### 3. Administration Report (Otilia Olteanu)

- Student engagement survey had over 90% completion from students
- Exam week January 24 January 29<sup>th</sup>. Results out January 31<sup>st</sup>
- New semester starts February 4<sup>th</sup>
- Parent's night Thursday, April 4<sup>th</sup>
- School has a new budget coordinator looking at the budget and think it will be a good idea to have a fund raising plan to communicate to parents what we are raising money for
- Activity fee, which is supposed to be collected from all parents before start of school year is not always paid (521 out of 1250 students have currently pay).
- Lots of parameters around whether the school can ask for this money directly from parents, as board indicates that this is not mandatory
- School does reach out to parents and follow up on non-payments
- Activity fee goes towards certain councils and clubs.
- Suggestion made to show in the newsletter where the money is being spent as an incentive for parents to contribute

Congratulations to our students who have been hired for part time employment at Freshco through our work experience program/accepted to PEAK for the Fall. We are all very proud of their great success!


Special Education is in the process of designing a new mental health space in room 148. This is in collaboration with staff and students.



# SCHOOL CLIMATE SURVEY / EQUITY SCAN

- YRDSB engaged in a survey with the student population to gather data on school climate
- The data was used by our Equity Team to gain a further understanding on how included the students feel in the school community
- Staff participated in an Equity Scan to examine their current practices around inclusion

# **EQUITY COMMITTEE**

- Equity Committee meets once a month to discuss and bring forth equity issues within the school community
- Equity Committee consists of 12 members departments are well represented
- Equity Committee has set up a twitter account where we share information on equity issues @AmhsEquity
- Resources on equity are shared with staff on Moodle
- Staff is advised weekly on upcoming equity awareness days
- Equity committee secured an equity grant from the board and brought in Michael Bowe, Supervisor, Diversity and Outreach at York Region Children's Aid Society, as a notable speaker on equity issues

# **EQUITY COMMITTEE continued..**



- Staff learning around ways to connect curriculum content to student voice
- Staff examined various case profiles around equity issues to continue learning ways to best meet the needs of our learners
- Leadership team engaged in learning on Ethical Leadership and part of this involved providing strategies to further support student voice in the classroom

# FNMI - FIRST NATIONS, METIS, INUIT

- Teachers have been engaging in Cultural Competency learning on FNMI culture
- FNMI is a board focus and teachers are beginning to embed their learning into lesson planning
- Cultural Festival took place on Friday, January 11th at lunch on FNMI culture
- February PA Day, students will have the opportunity to present to staff on FNMI

# **EQUITY SYMPOSIUM**

- The school was represented at the board's annual Equity Symposium in May 2018
- A resource was presented to teachers and will be published at the board level
- The resource contains valuable lessons for educators to use to embed in the classrooms on key topics such as racism, classism, ableism etc.

# STUDENT SURVEYS

- Students conducted surveys to learn from parents, students and staff at AMHS on various equity topics
- Students surveyed a few other schools to determine trends and key areas of interest
- This information was presented in the classroom but equally to the school and to board community

# **LUNCH N' LEARN and DEBATE CLUB on EQUITY TOPICS**

- One group of students analyzed data and presented challenges and solutions to equity issues based on the data collected in the surveys
- Students developed a Lunch N' Learn to bring awareness and encourage student community to be more engaged in developing an inclusive environment
- Another group of students developed a Debate Club on equity topics to engage students to explore issues of concern in society

# THE QUEST

- Students were chosen to represent AMHS twice at The Quest conference in 2017 and 2018
- In 2017, students from French classes presented slam poems on discrimination and marginalization, Arts Mackenzie students presented their interpretation of learning through the arts
- In 2018, students for French classes presented results from survey data and next steps

# STUDENT REPRESENTATIVES

- Naila Varawalla represents Alexander Mackenzie High School at the student equity roundtable with other schools
- Naila was chosen out of many applications because of her sensitization to equity issues and her involvement at the board level to promote equity learning
- Naila Varawalla and Vasily Shugaev have also had the opportunity to be involved at the board level on equity training over the past few years in supporting racialized students
