Kindergarten Registration for September 2024 began January 19, 2024. Children who turn four or five years old during 2024, live within the school boundary, and whose parents/guardians are public school tax supporters will be eligible to register for Kindergarten.

There are several ways you can register for Kindergarten:

- Online at <u>www.yrdsb.ca/kindergarten</u>. It is recommended that families use a laptop or a desktop, rather than a mobile device to complete this registration.
- Download the <u>Elementary School Registration Form</u> at <u>www.yrdsb.ca/Kindergarten</u> and email the completed form to <u>barbara.reid.ps@yrdsb.ca</u>.
- Phone us at 905-591-3800. Families can request an interpreter, if needed, during this phone conversation.
- Visit the school office to drop off or complete a registration form.

Once you have completed your application, the school will contact you to make an appointment to review and verify the <u>required documents</u>.

Celebrating Black History Month / BHM365 - Events 2024

Celebration of Black History Month has been a part of Canadian society since the 1950s. Lieutenant Governor Hal Jackman declared February as Black History Month in Ontario in 1993, and in 1995, the Honorable Jean Augustine made the same declaration in the House of Parliament in Ottawa.

These declarations set the stage for acknowledging the contributions of Black people of African Heritage to the cultural, economic, political and social fabric of Canada dating back to the early 1600s. They have also increased our awareness that people of African and Caribbean Heritage

are an integral part of Canadian history.

During the month of February, we deliberately reflect upon the legacy of African history in all its diversity, and we join all Canadians in celebrating Black History Month. During this month we are able to appreciate the significance of African people in world history by centering people of African, Caribbean, and Canadian heritage, famous and not so famous, who have influenced the nation and the world through their ideas, words and actions.

The York Region District School Board recently commemorated Tamil Heritage Month. In this special episode, Initha Subramaniam, Vice Principal at Legacy Public School, led the discussion, shedding light on the origins of Educators for Tamil Student Success (ETSS). Formed in 2009 amidst the aftermath of the Sri Lankan conflict, ETSS emerged as a beacon of support for Tamil students grappling with the traumas of war. ETSS has grown into a dynamic community of advocates within the YRDSB.

Over the years, ETSS has organized a plethora of initiatives, including the Uukkamathu Kaividale Awards, which celebrates Tamil student achievements across various schools in the York Region. ETSS fosters community engagement through workshops, events, and collaborations with culturally responsive partners. Their efforts extend beyond the classroom, as they actively work with senior leadership and diverse departments to co-create supportive frameworks for Tamil students and staff alike. Integral to their mission is the celebration of Tamil Heritage Month, a testament to their grassroots activism in advocating for its recognition at the provincial level.

As the discussion unfolds, panelists further delve into their experiences and contributions, exemplifying the spirit of unity and empowerment ingrained in the Tamil Heritage Month celebrations.

Learning about Mental Health Presentation Series (LAMPS)

The YRDSB encourages families to <u>choose active travel</u>, like walking or biking whenever possible all year round. Active school travel benefits student mental health, well-being and academic performance, builds social connections and reduces traffic and pollution around schools.

Here are a few tips to help you stay safe and enjoy winter walks to school.

- 1. Dress for the weather. Wear layers. Don't forget your hat and mitts
- 2. Protect your feet. Wear warm socks and winter boots. They will protect your feet from snow, rain and cold and have good grips.
- 3. Be visible. Wear bright clothes, stay on the sidewalks and make sure cars can see you when you cross the road.
- 4. Allow a little more time. Prepare your winter gear the night before, and give yourself a little more time to walk to school.
- 5. Try walking like a penguin. It's fun and practical.
- 6. Enjoy the snow. Catch snowflakes, talk about what you love most about the winter.
- 7. Obey road signs. The seasons change but road safety rules remain. Stop at roads and crosswalks. Cross with a crossing guard where possible. Look out for cars.

It's never too early to start to teach road safety. Your child will become a safe, responsible and independent pedestrian by experience and practice. Starting them as young as kindergarten will equip them with the skills they need to walk on their own in all seasons at an earlier age.

Tips for Winter Walking

Krypto

Krypto is a card game designed by Daniel Yovich in 1963. This game is a great opportunity to build flexibility with numbers and operations.

Goal: Be the first player to create a sequence to achieve the target card value.

How to Play: The <u>Krypto deck</u> consists of 56 cards: three each of numbers 1-6, four each of the numbers 7-10, two each of 11-17, one each of 18-25.

Six cards are dealt: a common target card at the top and five other cards below.

Each player must use all five of the cards' numbers exactly once, using any combination of operations (addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division), to form the target card's number.



The first player to come up with a correct sequence wins. Order of operations matters!

This can be played collaboratively with the same five numbers for all players or each player can have their own different set of five cards.

Primary Version: To modify this game you can use a set of <u>Primary Krypto</u> cards in which the deck has three of each of the numbers from 1-10.

Problem of the Month

When a number is multiplied by itself, the answer is a perfect square. For example, 25 is a perfect square because 5 x 5 is 25. In how many ways can the number 1764 be written as the product (multiply) of two perfect squares?

From our last Newsletter:

In how many ways can 15 identical red blocks be put into four piles so that each pile has at least one block and no two piles have the same number of blocks? (The order of the piles does not matter).

Answer:

There are 6 ways to create four piles with 15 objects and no piles have the same number of objects.

It is on display at Markham Museum from September 28, 2023 to February 25, 2024, and is available as an online exhibit here. The exhibit will then travel to public venues and schools in York Region.
