Course Description

Media Arts is a new, experimental direction in the arts. This course emphasizes the development of the knowledge and skills required for the production of media art works. Students will develop an appreciation of the history of media arts through analysing specific works, and will create media artworks using a variety of technologies such as digital camera, photo-imaging software, etc.

A focus on the creative process gives students practical skills, appropriate motivation, and the theoretical knowledge needed to communicate ideas, feelings, and beliefs through the media artwork they create. In addition, students develop an appreciation and awareness of this new and innovative art discipline.

An essential component is hands-on exploration and skill development with integration of theoretical content. It is imperative that students have the opportunity to explore and experiment with the tools and techniques available to them as they unfold during the course, in order to become knowledgeable creators.

Course Expectations

Students are expected to be patient and persistent. An open mind, concentration and determination are necessary for success.

Areas explored include the following. Minor changes may occur – including content and order of delivery – as the semester progresses. Each unit will include necessary and relevant art theory and art history.
