### Library Learning Commons

Over the summer months the Library Learning Commons underwent a massive renovation. The library has been transformed into a modern, bright, open and flexible space for student learning and engagement. We would like to thank all students, teachers and staff who demonstrated patience and understanding as we transitioned into the new space. We are delighted with all of the positive feedback and the number of students and staff making use of the LLC.

The LLC has incorporated a variety of physical spaces designed to encourage student learning and collaboration. We are happy to announce the inclusion of a Collaboration Lab - a group study room equipped with a smart TV and whiteboards – that students can reserve for group study and research purposes. To date, students have used the space to develop podcasts, peer tutor, hold group study sessions, rehearse presentations, produce videos, hold book club discussions and deliver seminars. There are also a number of modern work areas throughout the LLC. These areas include: café tables with charging capabilities, modular furniture that allows for flexible groupings, reading nooks with lounge furniture where students can curl up with a good book, areas for quiet study and benches where students can plug in their laptops. A charging station is also available for students wishing to charge their personal devices.

### Specialist High Skills Major:

We have had a great first semester thanks to all of the wonderful Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM) events and learning opportunities hosted by our community partners, college and university field trips and workshops.

On November 1st, our Grade 11 and 12 Health and Wellness, Business, Arts & Culture students took a tour of the faculty of Nursing and Physical Fitness Facilities, the new Performing Arts Center, and a Business Case study simulation at Brock University as the first Reach-Ahead component of the year for our SHSM Program.







Students had an opportunity to monitor heart rate and oxygen levels during the course of periods of rest and exercise, and analyze how they are connected. In addition, they also had an opportunity to investigate taking these on "patients" in the simulation Nursing Laboratory. Our Business SHSM students listened to a mini lecture from an accounting professor while the Arts & Culture went to downtown St.

Catherines to visit Brock's new ultra-modern performing arts complex!

On November 7th and 8th students in the Health & Wellness SHSM program successfully received their CPR and First Aid (Level C) certification at school. Students managed to complete the training over 2 day using hands-on training and information provided by a qualified instructor. The Arts and Culture, Transportation and Business SHSM students will have their training in February.



Students across all sectors visited Sunnybrook Hospital on November 27th to take part in their Prevent Alcohol Related Trauma in Youth Program. Students got to see first-hand what could be some of the unintended conse-

quence of drug or alcohol use by talking to Hospital Staff, a Police Officer, visiting an ICU, and meeting patients who have recovered from severe brain injuries.

Lastly, this past December, students from all sectors participated in Stress

Management and Leadership workshop. Students participated in yoga and relaxation techniques as well as hearing an inspirational Leadership Training workshop!

In the second semester, we anticipate a fun filled set of learning opportunities for all of our SHSM students, ranging from certifica-

tions for CPR / First Aid, Customer Service to visiting MLSE for a Career Forum and going to Laurier for a Reach-Ahead Activity.

This semester, the Guidance Department planned and delivered a series of Lunch N' Learns to Grade 12 students. During these Lunch N' Learns, Grade 12 students discovered how to create their "ideal post-secondary selection list", learned about applying to colleges and universities and steps to writing a successful supplementary application.

Also in semester one, we were privileged to host many post-secondary institutions for an afternoon Pathways Fair. This fair was an opportunity for students to meet and interact with representatives from the various colleges and universities, as well as, attend workshops to hear individual post-secondary institutions discuss their requirements and program highlights.

In addition to the Pathways Fair, Guidance organized the annual Grade 8 Open House. Parents and students from various elementary schools toured, met with teachers and administrators and participated in activities to get them better acquainted with the school and transitioning to grade 9.

The Guidance Department also hosted two parent evening sessions. The first session informed the parent community about post-secondary options and the application process and the critical steps required to making informed decisions about post-secondary. In the second session, parents were provided with detailed informed about funding their child's post-secondary education.

Throughout this semester, the Guidance Department has been working to promote well-being through the Physical Education Department. Through carefully tailored activities and lessons, the Guidance and the Physical Education Departments have relayed important messages about mental health and well-being to the students. Student well-being continues to be an area of focus.

In addition our Course Selection process this year will take place through a new engaging and interactive online education and career/life planning platform called myBlueprint.

Choosing the right courses is very important – especially because students are prompted to think about their

Choosing the right courses is very important – especially because students are prompted to think about their career aspirations and acquire new skills and knowledge through a variety of elective courses that we offer at AMHS. Course selection may also be the time to have a discussion with your child on where they are most engaged in their learning and where they see themselves in a year from now. Guidance recognizes that choosing courses may be stressful for you and your child and is available to answer questions and help in this process. Guidance will also be running an evening presentation for all parents "Course Selection - Questions & Answers" on Monday January, 21 at 6:30 pm in the cafeteria.

As a reminder for students applying to university, application online should be completed by January 16<sup>th</sup>. This is an equal consideration date. Students applying to college should apply before February 1<sup>st</sup>.

#### **Math Department**

Our Grade 9 students have just completed their mathematics curriculum and wrote the EQAO mathematics assessment on January 16 and 17, 2019. Assessment results will be available in October, 2019.



The development of student leadership and love of learning Mathematics have always been the priorities of the Mathematics Department. As a result, students are always encouraged to take part in activities outside the classroom, such as Math Club and national Mathematics contests. Tom lagovet, Grade 11 student and Vice President of Math Club, shares the achievements of the club when he says, "Throughout the first semester of 2018-2019 school year, the Math Club has conducted various activities that have contributed to the success of AMHS's students in Mathematics competitions, as reflected in their outstanding results. We prepared ourselves for the contests by analysing questions from previous years and exploring new mathematical concepts. In fact, many junior students discovered new concepts that they did not know previously, such as binomial expansion and Pascal's Triangle, and subsequently achieved a better score in the competitions. For next semester, we will continue to enhance contest preparation in order to further advance our scores, especially the contests that are new to AHMS. I look forward to the AMC 12 contest (American Mathematics Contest) in Feb 2019."

Furthermore, students in the first semester also have the opportunity to apply their mathematics and problem solving skills through the QUEST Conference in November. Owen Li, one of the Grade 11 students participating in the QUEST Conference recalled, "On the day of QUEST, I went to Sheraton Hotel with a group of my friends. We took part in a challenge to design and present a school that is interconnected with the surrounding community. In this challenge, I had the opportunity to use some technologies that I would never had imagined,

such as the 3D printers, new HP design tablets, 3D scanners and much much more. However this wasn't the entire QUEST experience. Approximately 3 weeks before the actual event, HP brought these products to Alexander Mackenzie for the participating students to become familiar with them.

Each day after school my friends and I experimented with the technologies, in which we encountered a fair share of accidents, including a deformed 3D printed frog. However by the time when QUEST was here, we got the situation under control and were excited to put our skills to the test. On the day of QUEST, due to the practice we had with the HP technology products, we were able to integrate the 3D printed figures into building a school connected to its surrounding community. We also managed to share our ideas

and experiences with the guests at the event. All in all, QUEST was a fantastic opportunity to learn and experiment new technologies. I am so happy that I was part of it."

Last but not the least, the Mathematics Department is also preparing IB students for their IB Mathematics exams, which will take place in May 2019. This is AMHS first cohort to write the IB Mathematics SL exam. We would like to wish them all the best!

### VIVE LE FRANÇAIS!



Many of our music students really enjoyed this activity! And in our IB Physics (SL) course, students enjoyed throwing raw eggs in class! The key is to throw and catch the eggs without breaking it. To do this, they have to apply their knowledge of momentum that they learned in class. Many students were excited as they went in front of a rocket to be launched to show projectile motion! In our Grade 12 Biology classes, students conducted a variety of labs Including extracting DNA from strawberries. They also designed a lab on transport mechanisms and explored issues related to dialysis. Our Grade 11 and 12 Chemistry students were also quite busy in the lab with their titrations and calorimetry experiments. The highlight of the Chemistry course for many students was when they made fruit-smelling esters in their organic chemistry unit. In our IB Chemistry (HL) course, students conducted explosive combustion reactions of gummy bears in high oxygen environments!



Preparation for the annual academic competitions will begin later in February. Students in Physics will have an opportunity to test their skills in the University of Toronto Leonardo da Vinci and the University of Waterloo Sir Isaac Newton contests at the Grade 12 level and the Physics Teachers Association of Ontario competition at the Grade 11 level. Senior Biology students will compete in the University of Toronto National Biology contest. Chemistry contests are offered by the University of Waterloo's Avogadro competition in Grade 11 and Chem 13 News contest in Grade 12. Please see your subject teacher if you would like to find out more about these competitions.

The York Region Science Olympics will be held in May at York University. We are looking forward to giving some fierce competition again this year! We will have 2 very enthusiastic junior and 2 senior teams who will be competing in the areas of Chemistry, Biology and Physics. 
The Special Education Department has had another busy and dynamic year.

#### **Grade 9 Open Drama**

## Dance Arts Mackenzie





As we complete the first semester of the 2018-2019 school year, it is evident that the dance department has been quite busy! The students in the department have put on some outstanding performances with their own original pieces of choreography, participated in workshops with major contributors to the world of Canadian dance and continue to put dance on the map as a legitimate art form within the Alexander Mackenzie school commu-

nity. Students were challenged with both practical and theoretical assignments and consistently went above and beyond expectations.

In October, the students in all four grades represented the dance department during our annual ARTS Information Night. In November, students went on a field trip to see critically acclaimed ProArteDanza's performance of Figaro 2.0 at the Fleck Dance Theatre in the Harbourfront Centre. The junior dancers were asked to perform at the Quest International Educational Conference and presented a piece called We See You. This piece explored breaking down the stigma of mental health and how we need to open the conversations about how we are feeling so students don't need to wear a mask to school.
