component (or more) of our School Improvement Plan for Student Achievement and Well Being (SIPSA). The Bayview SIPSA, like all schools, has 3 main components – Mathematics, Modern Learning, and Mental Health. We are also learning more about Equity, Innovation and Leadership. We have embraced the Bayview motto of "Friends Learning Together".

Here are some of the topics our Professional Learning Groups are investigating:

Resilience in the classroom.

Effective and respectful communications skills.

The relevance of math outside of the classroom.

Effective pathway and skill workshops for students.

Direct teaching of self-regulation in the ASD classroom.

Equitable Access to Co-op Placements for English Language Learners.

International music/songs and film for the French Language classroom.

Classroom activities linked to critical thinking and the inquiry model in Geography.

Strategies in the Drama Program to enhance student self-esteem produced by a balance of traits, enhance risk taking and decrease anxiety around speaking about feelings.

Creating classroom spaces dedicated to various aspects of the school improvement plan (i.e. mental health & well-being, heritage education, pathways, etc.).

Best practices of the 4R Physical and Health Education Curriculum and how to nurture positive mental health in both the health room and the gymnasium.

Authentic experiential learning opportunities to support IB learners.

How to self-identify test taking anxiety and finding strategies to cope with it and improve performance.

The RBC Black History Month Student Essay Competition



English

Bayview's English department has been very busy this semester!

The English department continued on its archetypal heroic mission to create new and innovative ways to teach students how to read and write. While students still studied Shakespeare, they did so by not only reading the plays, but by creating their own productions (*King Lear* as the *Godfather*?), studying various media productions of the plays (I didn't know

Romeo and Juliet was a musical!), and learning about what life was really like back in Elizabethan England (Did they really have to eat that?).

Our IB teachers have been working diligently to prepare their students for their final high school exams (gasp, where did the time go?)!

Our grade 10 teachers successfully prepared our students for the OSSLT, which took place in April. Our students have participated in a number of creative writing contests, including the Era Banner, Richmond Hill Library and Stephen Leacock contests. Who would have known how motivating winning money could be for students' creativity? (hmmm...) Contest results still pending...

This year we also introduced a new course to our students: Science Fiction and Fantasy. Students have studied how fantastical worlds get created, how Star Trek is better than Star Wars (or vice versa...the debate continues), how to prevent the end of the world, and how important our imagination is in our everyday lives — all important life skills as our students endeavour to boldly go where no one has gone before!

Reporting to OUAC and OCAS

Graduating students received on Friday, a copy of their Credit Counselling Summary that includes their mid-semester marks. Students who do not have a home room were asked to pick up their Credit Counselling Summary in Guidance by the end of the day.

Please review with your child to make sure the information is correct and matches the information on OUAC or OCAS. When mid-semester marks are posted check the Grade Report to ensure that the marks are accurate. Marks will be submitted to OUAC and OCAS on April 25th. If a student makes a course change after April 25th, Guidance will manually correct OUAC or OCAS.

Students taking a private school course must ensure the private school submits the mid-semester mark.


Poet-In-Residence, Phoebe Wang
