



Students enter into the school in a single file between 9:05 a.m. -9:20 a.m.



If a student forgets their mask or the side straps snap, the school will provide a mask.



Students are greeted by the Admin team and sanitize their hands prior to entry.



A staff member is on duty in the Grand Hall to keep students moving and maintaining physical distancing.



MOVEMENT IN HALLWAYS



- To minimize close contact between students, directional floor decals have been installed to manage movement of students and staff.
- Hallways are divided to indicate paths for movement in schools.

HEALTH AND SAFETY PROTOCOLS

High touch points are being cleaned frequently (e.g. door handles, stairwells, etc)

Tables and chairs are wiped down at the end of each session



STRATEGIES FOR PHYSICAL DISTANCING

- Clear signage on the doors, floors and walls is visible to guide students.

MOVEMENT IN STAIRWELLS



At BHSS, students should can move up and down stairwells with a double staircase such as the ones at the Main Entrance and the end of the Grand Hall.

MOVEMENT IN STAIRWELLS

SINGLE DIRECTION



- The Staircase closest to the Music/Art, English & Math wings will is an "UP" only staircase.
- The Staircase closest to Special Education and Science is a "DOWN" only staircases
- The Staircase closest to the Gymnasium is also a DOWN only staircase.

MOVEMENT IN ELEVATORS

If assistance is required by a student, maximum users in an elevator/lift are two. Masks are to be worn at all times in elevator/lift. Floor decals are installed in the elevator indicating recommended standing locations.

In order to access the elevator at BHSS, an elevator card is required. Students should contact an Administrator in the Main Office to sign out an elevator card.

HEALTH AND SAFETY PROTOCOLS

- Desks are set up 2 meters apart
- Water bottles to be used at filling stations
- Food is only permitted for students with medical conditions



WASHROOM USE

- Students are to maintain physical distance from others at all times within the washroom, where possible and follow all prompts on the floor.
- Students are to wash their hands when they enter and exit the washroom.
- Students are to assess if the washroom has reached maximum usage as they enter based on posted signage.
- If the maximum has been reached, students are to wait in the hall in the designated area.



WASHROOM USE

- Floor decals spaced apart are placed inside washrooms at areas such as sinks/hand washing areas.
- It is recommended that students immediately leave the washroom as soon as they are finished.
- Classes are currently following a washroom break schedule
- Students do not go to the washroom unescorted to ensure no wandering occurs in the hallways

WHEN AN INDIVIDUAL BECOMES ILL WHILE AT THE SCHOOL

Follow these steps if an individual becomes ill with symptoms of COVID-19 while in the school or school related places (e.g., school bus).

If the test result is positive the individual is to self-isolate for at least 14 days from the day the symptoms started. Individual may return to the school after this period upon the guidance of York Region Public Health. If individual was not tested, they must self-isolate for 14 days from the day symptoms started. If individual's symptoms have been identified by a health care provider to be related to an ongoing health condition, their return to school may be considered based on circumstances.

Call York Region Public Health to report the illness and the school exposure to the symptomatic individual. Note: Siblings or other household contacts of symptomatic individuals with no known risk factors (close contact to a confirmed or probable case or recent travel) may attend the school unless symptomatic

If the individual tests positive their siblings and other household contacts would then then not be permitted at the school and required to selfisolate.

SHOULD MY CHILD ATTEND SCHOOL?

COVID-19 is a viral illness caused by a coronavirus called SARS-CoV-2 and is spread through respiratory droplets when in close contact with someone who is infected. This virus can often cause a mild illness, with symptoms similar to that of the common cold can also cause more severe illness, with symptoms such as pneumonia (infection of the lungs).

Common symptoms

- Fever (a temperature of 37.8°C/100.0°F or greater)
- · Cough (that is new or worsening)
- Shortness of breath

Other symptoms may include

- Sore Throat
- Runny nose (Rhinorrhea)
- Nasal Congestion


- Decrease or loss of sense of taste or smell
- Nausea and/or vomiting
- Diarrhea

It is recommended that any individual experiencing COVID-19-like symptoms seek medical attention and be tested for COVID-19.

Remember to screen your child for symptoms and risk factors every morning before school

PREVENTING COVID-19 EXPOSURES IN THE SCHOOLS

Preventing COVID-19 exposures in the school setting includes making sure people who may pose a risk do not enter a school. Use this resource to decide who should and should not be in a school.







Volunteer Hours

As part of the diploma requirements, students must complete a minimum of 40 hours of community involvement activities during their secondary school years. Accumulation of community involvement hours may begin the summer after grade 8.

The purpose of the community involvement requirement is to encourage students to develop an understanding of civic responsibility and the role they can play in supporting and strengthening their communities. Community involvement increases student awareness of community needs and how they can make a positive difference. Helping others enhances selfimage of students and fosters a greater sense of belonging. Parents/guardians can help by encouraging students to volunteer and develop lasting ties within their communities.

What types of activities are eligible?

Eligible Activities are volunteer activities that may be counted towards 40 community involvement hours that must be accumulated by students as a graduation requirement. Eligible activities are those activities that provide services to improve the community or well-being of its members and may be performed for not-for-profit organizations. If an activity does not fall within the categories approved by the Board, and is not on the list of ineligible activities students must obtain written approval from the principal before beginning the activity.

Elementary Schools

- assist with school events, assist School Councils, activities for children;

Secondary Schools

- organization and leadership of school activities that benefit the community;

Animal Care

- volunteering in a zoo, animal shelter, or on a farm;

Arts and Culture

- volunteering in galleries, libraries, community productions;

Charitable Organizations

- assisting with special events, programs, clerical tasks;

Child/Youth Programs

- assisting with child/youth programs, volunteering in a **not-forprofit** child care centre or camp;

. Community Organizations

- assisting with special events, food banks, community support services, shelters, clerical tasks;

Community Service for Individuals

- assisting community members in need;

Environmental Projects

- flower/tree planting, beautification projects, recycling projects, recycling depot;

Health Agencies

 volunteering in hospitals, hospices, Canadian Blood Services (volunteering to organize or assist with a blood donor clinic), donating blood (time required to donate);

Law Enforcement Agencies

- volunteering for activities sponsored by the police;

Political Organizations

- activities related to legitimate and recognized political organizations, municipal, provincial and federal political activities except for York Region

District School Board Trustees;

Religious Organizations

- assisting with programs, special events;

Senior Citizens

- assisting in seniors' residences, providing services for seniors in the community;

Sports and Recreation

- coaching, organizing special events, assisting with projects/events; or *Service Focused Club Activities*

- those activities that expand community service to others beyond the school day (holiday dinner participation, environmental action activities, etc.).

NOTE:

If an eligible activity also falls within the definition of ineligible activities, the activity will be deemed ineligible.

Where a blood donor clinic takes place during the school day, hours will only be provided to students volunteering during their lunch, spare periods or before and after school.

Activities at for-profit organizations, such as private camps, child care centres, or farms will not be eligible.

Guidance Updates

- Please continue to encourage your child to check the Guidance Google Classroom for updates and resources.
- Guidance and Student Success will be visiting grade 9 "virtual classes" during Block 4 on Monday and Tuesday to introduce ourselves
- For other students familiar with booking appointments, please remind them that the process has been modified this year students will log onto TeachAssist as usual but will be redirected to a bit.ly URL to book an appointment via Google Calendar. This generates Google Meet invitations that will be sent to a student's GAPPS email account. Guidance will need students to book appointments when they are NOT in the building as there is no private space for students to chat with Guidance when in-school.
- Grade 12s: we know they have many questions and concerns about postsecondary applications. Guidance will be holding a Grade 12 Information Assembly during the week of Oct. 13. More details will be shared on the Guidance Google Classroom and Parent Newsletter

BILL HOGARTH SECONDARY SCHOOL MORNING ANNOUNCEMENT TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 29, 2020

The **Orange Shirt Day** movement started in 2013 to commemorate the generations of Indigenous children who were sent to residential schools across the country. The last residential schools closed less than 25 years ago, after operating for over a century. The colour of the shirt is connected to the experience of Phyllis Webstad who was sent to St. Joseph Residential School near Williams Lake, BC, in 1973. When she was only six years old, Phyllis went to her first day of school wearing a new bright orange shirt. New clothes were a rare thing for the young girl, who was being raised by her grandmother. However, upon arriving at the school, the nuns stripped her of the shirt, forcing her to wear the school's institutional uniform. The

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
