Prerequisites: ASM2O1, ASM3M



Course Description

Media Arts is a new, experimental direction in the arts. This course emphasizes the development of the knowledge and skills required for the production of media art works. Students will develop an appreciation of the history of media arts through analysing specific works, and will create media artworks using a variety of technologies such as digital camera, photo-imaging software, etc.

A focus on the creative process gives students practical skills, appropriate motivation, and the theoretical knowledge needed to communicate ideas, feelings, and beliefs through the media artwork they create.

Units of Study

Areas explored include the following. Minor changes may occur as the semester progresses. Each unit will include necessary and relevant art theory and art history.

Introduction: Principles of Media Arts

Artwork Search

Artist Presentation Art Criticism and Research
Point of view: Place and Space Illustration, Vector Art
Hybridization: Text and Mixed Media Typography, Sound

Interactivity: Audience Interaction Installation, photo-documentation

Duration: frame by frame (time permitting) Computer assisted animation

Jamboard Process Work and Sketchbook ideas

Assessment and Evaluation

A variety of assessment and evaluation tools will be used during this course including checklists, student teacher conferencing, written feedback, rubrics, etc.

Learning skills will be assessed in terms of attendance, punctuality, being prepared and equipped, material use and clean-up, participation in class discussions, demonstration of group skills, homework & project completion, along with subject-specific criteria. This data will be collected and used to assess students' teamwork skills, organizational skills, work habits, initiative, and ability to work independently.
