



Student success in school has been shown to increase if their parents are positively involved in their education.




Highlight ways in which you and your family use math in everyday life and discuss how good math skills will open the doors to a larger choice of career options.

Encourage a growth mindset

Studies have shown that effort trumps ability when it comes to learning math, so set high expectations when encouraging your child.

Take baby steps

Support new topics by slowly building from the topics your child already understands. Use gradual, repeated success to build math confidence in your child.

I hope you all have a happy and safe March Break and enjoy the warmer weather ahead.



Unfortunately, every year 50,000 children are seriously injured in bike-related mishaps.

Wearing a certified helmet can reduce the risk of serious head injuries by 85%.

The Bike Safety Workshop is a 40 minute interactive discussion facilitated by a public health nurse.

It is designed to equip children from Kindergarten-Grade 3 with the skills to identify and prevent some of the most common causes of childhood bike-related injury.

PLAY Program Update

The Peer Leadership for Active Youth (PLAY)

At the beginning of January, our PLAY Ambassadors students from Grades 5-8 participated in a half day leader training with our public health nurse. In this workshop, student leaders learned about leadership, respect, conflict resolution, communication, bullying, role modeling positive behaviour, and developing skills to promote physical literacy and physical activity at school. They also learned about safety, problem solving situations, and various games to play with students during recess. During the month of February, our PLAY Ambassadors officially launched the program. Students from Grades 1-2 during lunch recess engaged in various comparative games such as dodge ball, four squares, spud, Mr. Wolf, basketball and wall ball. Many students were very eager and excited to try these new recess games.

It is wonderful to see how this new PLAY program is beginning to support the development of positive climates for learning and inclusion in our playgrounds.





Peace by Peace Program

In January, Anne Frank PS welcomed students from York University and University of Toronto to facilitate a social skills program called "**Peace by Peace**." The volunteers facilitate the pro-



gram every Tuesday at our school. It focuses mainly on conflict resolution and community building for elementary school students in the Toronto and York region areas. The 11-week program empowers grades 4 and 5 students to deal with the pressing issues of conflict, bullying, and violence in their day-to-day lives, schools, and communities. The volunteers continue to use an interactive, hands-on approach based on games, activities, and discussions that engages students and provides them with practical skills. As students gain practical and life skills from the curriculum, we hope that students will continue to use the skills they have learnt as they face challenges in their everyday life. The benefits are to educate, motivate and challenge our students to recognize choice and make a more peaceful world for themselves and their community.

Anne Frank Exhibition

From February 6 to March 3, our school hosted an exhibition about Anne Frank set against larger historical events during her life. The exhibition consists of 12 panels displaying various photos, texts and a chronological order of events leading up to and during World War II. This project is intended to educate students in grades 7 and older about the dangers of discrimination, the importance of tolerance, acceptance and human rights. The exhibition tours were run completely by student ambassadors who received special training from the Anne Frank House. These ambassadors included students from Anne Frank P.S., Stephen Lewis S.S. and Westmount C.I.

On February 8, the school hosted a launching ceremony for the exhibit which included a special presentation from Holocaust survivor, Jochebed Katan. Jochebed shared the story of her family's survival during World War II and presented a song she wrote about the chestnut tree Anne Frank could see while in hiding.

All of our students in grades 6-8 visited the exhibition as well as students from several other schools including Stephen Lewis S.S., Aurora High, Thornhill Woods and Crosby Heights. Aside from school tours, the exhibition was open to the general public on several occasions and the turn out and response was overwhelmingly positive. Hosting this exhibition has been a wonderful learning opportunity for our entire community and we are especially proud of our student ambassadors who led all of the tours.

Being the first school in Canada named after Anne Frank, Anne Frank Public school was honoured to host the Anne Frank Exhibition: A History for Today. This travelling exhibition made its way all the way from Amsterdam. It consists of twelve panels displaying various photos, texts and a chronological order of events leading up to and during World War II. The personal story of Anne Frank is set against larger historical events of the time to help viewers understand the connections between the personal and the political. One additional panel shows Canadian participation in World War II that was created to mark the 70th anniversary of the Liberation of the Netherlands in 2015. Through the story of Canadian soldiers, the panel addresses themes such as enlistment, Canada's role in major battles, the prisoner of war experience, liberation of Nazi camps, war brides and immigration following the war.

The exhibit was open to the public during set times and trained student ambassadors. The ambassadors attended a two day intensive training by Julie Couture, Anne Frank House education liaison coordinator.



STUDENTS LEAD TOURS OF ANNE FRANK EXHIBIT AT THEIR SCHOOL

York Region's Anne Frank Public School is presenting an exhibit about the young Jewish diarist whose name has become synonymous with Holocaust education.

Anne Frank – A History for Today is the name of a travelling exhibit produced by the Anne Frank House in Amsterdam, the place where the Frank family hid in the 1940s in an attempt to escape deportation by the Nazis to death camps. The house became a biographical museum in 1960.

The exhibit consists of 12 panels displaying photos and information about the events leading up to Adolf Hitler's rise to power, the persecution of Europe's Jews, the circumstances that led the Frank family to go into hiding and their tragic fate.

Shortly after Hitler was elected in 1933, the Franks fled Germany and settled in the Netherlands. When the Nazis occupied the Netherlands and began deporting Jews in 1942, the Franks went into hiding with four other people. It was there that Anne Frank penned arguably the most famous diary in literature, which has since been translated into 60 languages. In 1944, the hiding place was discovered by the Nazis and the Franks and the others were shipped to concentration camps. Anne's father, Otto Frank, was the only survivor.

ANNE FRANK EXHIBIT IS COMPELLING INTRODUCTION TO HOLOCAUST

The exhibit, which is geared toward students between the ages of 10 and 18, presents Anne Frank's personal story alongside the historical events of the time, to show how Holocaust education is about much more than facts and figures.

Aneta Fishman, principal of the Anne Frank Public School, explained that educating students and the community about the school's namesake is one of her priorities.

"When the school opened in 2014, one of our visions for the school was... 'We are the world,'" Fishman said, following an opening ceremony for the exhibit on Feb. 8 at the elementary school, during which Dutch Holocaust survivor Jochebed Katan shared her story.

"We are a public school in York Region named after Anne Frank, and it was important to us that every person who comes through our doors feels a sense of belonging and knows that it is OK to have a voice and to speak your mind and to ask questions."

Fishman said she began looking into the possibility of bringing the exhibit to her school as early as 2015.

"When the opportunity to book the exhibit came up, we didn't know then how relevant and timely this was going to be," she said, referring to today's divisive political climate.

Stephanie Hopkins, a music and special education teacher at the school who helped organize the exhibit, explained that the idea is to educate students about the dangers of discrimination and intolerance.

"My hope is that students will learn from the past and make connections to their world today and think deeply about discrimination and the dangers of it," Hopkins said.

As part of the program, student ambassadors volunteered to take part in a two-day course with Julie Couture, the Anne Frank House project co-ordinator, to train them in giving guided tours of the exhibit.

Hopkins said the exhibit is usually held at high schools, libraries and museums, and this may be the first time the student volunteer ambassadors are as young as seventh graders.

"Normally they are high school students – Grade 9 and up – who are in this position," Hopkins said, adding that it gave the elementary school students an opportunity to connect with 10 high school students from Stephen Lewis Secondary School and Westmount Collegiate Institute who also took part in the training course.

Fishman said she is thrilled that the exhibit is booked for a tour by a different school every day until it ends on March 6. The exhibit is also open to the public on Feb. 22 and Feb. 26.
