

In the 2017/18 school year, York Region Public Health will visit all elementary schools to provide school immunization clinics to Grade 7 students. The clinics offer vaccines for Hepatitis B, Human Papilloma Virus (HPV) and Meningococcal A, C, Y, W-135 at no cost.

Under the Immunization of School Pupils Act, meningococcal vaccine is required for school attendance, unless an exemption is filed with public health. Hepatitis B and HPV vaccines are recommended, but not required for school attendance.

Parents of students entering Grade 7 in fall 2017 will receive consent forms in the mail in June. Please complete the consent form and return it to York Region Public Health to allow your child to participate in the immunization clinics. Detailed instructions can be found on the forms and accompanying letter. If the consent form is not completed, your child will not be able to receive vaccines at the clinic.

Parents and guardians who do not consent should still complete the forms and return them, indicating that you do not authorize York Region Public Health to immunize your child.



"Anne Frank - A History For Today" Exhibit "

Vaughan Public Libraries is excited to be the host of the "Anne Frank - A History For Today" Exhibit at our Dufferin Clark branch from July 3 to September 2.

"Anne Frank - A History For Today" is a unique photographic exhibit loaned by The Anne Frank House in the Netherlands (Anne Frank Stiching), in conjunction with Veterans Affairs Canada.

Anne Frank was born in 1929 in Germany and moved with her family to the Netherlands to escape growing anti-Semitism. After the Nazis invaded the Netherlands she and her family hid in the Secret Annex where Anne kept a diary of her time there. The family was discovered in 1944 and sent to concentration camps where Anne died at Bergen-Belsen in 1945, aged only fifteen. Only her father survived and was given Anne's diary by a friend, Miep Gies, who had helped them while they were in hiding. The diary was first published in 1947, seventy years ago, and Anne became the face of the six million Jews who were murdered in the Holocaust.

There will also be two programs held in conjunction with this exhibit:

"Holocaust And Genocide – A History" on Sunday, July 23, 2:00 pm - 3:00 pm "Holocaust Survivor's Personal Testimony" on Thursday, August 17, 7:00 pm - 8:00 pm

School Council Update - Carly Cohen (School Council Co-Chair)

Dear Families of the Anne Frank Community,

Thank you so much for your support of our school and of the upcoming Fun Fair!

On April 26th, many of you visited our school for the Family Wellness Evening and may have come across the wonderful poster that one of our School Council Parents created to help share some of the ways our school uses the money which was fundraised this year:

It is with the support of our families that we can offer incredible enhancements to regular Ministry funded school programing:

- Did you know that the school board matched fundraised \$6250.00 and we were able to purchase \$12,500.00 worth of technology for our students this year?
- Did you know that some of the levelled readers cost about \$500.00 a set?
- Did you know that your funds covered the cost of two school wide lice checks this year?
- Our school community recognizes the many mental health needs of students in our school. Anxiety, social conflict and family issues, have a direct effect on how students perform at school. Did you know that
 this year school raised funds were able to cover the \$8000.00 cost of having additional ½ day a week outreach social work support for the year? Our Outreach School Social Worker services about 20 students for
 individual counselling as well as working with many groups and classrooms on issues of bullying, social
 conflict, racism, respect, etc.
- At AFPS we recognize that students learn in different ways and having environmental supports such as standing desks and wobble stools make a difference! We were able to fund the purchase of these important supports for our students.
- Did you know that we received a \$1000.00 PRO Grant from the Ministry of Education this year based on a proposal we submitted last year?
- Did you know that we received a \$10,000.00 Outdoor Learning Grant from TD thanks to a proposal that school council members and AFPS staff put together?

These are just some examples of where your money goes to when you choose to support school fundraisers. So far this year, we fundraised over \$40,000 to add incredibly important enhancements to our school! Our school wouldn't be the same without this important support!

School Council parents volunteer their time to build these dreams and it is a lot of hard work. We appreciate their leadership, time, effort and support!

Coming up... Fun Fair!

Did you know that last year we had an extra fundraiser - Bog Box Cards? This year we chose not to do the extra fundraiser and instead added \$2 to the wristbands of the fun fair with plans to further enhance the experience for our students and the community.

The Fun Fair is a fundraiser for us and 100% of the money goes right back to your children.

Different schools in the area may plan the fun fair in different ways to meet the needs of their school and to reflect the needs of the community. Some schools choose to offer the Fun Fair for free but charge \$10-25 for food, some charge \$8 a card and the card is only good for each ride once, some are just designed as a community event and engagement because they hold other successful fundraisers during the school year so they choose to offer the end of year Fun Fair for free. Although human instinct is to compare ourselves with other schools, we need to keep in mind that we are still a fairly new school building and our needs are different. As a school council, we strive to enhance the educational experience for our students and sometimes there're a cost attached to that. Part of our mandate and goal is to raise funds for our school.

We have had free events that we have also funded throughout the year. Our beautiful Wellness night brought the community together. What would it have cost if you paid for the Energy Karate class? Our Alyson Schafer talk was a powerful evening of wonderful strategies. She charges \$150/hour for personal consultation and the event was free to all parents in the community. We value community engagement and are proud to provide these events to help build growth and understanding of school and board areas of foci as well as of our community.

We are so excited with the amazing work that has been achieved by the parent council coupled with the special team of educators and administrators at Anne Frank Public School. MYTH vs. FACT

Bilingual Language Development



MYTH

FACT

Speaking 2 or more languages to a child can 'confuse" them, so it is better to only speak 1 language.

It is better for families to only speak the language taught in school to their children, even if they do not speak the language well.

> Young bilingual children are delayed in learning language compared to peers who only speak 1 language.

Bilingual children should not mix parts of the languages they speak.

Children become bilingual just by listening to people around them speaking the second language

All children are capable of learning multiple languages, including children with developmental delays and learning disabilities.

Families should speak the language they are most comfortable speaking, so children are given rich linguistic models and can interact best with other members of their community.

Bilingualism does NOT cause language delays, and has been shown to improve children's ability to learn new words, identify sounds, and problem-solve.

"Translanguaging" occurs when individuals grammatically mix aspects of the languages they speak. It fosters cultural and metalinguistic awareness.

Learning language is an active process that requires many opportunities for children to practice communicating in context with others. Listening and responding are both crucial for developing competence.

If you are concerned about the language, speech, or communication development of someone you know, contact a speech-language pathologist for a comprehensive assessment.

Career Cruising On-line Grade 8 International Languages Credit Continuing Education - Quick Tip Sheet

For York Region District School Board Grade 8 students, you must use the Career Cruising Course Planner to register for International Languages Credit Program offered at Saturday School or Tuesday Night School. Career Cruising can be accessed wherever you have Internet access.
