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GENERAL INTEREST COURSES


YRDSB General Interest Courses have experienced a steady decline in client registrations for the past six years. As a result, YRDSB General Interest Courses have operated at a financial loss in 2011-12 and 2012-13. This information was brought forward and discussed at the Board Standing Committee Meeting on May 21. At the June 4, 2013 Board Meeting, the decision was made to discontinue General Interest Courses.

SEARCH AND SEIZURE

Protocol between the York Region Police and York Region District School Board mandates that school administrators remind parents of the search and seizure policy at the commencement of the school year. The Police Protocol states that "the school community needs to be made aware of the right of the school administrators to search school property, such as lockers and desks, without notice to or permission of any person. School administrators shall also make the school community aware that police may from time to time be invited onto school premises to conduct their own searches. These searches may be conducted without notice to or permission of any member of the school community other than the school principal."

STUDENT BUSSING ELIGIBILITY

Did you know that students' bussing eligibility changes throughout their school career? Your son/daughter's eligibility to ride the school bus may change according to their grade and distance from home to school. Below are the provisions for eligibility identified in the Board's Transportation Policy #680:

All YRDSB students in Grades JK-3 who live within 1.2 km of their school are not eligible for transportation

All YRDSB students in Grades 4-8 who live within 1.6 km of their school are not eligible for transportation

All YRDSB students in Grades 9-12 who live within a transit served area are not eligible for transportation.

REPORTING TO THE OFFICE

Please remember that the first place to visit at school is the office. The only way that we can assure the safety of all students is with your full participation! A "Sign-In" sheet is located in the office, and requires all visitors or volunteers to sign in when entering the building. Please sign in at the office and obtain a "Visitor" badge so that you can quickly be identified by staff in the halls. Going directly to your child's classroom only causes confusion in the hallways.

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Aurora Senior/George Street SAFE ARRIVALS



Our school operates a safe arrival program which requires that we check the whereabouts of all students who are absent or late each day. We need your help! If your child (ren) will be absent from school, please call the school office at 905.727.9751 to let us know. Please leave a message on the school answering machine indicating your child's name, grade and his/her teacher's name and the reason for the absence/late, i.e. illness, appointment, etc. We have an answering machine which is on at night for your convenience.

ARRIVING ON TIME

Please ensure that students arrive on time each day. Tardiness is not only a bad habit, it is detrimental to the learning of those that arrive late and disrupts the other students in the class. If your child comes to school late, please have her/him sign in at the main office, so the attendance can be changed and thus avoiding unnecessary phone calls home.

IMMUNIZATION

Just a reminder to all parents: please make sure that your child's immunization records are up to date. The Public Health Department does check all student records.



Student Health and Medical Information

If your child needs to take medication during school hours, we ask that you obtain the necessary forms from the school office. For legal and safety reasons written permission is required for ALL medication including inhalers, Aspirin, Tylenol, Epipens etc. Medication must be kept secure in the office (except for epi-pens where one will remain in the office and one is to be with the child at all times). Please ensure that all medication is brought directly to the office. For conditions such as epilepsy, as well as diabetes, parents are required to complete a medical plan form.

Anaphylactic Reactions

School staff and parents are responsible for creating safe and healthy environments for students. This is an additional challenge for schools attended by children with allergies, especially lifethreatening allergies. While we take every

step to create a riskfree environment, school staff and parents can take important steps to minimize potentially fatal allergic reactions as there are implications for the whole school, not just individual classrooms. It is especially important that parents communicate a lifethreatening allergy to
the school as soon as
they are aware of it.
Please notify the Principal and your child's
teacher so that we take
the steps to create accurate records and inform staff of the established protocol.

STAFF PARKING LOT

A friendly reminder to parents that we only have a limited amount of parking spaces and they are reserved for staff. We encourage parents to use our lower parking lot or to walk their children to school. Thank you for your cooperation

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PROMOTING SUCCESS FOR STUDENTS OF FIRST NATION, MÉTIS AND INUIT ANCESTRY

The York Region District School Board provides an opportunity for students with First Nation, Métis and Inuit ancestry to selfidentify. The process is voluntary and the information gathered will be kept confidential.

The self-identification process is the first step in providing: Culturally specific learning opportunities or activities; Additional support for academic achievement and well-being, including designated support staff;

Communication between schools, First Nation, Métis and Inuit Education staff, Aboriginal students and their families;

Connections to post-secondary institutions, community groups, service providers and other partners;

More learning opportunities for all members of the school community to develop a greater understanding of Aboriginal perspectives, cultures and histories.

New students can self-identify when they register with the Board. Current students can complete an Aboriginal Self-Identification Form which can be obtained from their school.

It's your head...use it!

Head injuries are the leading cause of serious injury and death to kids on wheels. Wearing a properly fitted, certified helmet can reduce the risk of serious head injury by 85 per cent. Children and youth (under 18) are required by law to wear a helmet when bicycling. Helmets must fit properly to protect your child in the event of a crash.

Remember the 2V1 Shake, Shake, Shake rule:

- 2: The helmet should cover the top of your child's head and sit 2 finger widths above their eyebrows (a helmet that is too big will not provide proper protection).
- V: Adjust the side straps so they form a V-shape under their ears.
- Only 1 finger should fit between your child's chin and the fastened straps.

Shake, Shake: Have your child shake their head up and down and side to side to make sure the helmet is snug.

To provide proper protection, helmets must have a safety standard label (e.g., CSA, CPSC, Snell B-95, N-94, ASTM 1447, F-1898). Remember to check regularly for cracks, dents, and broken or frayed straps. Be a good role model —always wear a helmet when you are cycling, boarding or blading.


