Apprenticeship



- Enables you to learn a skill trade on the job, under the supervision of an experienced tradesperson. The classroom component of apprenticeship may be taken through an Ontario college apprenticeship program.
- 75-90% on the job training

- Students can do co-op placements in grade 12 that will contribute to their hours of apprenticeship training.

The College Pathway



- College programs provide a valuable combination of academic and practical/technical skills training for a specific career
- Over 1000 programs to choose from including: Business Administration, Biomedical Technology, Computer Animation, Engineering Technology, Paramedic, Social Services, Specialized Arts Programs.....
- Every college offers Certificates, Diplomas, Advanced Diplomas, Certificates and Bachelor Degrees

Ontario Colleges - Types of Programs

- **Certificate Program**: 1 year of study. Here is the <u>link</u> to a list of certificate programs
- Diploma Programs:
 - *Regular Diplomas* are 2 years of study. Here is the <u>link</u> to regular diploma programs
 - Advanced Diplomas are 3 years of study. Here is the <u>link</u> to advanced diploma programs
- **Bachelor's Degree:** 4 years of study offering the best of both worlds: a solid foundation of theoretical knowledge and the practical skills to apply this knowledge in the real world. Here is the <u>link</u> to Bachelor Degree programs.

Ontario Colleges - Continued

- Collaborative & Joint Degree Programs
 - are offered jointly by a college and a partnering university. Students may earn either one or two credentials - one from the college and one from the university. These are hands-on learning with theoretical approach to university studies. Here is a <u>link</u> to the list of programs.

• Co-op Programs

- include scheduled periods of employment in related industries.
 Placements are typically paid positions. Here is a list to the co-op programs:

Ontario Colleges Timelines

- Applications can be submitted starting in November, with the deadline of **February 1** for equal consideration.
- Students can apply to **5** programs. No more than **3** at the same college.
- The application fee is \$95.
- Students get a response to their applications between February and April.
- Final date to accept an offer May 1

College University

- Articulation agreements between colleges and universities can earn students a degree and a diploma in four years
- College credits earned in the articulated program can count towards a University degree program
- Many students attend college for a year or two as they build self-awareness and knowledge of desired career. They then either graduate, stay with college or transition to university



The University Pathway



University programs provide theoretical and some practical training.

Some main areas of focus at most universities:

- STEM Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics
- Business/Commerce
- Arts/Humanities/Social Sciences
- Fine Arts theatre, music, visual arts
- Design animation and tech design

Ontario Universities



- 4 year bachelor's degree programs
- Six grade 12 U or M courses including English (ENG4U).
- Each program will have **additional specific subject requirements**
- Admissions averages vary depending on the program and school. Generally they range from the high-70s to the mid-90s.
- Students who have been in Canada fewer than 4 years may need to write a **language proficiency** test (ex: TOEFL, IELTS or Dual Lingual).
- **Competitive programs** have additional non-academic criteria, such as supplementary application forms, portfolios and auditions. In some cases, these criteria are considered equally with marks to determine admission.

Ontario Universities - Continued

- Visit the **<u>101 Application Guideline</u>** for up-to-date resources.

- Base Application Fee: \$150 for your initial 3 program choices.
- Additional Choice Fee: \$50 per choice
- For each additional program choice beyond your first 3 (e.g., if you add 2 additional university choices, you must pay \$100 in addition to the base application fee).
- Notes:
 - There is no fee for replacing a program choice with another program choice at the same university.
 - You may apply to as many Ontario universities as you wish; however, you are limited to a maximum of 3 program choices at any 1 university (including its affiliates). Some universities may further limit the number of programs you can apply to.

Ontario Universities - Conditional Offers

When you receive an offer, you must **carefully review the conditions** that may come with the offer and be confident that you will meet those conditions by the end of June.

Bear in mind that all Offers of Admission expire on June 1, 2023, but you will not know your final Semester 2 marks until the END of June.

If your conditions are dependent on Semester 2 courses, you <u>MUST</u> be certain that you will meet those conditions.

Ontario Universities - Important Dates

- Important Dates:
 - January 12, 2023: Latest date to submit completed online applications to the OUAC for equal consideration.
 - May 29, 2023: Date by which the universities must respond to your application for admission.
 - June 1, 2023: Earliest date by which the universities may require a response to offers of admission and a financial commitment.
 - **Early June 2023:** Admission Information Service (AIS) will be open for students he did **NOT** receive an offer can apply to programs with spots available.
 - July 13, 2023: Final grades of semester 2 sent and transcript

Financing Your Education

Scholarships

• Based on academic achievement and extracurricular involvement. There are pre-entrance scholarships, scholarships by private donors and college/university scholarships

Bursaries

• Based on financial need, are not repaid. They are not loans from the colleges or universities.

Student Loans

• OSAP is based on financial need and must be repaid after graduation. Here is a <u>link</u> for more information.

Types of Scholarships

Scholarship donors may look at the following criteria:

- 1. Leadership and Academic.
- 2. College and Special Interest Groups
 - Most of these scholarships require academic excellence, school and community involvement and demonstrated leadership.
 If you have the appropriate qualifications, you can usually apply directly. Some are school nomination.

What type of students are scholarship providers looking to reward?

In addition to academic success and financial need, scholarship providers look for applications who can demonstrate:

- **Originality and Passion** what makes you stand out from all the other applicants?
- Volunteering- do you give back to the community? Have you volunteered beyond the 40 hour requirement?
- Leadership & Initiative are you a founding member or have you taken an active role in a club or organization?
- Talent Do you have a vision? Scholarships reward fresh thinking and new ideas
- **Special targeted areas** specific heritage or cultural background, gender, special needs, geography and more

Other Types of Scholarships

There are thousands of scholarships and awards that reward students for non-academic attributes:

- Being creative drawing, short story, poetry
- Volunteering in the community
- Ethnicity
- Parent workplace
- Entering a contest or a survey
- Writing an essay of a social or cultural or gender based topic
