## A Message from Administration

Dear Families,

Later this month, students will be receiving their Term 1 report cards. A very important part of the report card is the Learning Skills. Being successful on the learning skills component of the report card is indicative of future success for students later this year and bevond.

The development of learning skills and work habits needed to succeed in school and in life begins early in a child's schooling. As students move through the grades, they develop and then consolidate their learning skills and work habits in preparation for postsecondary education and the world of work. It is expected that teachers in partnership with families, will work with students to help them develop the learning skills and work habits to help students become effective learners, recognizing that it will look different at the various grade levels.

Learning skills and work habits contribute substantially to student success. It is expected that teachers will work with students and their parents to ensure that they understand these learning skills and work habits and their importance.

Over the course of the term, teachers have discussed and modeled these skills. Teachers worked with students to explain how these skills will be assessed and evaluated. At times, students were asked to self assess their learning skills and work habits.

Assessing, evaluating, and reporting on the achievement of curriculum expectations and on the demonstration of learning skills and work habits separately allows teachers to provide information to the parents and students that is specific to each of the two areas of achievement.

The following are the six learning skills and work habits:

- Responsibility
- Organization
- Independent Work
- Collaboration
- Initiative
- Self-Regulation

E = Excellent

G = Good

S = Satisfactory

N= Needs Improvement

You and your child are important partners in the learning and assessment process. Teachers will help students to:

- understand what they are expected to know and be able to do in order to successfully demonstrate these learning skills and work habits;
- set goals for growth; and
- build on strengths, use learning preferences, and focus on areas of need to achieve success

Strong learning skills and positive work habits are often an indicator of future success in school, at home, and in life in general. Learning skills and work habits will look different in individuals as they grow and mature. Teachers will work together with students to develop the criteria used to assess learning skills and work habits.

## LEARNING SKILLS AS ACADEMIC ENABLERS AND THE ROLE OF A GROWTH MINDSET

People who have a *Growth Mindset* believe that intelligence is a quality that can be cultivated (in other words, it is not "fixed" or static) because the brain is like a muscle that can be trained. This *Mindset*, or disposition toward learning, has strong correlations to effort, selfefficacy, motivation and engagement. When teachers and parents model and foster the development of a growth mindset, students are more likely to set high personal goals, persevere in their pursuit of those goals, develop resiliency in the face of challenges and, ultimately, recognize that their own efforts, skills and strategies were *enablers* of their learning and achievement.



## A Gentle Reminder



At Anne Frank P.S., we embrace our wonderful Canadian weather! All students from Junior Kindergarten to Grade 8 are expected to go out for every recess unless the Principal decides that weather conditions are so poor that it would be detrimental for them to be outdoors. Students are to come to school ready for the weather and prepared to be outdoors for up to 40 minutes at a time. We always monitor the weather and, in extreme conditions e.g. wind chill and storm conditions, we keep the students indoors or shorten the recess breaks.







Students in Ms. Napoli/ Ms. Mazur's Kindergarten class along with Mr. Goldman's Grade 1 class visited **Ripley's Aquarium** this month. As part of their classroom inquiry project and the science curriculum, this field trip was organized based on the students' interests of their current inquiry regarding fish/underwater animals. This trip extended this inquiry perfectly with lots of handson activities and wondering (e.g., shark sensational workshop and making an aquarium). There was much learning, wondering and critical thinking of all we saw and experienced at Ripley's! It was amazing to see students taking a risk by touching underwater animals (e.g., sting rays and horse crabs). In addition, the students discovered that there are many different types of sharks (e.g., sand tiger, nurse, hammerhead and great white sharks), and also learned informational facts about jellyfish, which has further transitioned into Ms. Napoli/Ms. Mazur's classroom because the students were so captivated and intrigued about jellyfish. In. Mr. Goldman's class, they have begun to further investigate the details associated with different fish habitats. Students also saw the famous "Nemo" fish (which is actually called a Clown Fish) up close, and discovered how a star fish re-grows its tail, and much more. Ever since our trip, the students have been engaged in many discussions, wondering and critically thinking about what they saw. It is clear that hands on learning is essential in an inquiry based classroom!

## School Bus Cancellation Notice

To ensure the safety of students, school bus service may be cancelled due to inclement weather, extreme temperatures and/or poor road conditions. In these cases, parents and students should develop alternate care/transportation arrangements.

Since some busing schedules begin by 7:00 a.m., cancellation decisions must be made by 6:00 a.m. to allow time to communicate this message to bus drivers. Cancellation decisions will only be made after thorough consultation with the Safety Officers of school bus companies servicing York Region and are based on several factors including precipitation, air temperature, road conditions and weather forecast.

#### Please note the following;

- A decision to cancel school bus service will be region-wide meaning all school buses, vans and taxis will not operate.
- When bus service is cancelled all school tests and/or examinations will be cancelled and rescheduled.
- Student trips involving the use of school buses will also be cancelled.
- School bus routes may be cancelled when severe weather may not be affecting all
  municipalities in York Region. Both the YRDSB and YCDSB operate many regional
  educational programs. Students attending these programs are transported over large
  attendance areas encompassing several municipal boundaries. This limits the ability to
  cancel bus service using a municipality or zone methodology.
- Unless otherwise stated, schools will remain open and parents can make arrangements
  to transport their children to and from school even if school bus service is cancelled. If
  buses are cancelled in the morning, they will not operate in the afternoon.
  Therefore students transported to school by parents will require the same
  transportation home.

will be based on the policies and practices described in Growing Success: Assessment, Evaluation, and Reporting In Ontario Schools, First Edition, Covering Grades 1 to 12.



This Ministry of Education policy emphasizes the

significance of developing learning skills and work habits in our children. It is expected that teachers will work with students and their parents to ensure that they understand learning skills and work habits and their importance. Students benefit when teachers model the skills and habits and explain how they will be assessed and evaluated.

## Learning Skills & Work Habits

The development of learning skills and work habits needed to succeed in school and in life begins early in a child's schooling. As students move through the grades, they develop and then consolidate their learning skills and work habits in preparation for post-secondary education and the world of work.

In many subjects and disciplines in Grades I to 12, the development of the learning skills and work habits is further strengthened through the achievement of the curriculum expectations.

- Responsibility
- Organization
- Independent Work
- Collaboration
- Initiative

The following are sample behaviours which are designed to help identify strengths and support growth of those learning skills and work habits.

#### Responsibility

Consider how well your child:

- fulfills commitments in learning environments;
- completes and submits class work, homework, and assignments according to agreed upon timelines; and
- manages his/her behaviour.

### Independent Work

Consider how well your child:

- monitors, assesses, and revises plans to complete tasks and meet goals;
- uses class time appropriately to complete tasks; and
- follows instructions with minimal supervision.

#### Collaboration

Consider how well your child:

- accepts various roles and an equitable share of the work within a group;
- responds positively to the ideas, opinions, values, and traditions of others;
- builds healthy peer relationships;
- works with others to resolves conflicts and builds consensus to achieve group goals; and
- shares information, resources, and expertise to solve problems and make decisions.
