French speaking regions. Within each group, students presented their understanding using technology. Students presented a filmed musical performance, an interview or dramatic presentation. This was followed by a stu-



dent-led interactive component. This was a wonderful opportunity to communicate in French as well as further develop their understanding of different cultures. Une expérience vraiment inoubliable!

Also this semester, students had the opportunity to investigate important and current pressing issues. Students did this by exploring various media works which they then presented to their peers in an interactive format.

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


# **Science Department**

The Science Department was definitely booming last semester with our Grade 9 Science and Grade 12 University Chemistry students taking a field trip to SilverCity Richmond Hill. Here, they saw the movie "Deepwater Horizon" about the BP Oil Spill of 2010. Our Grade 10 Science students got creative by making various optical devices such as periscopes and overhead projectors! And, they also created board games as their culminating activity to help review for their final exams.





Our Grade 11 Physics students conducted sound experiments including looking at echoes in musical theatres and noise pollution at various locations in Richmond Hill. Our Grade 12 Physics students learned about young Nobel Prize winners in Physics through their presentations about various scientists who contributed to the Theory of Relativity and Quantum Mechanics. And, our Grade 12 Chemistry students made fruit-smelling esters!



We also offered Grade 12 Advanced Placement Biology last semester. This was a very lab intensive course which included a variety of labs. Some examples of these labs included DNA extraction, protein purification and denaturation (breaking down proteins), identifying various macromolecules via exposing them to different reagents, simulations of bacterial

transformations, simulations of PCR and gel electrophoresis, yeast fermentation and simulations of cell transport through a semi-permeable membrane. And finally, our Grade 10 Science and Grade 11 Biology students participated in a frog and pig dissection, respectively.

Preparation for the annual academic competitions will begin later in February. Students in Physics will have an opportunity to test their skills in the University of Toronto Leonardo da Vinci and the University of Waterloo Sir Isaac Newton contests at the Grade 12 level and the Physics Teachers Association of Ontario competition at the Grade 11 level. Senior Biology students will compete in the University of Toronto National Biology contest. The chemistry challenges are offered by the University of Waterloo's Avogadro competition in Grade 11 and Chem 13 News contest in Grade 12. Please see your subject teacher if you would like to find out more about these competitions.



The York Region Science Olympics will be held in March at York University. We are looking forward to giving some fierce competition again this year! We will have 2 very enthusiastic junior and 2 senior teams who will be competing in the areas of Chemistry, Biology and Physics. Please listen to the announcements or speak to Mrs. Sadacharan if you are interested in being on the AMHS Science Olympics Team.

There are many opportunities for students to get involved in the Science Department. We have a Science Club that meets every other Tuesday after school in Room 260. Here, students have had the opportunity to do a variety of dissections, discuss designing hovercrafts and so much more! We look forward to incorporating more Chemistry and Physics related topics in the new semester with our Science Club members. Also, we have a Lab Assistants

### Technological Education = Experiential Learning

Tell me and I forget. Teach me and I may remember. Involve me and I learn. Teach me to do it and I learn best.

It has been a very busy and rewarding first semester for the staff and students in the Technological Studies Department at Alexander Mackenzie.

The Grade 11 and Grade 12 Technological Design students have been busy designing and drawing by using AUTO CAD (a Computer Aided Drafting (CAD) program) to create custom designed furniture and to prepare a full redesign of our school cafetorium to make the space more student friendly. The proposed designs included lounge areas, large screen television viewing areas, personal device charging stations and an overall more appealing setting.





The students in the Grade 11 **Construction Technology** classes have been very busy designing and building full scale wall sections that includes the pouring of a concrete footing, the floor, wall and roof framing, the installation of the plumbing and electrical systems and the interior and exterior finishing and have learned more about the high demand for the skilled trades. The Grade 10 students have improved their knowledge of the skilled trades and their ability to use machinery by designing and building a scale model of a cottage.

The **Grade 9 Exploring Technologies** classes have been very busy researching, brainstorming, designing and building projects such as a CO 2 Powered Dragster and a Robotic Arm powered by hydraulics.

We started the semester with multiple performances at the Arts Information Night in October. In November, Mackenzie Singers performed on Remembrance Day and the Grade 11/12 Arts class put on "An Evening Around the World". Later the same month "Showcase 2016" featured 250 music students performing in concert bands, choirs, orchestras, and jazz ensembles at the Richmond Hill Centre for the Performing Arts.
