
Student Achievements

Dorian Giordano Grade 9 won Gold Medal for Canada in Chengdu, China UCI FISE World Series Park Freestyle BMX competition!



Application and Selection Process for Students in

Grades 10-12

The purpose of this memo is to provide information regarding the application and selection process for secondary students wishing to apply for a COUNSELLOR or COUNSELLOR-INTRAINING (CIT) position at YRDSB Arts Camp 2018. There are a limited number of Counsellor and CIT positions at camp. Those students not selected for one of these leadership positions will be encouraged to apply for a camper position. Administrators will need to communicate this application and selection process to students and families.

Application Process:

- Only students in Grades 10-12 may apply for a Counsellor or CIT position;
- Counsellor applicants must have completed the Arts Camp CIT Program and/or an equivalent training program;
- The Counsellor and CIT program are positions of responsibility and require students to demonstrate leadership in their schools and/or communities;
- Applicants must complete the online form <u>LeadershipApplication</u> in its entirety;
- *NEW* In order to prepare answers for the required questions within the application, applicants may view the application in its entirety before responding through their @gapps.yrdsb.ca account LeadershipApplicationFullView;
- · Applicants must also upload a current resume in PDF when prompted in the online form;
- Students require parental/guardian consent and support of a referring teacher and school administrator to apply for a Leadership position at Arts Camp;
- There is no limit to the number of applications submitted from a particular school provided that each Counsellor/CIT applicant has met the following four criteria;

- o Student demonstrates positive character in school;
- o Student demonstrates positive behaviour in school;
- Student would benefit from and positively contribute, as a leader, to an arts program in an inclusive community; and
- Student is prepared and mature enough to spend a week away from home and school:
- A confirmation email will be sent to all applicants once they have completed the online form:
- An online reference form will be sent to referring teachers and Principal/VPs for each
 applicant. Each student application is dependent upon a positive reference from all
 parties;
- The deadline for all Counsellor and CIT applications is Friday, November 24th, 2017;
- Payment and full registration for camp will be arranged once the leadership applicant selection has been finalized.

Selection Process:

- Approximately 50 secondary spaces will be allocated to Counsellors and Counsellors in Training (CITs):
- *NEW* Counsellor selection will be conducted by the Arts Camp Leadership Team and is based on the student application, including resume, and previous performance at camp as a CIT;
- *NEW* CIT selection will also be conducted by the Arts Camp Leadership Team and is based on the student application, including resume and performance in mandatory group interview session as indicated in the online form;
- Successful candidates assuming the position of Counsellor or CIT will be assigned a cabin for mentoring and leading throughout the eight days of Arts Camp.
- Counsellor and CIT applicants must complete the <u>Leadership Application form</u> using the link provided no later than November 24th, 2017;
- The Arts Camp Admin Team has final approval of the roster of students accepted to Arts Camp 2018.

We continue to rely on the Principal/VP as an integral part of the process leading to a successful and meaningful camp experience for students. Flu Season is on its way – are you ready?



Flu season is nearly here. Be prepared by getting the flu shot as early as possible.

The first and best step to preventing influenza (the flu), is to get the flu shot every year. Influenza spreads quickly and easily from an infected person to others.

Everyone six months of age and older can get the flu shot.

Flu shots are available at:

- Health care provider's offices for people six months of age and older
- Participating pharmacies, for people five years of age and older

Visit ontario.ca/flu to find where you can get the flu shot.

How can the flu be avoided?

- Get the flu shot!
- Wash your hands well and often with soap and warm water. If soap and water are unavailable, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer
- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze and throw the tissue out immediately. Wash your hands afterward. Cough into your upper sleeve if you don't have a tissue.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth
- Avoid large crowds and stay home when you are sick
- Keep common surfaces and items clean and disinfected

What role do parents play?

We are all born hardwired for how we handle anxiety, some of us are not anxious at all; some of us are very anxious. Life events and experiences can push us up or down the stress continuum.
