## GRADE 6 VISIT TO THE HOLOCAUST MUSEUM

### The Toronto Holocaust Museum

The Holocaust was a very serious and depressing period in human history. Many people were killed, tortured, traumatized, forced to work, and suffered from sickness or malnutrition. We are now learning the significant stories of numerous survivors to remember and reflect on what happened during the past and how we can now change our future to end any form of racism. It is very pleasing to see that the government of Ontario incorporated the Holocaust into our school curriculum.

We saw multiple sorrowful objects, like artifacts from times before the Holocaust and after the Holocaust. We were also able to listen to stories from a few testimonies and stories from Holocaust survivors, and we heard some very mourningly things from them.

Before we entered the museum, we were listening to a true story based on Yael Spier Cohen (Gisela Spier), who was born in Germany and a father who was given the Iron Cross of Bravery in World War I, but who was still deported to concentration camps. She also had a brother named Mangred. Yael mostly managed to follow her family throughout their journey in concentration camps, but was separated once they reached the famous Auschwitz concentration camp in Poland.

Furthermore, in the museum, there was a lot of information regarding the (lebensraum) which means land to live, of Nazi Germany. There were a lot of timelines and maps regarding the land of the Nazis, like when they invaded the Soviet Union, or when they occupied France. This let us know how, when and where they had the power and influence they had. In the museum, it described how Jewish women were the most vulnerable target, because if you were pregnant, you would be sentenced to immediate death. The Museum described many principal keys about the Holocaust. We may never experience the traumatic situations the Jews faced, but all we can do is to remember and reflect this disturbing and violent time of human history.

## LETTER FROM A STUDENT

Dear Parents and Guardians,

My name is Liam from grade 6. I work with HNET, an organisation which protects the earth's ecosystems and combats the global climate crisis. Since I was very young, I was fascinated by things in nature, such as butterflies, mushrooms, and ants. When I learned that the planet was endangered, I decided to become an activist. I have a special interest in saving important insects in the Ontario ecosystem. In spring, my main goal is to raise the population of bumblebees and solitary bees.

It is finally spring, so I would like to make a request for something very important.

Bees are vital pollinators for our ecosystem. Most flowering plants depend on these pollinators, including fruits, vegetables, and garden plants. When we think of the word "bee", we usually think of honeybees. But, researchers discovered that bumblebees and solitary bees are much more effective at pollinating. Bumblebees are larger, fuzzy bees that live in small colonies. Solitary bees are usually small, and they live alone. They are rarely aggressive; their instinct is to flee rather than sting or bite.

Currently, bees are hibernating and are coming out in mid-May. The bees depend on common dandelions as a reliable first source of food as soon as they wake up. Instead of picking and killing dandelions, I ask you to leave them or transplant them into spare pots. This way, you have saved the lives of bees and the next generation of flowering plants. When the flowers start to wilt and produce white fluff, you can cut the stem off.

Spring also means garden cleaning. We get rid of dead foliage on the ground. This is a problem for hibernating bees because piles of dead leaves and sticks are bees' favorite places to sleep for the winter. Spring cleaning wipes out a large fragment of the population of bees. If not necessary, please leave all the debris where they are until mid-May. Otherwise, you can carefully place the dead foliage in a corner.
