
Library / Resource Centre

To do this, they have to apply their knowledge of momentum that they learned in class. Many students were excited as they went in front of a

Our Grade 12 Biology classes conducted a variety of labs including spectrophotometry labs that explored pigments used in photosynthesis. Our Grade 12 Chemistry students were also quite busy in the lab with their calorimetry experiments. The highlight of the Chemistry course for many students was when they made fruit-smelling esters in their organic chemistry unit.

Our senior Chemistry and Physics students enjoyed a wonderful excursion to Canada's Wonderland along with our SHSM students. They had a blast! We also had a motivational speaker (former Olympian) come in and speak with many of our classes in May, which was quite inspirational.

And finally, our Grade 10 Science and Grade 11 Biology students participated in a frog and pig dissection, respectively.

We were excited to have our first HOSA Club at AMHS this year! Each year HOSA (Health Occupations Students of America) Canada organizes Canada's largest health science competition, featuring over forty competitive events. Some events are focused on developing profession-specific technical skills while others on important soft skills like teamwork, leadership and communication. For the 2018 Spring Conference, HOSA Canada had a turnout of 3,000 students over two days at the Metro Toronto Convention Centre on March 27-28th. Kai De Xie and Emma Wilson both competed in Medical Terminology which only had one round. Rose and Henry made it to the second and final round of CPR/ First Aid. Olivia Huang and Lucy Yang competed in the first round of Forensic Medicine, and Owen Li and Shelley Xue

went to the second round of Forensic Medicine. The HOSA Spring Leadership Conference (SLC) was the HOSA competition for all of Canada, with schools from Quebec and other provinces.

On Saturday, April 7, 2018, 190 students from 50 schools from around York Region participated in the York Region Science and Technology Fair. In supporting mental health, the grade 9 class also worked on improving overall mental health initiatives in the classroom through their weekly Wednesday Wellness activities which included activities such as yoga, origami, meditation, and walks to Mill Pond.

Our Grade 10 Learning Strategies students worked hard in preparation for the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test. They learned about stress management and identified various stress management strategies that they could use to help reduce stress. They also explored the concept of success and looked at various post-secondary pathways and careers. Lastly, they learned many strategies on how to prepare for their final exams.

Our Grade 11 Learning Strategies classes received support on a variety of workplace skills required by employers including writing resumes and cover letters. They received help and guidance regarding their post-secondary destination requirements and choices for their course options. A large portion of the course was exploring budgeting towards independence where they had a chance to look at a variety of expenditures such as accommodation, transportation and miscellaneous essential expenses that arise with independence. 
Transportation Technology students have been very busy once again servicing and repairing students' and teachers cars all semester and learning more about the skill set needed to be successful in this trade.
