4. Administration Report (Otilia Olteanu)

- IB Exams first exams for IB since school started the program. These took place last weekend (May 18th/19th)
 - i. Students were very positive about Math component
- AMHS doing well in Math contests (Euclid) and improving in EQAO results
 - i. Grade 12 ranked 28 out of 1200 schools across Canada
 - ii. Grade 11 ranked 22 out of 537 schools
 - iii. Grade 10 ranked 26 out of 520 schools
 - iv. Celebration is planned where certificates and medals will be given out in the gym
 - v. Transition from Grade 8 to Grade 9 requires a lot of support school has developed partnership with 16th Avenue PS where HS teachers can see what is being taught to help plan for Grade 9.
 - vi. Survey was created and promoted for students around Math- 147 students participated and results are currently being analyzed.
- Grade 9 EQAO dates
 - i. June 12 & 13
 - ii. A portion of the test will count towards the final math mark
 - iii. Teachers mark part of EQAO
 - iv. AMHS is above board average for Academic and Applied still would like to see improvement for applied.

Special Education

Celebrations in May:

<u>The Best Buddies Prom</u> took place on May 1 @the Le Park Dining & Banquet. 20 students from Alexander Mackenzie and 7 staff members were in attendance.

<u>The YES I Can! Awards Ceremony</u> took place on May 15, 2019 @Richmond Green S.S. Four students from our Community Classes received the 2019 YES I Can! Awards.

Equity Assembly:

On May 30th, Period 1 will be extended to accommodate a presentation delivered by the The Friends of Simon Wiesenthal Centre for Holocaust Education. The presentation is about cyber bullying, the rise of hate movements online, and the need for critical consuming while using digital media.

Mathematics Collaborative Project:

The Special Education Department is currently working together with Alexander Mackenzie and Richmond Hill Mathematics Departments on a Growth Mindset Project. The aim of this project is to empower students and teachers by sharing innovative teaching approaches and engagement techniques that will positively influence students' mindsets about Mathematics, and support their academic achievement in Mathematics courses.

SHSM (Specialist High School Major)

1. Our SHSM Health & Wellness students in grade 11 and 10 visited Sunrise Senior Living in Aurora to partake in an Innovation, Creativity and Entrepreneurship problem solving activity on May 16th. Students toured the home and got to meet many of the seniors to understand how they interact with each other, and the staff, on a daily basis. Topics discussed were recreational activities, diet and nutrition, health and safety for seniors and the overall dining experience for seniors. Students were tasked to find ways to improve the dining experience for the seniors at the home. Students came up, for example, with a having a "Cultural Day" once a day to highlight the food choices and typical menu options of that particular culture. Students enjoyed the day spent at Sunrise Senior Living very much, with many students exploring volunteer opportunities at the home in the future, and/or exploring a rewarding career in Recreational Therapy in the future. We hope to have more of these types of events in the future!

2. On May 8th, students from Business, Health & Wellness, and Arts & Culture SHSM students took a Reach-Ahead trip to Laurier University. There they visited the Facilities connected Health, Music and Business and also explored the many unique aspects that Laurier University offers in each of the these three program areas.
