W elcome to this year's final edition of the Bur Oak Secondary School newsletter. I am sad to say this will be my last newsletter as principal of Bur Oak Secondary School. I will be transferring to Aurora High School in September. It has been a wonderful five years at Bur Oak Secondary School and I have seen our school grow into active, caring and highly productive community partner.

Some of this years highlights include:

Our ensembles competed at the Kiwanis Music Festival of Greater Toronto, where we received 7 First Place Awards (with 3 Platinum Ratings and 4 Gold Awards), as well as 1 invitation to compete at the Provincial Finals. We also found success at York Region Music Alive Festival, where our groups received 5 Platinum Ratings, 2 Gold Rating and 7 invitations to the National Finals.

Events this fall also included: Our Bossilicious "Welcome Back to School" barbeque, the School Dance and the Winter Assembly. Grade 10 students had a wonderful opportunity to learn about possible future careers through our annual Careers Day. This year we had 23 professionals from the community come and talk to our students about their respective career journeys.

This winter BOSS held its fourth annual Mental Health Day called "Unstuffed 3.0". Students had the opportunity to attend both workshop and wellness sessions. Students chose workshops from a variety of topics including relationships, personal identity and family issues. Wellness sessions included: yoga, running, reading, music and art appreciation, mindfulness and broomball.

Staff and students at BOSS continue to give generously of their time to support our local community with events like the Terry Fox Run, the Halloween Spookfest for younger children in our community, the Canadian Cancer Society Pink Ribbon day, Daffodil Drive, and the Winter Food Drive.

On June 28th, we hosted our annual Graduation ceremony to celebrate our 2017 graduating class. The 409 graduates included 270 Ontario Scholars and a number of scholarship recipients. Business

Another day at the office ... except, where is the office? Business continues to maintain its clear movement towards the real world that our students will be exposed to upon graduation. The department was able to repurpose an under-utilized space into an **Innovation Lab** where our Marketing Courses were held. Here, we turned mirrors into white boards, installed a new Smart Board, and continued to create prototypes with a **3D printer**. Students who were surveyed told us that the space was one of the best parts of their learning as it allowed them to get away from the traditional rows of desks and learn in a more relaxed environment.

The space became the new home for the **Entrepreneurship Club** where students from all subject areas were able to join together after school to create, innovate, and ideate their passions to see if they could generate a new business idea with the help of students with different but needed skills. Many of these students participated in the entrepreneurial movement that is sweeping the country by joining a two day boot camp on innovation. Two of the 12 finalist teams were from Bur Oak.

In a similar vein, two teams from our Grade 9 Introduction to Business Course were finalists in the **Dragons Nest.** Dragon's Nest is a program where students become entrepreneurs right in the classroom! The program is supported by business mentors, teachers, and companies Students are guided to create, develop, and launch, a real venture in class. Our teams' videos were selected for over 50 competitors and faced the panel at the Dragon's Nest Finale. The students were given prizes of free attendance to Basecamp, the innovation summer camp held at Ryerson.

Our faculty held a Financial Literacy Workshop for Grade 12s in conjunction with TD Bank. TD Bank paired up with ABC Canada to facilitate a workshop to educate grade 12's at BOSS on how to manage money, earn credit and save for the future. The business department will continue to run this workshop next year for younger grades as well since it was beneficial and popular with students in their ever-present needs for greater financial literacy.

As part of our Modern Learning initiative, the Business Department joined with English to create a shared experience related to investment, finance and writing skills. The two groups of students and teachers created an exercise around mitigation of corporate scandal. The combination of Business and English in a "who dunnit" type of exercise captured the imagination of students and teachers alike.

Finally, the Business Department continues to look for opportunities to bring new and relevant learning to its students through **Design Thinking** and other forms of creative and critical thinking. We feel that these approaches will give our students the best opportunities for success in this ever-changing landscape of the real world. And the office? Just down the hall ... first **app on the left!**

In Special Education...

Ur staff and students have had a busy and enriching year in Special Education with a variety of activities that have been valuable experiences for all.

This year in our community classes, students learned many life skills within the classroom and outside. Various trips and activities included the Magna Hoedown, SNAP basketball which was hosted at BOSS, eight weeks of swimming, the YSSN Mindfulness session and lots more! In the DD class, modern learning was a focus. Our students used virtual reality and took part in cross curricular integration with Ms. Wun and Ms. McKay's class where they were able to demonstrate their learning from the DD program and teach these skills to others. Work experience is an important part of the program where eight students are in the community participating in local businesses. Our Autism students also participated in work experience within the school and outside at Dollarama and Chapter 21. They learned life skills in the community as they went on weekly shopping trips and started hosting their monthly lunches for staff at BOSS.

In our Learning Strategies courses there was a continued focus on students developing a better understanding of their strengths, needs and their own Learning Disability in order to help them advocate for their learning. Our department was able to host the Grade 8 incoming Special Education students for a transition morning filled with orientation activities and information that will help make the transition to high school go smoothly.

Another invaluable experience was when the senior students had the opportunity to learn about accommodations available for Special Education students at post secondary education. Through a trip to Durham College and University of Ontario, the students engaged in workshops and tours of the facilities and learned the importance of self advocacy in these new contexts.

This year has had many positive experiences for our students and we look forward to bringing enriching opportunities to ensure their success. Our department also continues to work with community agencies and services to support students and their families.

Science Success

t's been busy in the Science department this semester!

Science Club: Our science club executive was busy planning engaging and exciting activities for our club members. Students participated in a variety of science experiments including growing their own crystals, dissections and a Science Amazing Race. Our club also was busy fundraising for the **Multiple Sclerosis Society of Canada**. Through the annual carnation campaign, our students raised **\$780**. These efforts lead to our most successful campaign yet at BOSS. This commitment to our local community is outstanding!

Science Competitions: This semester was busy with a variety of science competitions. The grade 10 Michael Smith Challenge was written by 22 of our junior students with Mahyer Tajeri finishing in the top 3% in Canada! The University of Toronto Biology Contest was a great success as well with three of our students finishing in the top 8% of all global participants. Vishva Shah achieved the highest ranking at BOSS and scored in the 94.7th percentile, followed by Maggi Zhao (94.3rd percentile) and Saif Rjaibi (93.3rd percentile). The Chem13 News & Avogadro, University of Waterloo Competitions also saw an impressive turn out of participants this year. Congratulations to Li Jiang, Maggie Zhao, Justin Zhong and Saif Rjaibi. These grade 12s scored within the 80th percentile. Grade 11 chemistry contest writers also had outstanding results. David Yin scored 8th in Markham! Phillip Pham, William Li, Niveetha Wijendran, Ainely Pena, Felicia Kwanci and Alice Shin all scored within the 80th percentile. Li Jiang scored 34th in the world in the University of Waterloo, Sir Isaac Newton Physics Exam. Congratulations to all of our participants and for those who achieved outstanding results. You have made your teachers very proud!

Science Olympics: This year two junior and two senior teams competed at the annual YRDSB Science Olympics. This highly competitive event draws the best science students from around the region to compete in a variety of biology, chemistry and physics tasks. Our passionate and dedicated students spent several months preparing for this competition and certainly came out on top! They won the **gold medal** for the highly coveted spirit award due to their sportsmanship and enthusiasm. Collectively, our senior teams won a **silver medal** in their combined efforts in the chemistry challenge. Our senior B team (**Saif Rjaibi, Dhruv Patel, Thomas Kean, Jacob Yu and Jason Cao**) won the top prize of the day - the Overall **Gold Medal** in biology, chemistry and physics. This is an incredible accomplishment. Congratulations to all team members!

Guidance at Bur Oak

he Bur Oak guidance department continues to be a very busy place as we attempt to provide ongoing support to students, parents/guardians and staff. This year has been no exception as we attempted to:

- Assist students to become independent decision makers
- Provide resources and information regarding mental health, pathway planning and goal setting
- Track students community hours and their academic progress to enable them to graduate with a sense of personal accomplishment
- Celebrate success through special events and incentives
- Make connections with parents/guardians and students to support personal and academic needs
- Help students to engage in individual pathway planning
- Connect students with additional supports when needed

We encourage families to connect with us online, to read our regular updates in the weekly parent newsletter, to visit the Guidance portion of the school website and to contact us in person. We further suggest that families look forward to evening sessions for parents and guardians. We will provide more information through the weekly parent bulletin that comes with the weekly attendance. **Connect with your community by volunteering in the summer months**

Students are encouraged to be involved in the community at all times of the year. Since there are many weeks for vacation time, we challenge students to do something to support their community. It is important that if these volunteering opportunities are to be counted towards Community Hours required for graduation that students think about the eligibility of the activity. A good rule is to check to see if the organization is "not for profit". Activities should not include things for which there should be payment. If in doubt, check the board website.

Current grade 9s can work towards their "40-9ers" certificate. The deadline for submitting hours to be counted towards this certificate is the second week of September. Did you know that over 150 grade 9 students received this certificate this year? Grade 10 and 11 students should also look for opportunities to increase their employability skills as well as finishing their hours.

Upcoming events for the fall months

Each semester, we have an Awards Ceremony for students who have been awarded with subject awards for this past semester. It is a wonderful experience to share success with families, staff and students.

Grade 12 students begin their final journey to transitioning out of high school into the world of work, apprenticeships or post secondary schooling. We begin to support students from the beginning of the semester with upcoming important dates, resources, personalized meetings, special presentations and visits to Bur Oak from many of the schools which could be considered for the future. Suffice to say, the BOSS community should be proud of our successes.

This year was no different as we selected a focus - the war in Syria and the local and global impact of the conflict - and got to work. Regardless of our particular focus for the year, we always maintain our support of Free The Children (FTC), so we donated \$400 to FTC earlier in the year. After our successful Holiday Raffle, we donated \$1,100 to Lifeline Syria to support its work with refugees living in Toronto. Later in the year, we were fortunate to have a visit with a refugee from Syria who shared details of his experience working with children in the camps in Lebanon for displaced Syrians as well as the personal journey he undertook to come to Canada. The insight he offered was really valuable as was his recommendation of a grassroots organization working on education projects with Syrian children in these camps. As a result, we were able to donate \$900 to Basmeh and Zeitooneh, a non-profit working directly with children. We were also able to make a \$300 donation to Free The Children to maintain our commitment to the projects championed by this tremendous Canadian charitable organization.

Computer Studies Department

In extracurricular activities, the Computer Studies department started a new afterschool initiative called BreezeCode. This event was geared at introducing junior female students to the exciting world of Computer Science. A series of student-led seminars, run by senior female students, Jenny Ho, Willa Kong, Julia Ren and Aalea Ally, taught younger female students how to create JavaScript programs and Mobile games. On the final week, the group was joined by parent volunteer, Ms. Sud, a professional programmer who shared her wealth of experiences and provide guidance and motivation for these future coders.

Geography: Where It's At!

Geography, by its nature, is an exploration of motion and change. This year the Department of Geography and Environmental Studies at Bur Oak Secondary School has continued to provide students with innovative and refreshing options for exploring our world.

This year, we were excited to offer two courses to our senior students: Spatial Technologies in Action (Geomatics: CGO 4M) and Forces of Nature (Physical processes and Disasters: CGF 3M). These courses are typically offered on alternating years and it has been a while since they have had enough student interest to run. We will also be offered Travel and Tourism (CGG 3O) and our premier course World Issues (CGW 4U/C).

Additionally, in keeping with the York Region District School Board's three foci of mathematics, modern learning and mental health and wellness, our department was able to make use of virtual reality equipment for viewing the world from a different perspective. The VR equipment has been an exciting addition which students have been eager to try out. Several classes have worked on collaborative projects with the computer science department, modern languages, social studies and history.

In terms of Mental Health, Geography continues to make use of field studies to both deepen the understanding of geographical concepts and enrich our wellness. The senior courses we able to take advantage of a flight over York Region in Cessna airplanes (CGO 4M), hiking at the edge of the Niagara Escarpment (CGF 3M), visiting WholeFoods Food Market and a local farm/maple sugar bush, and visiting the Toronto Zoo (CGG 3O). Students in World Issues (CGW 4U) were treated to a guest lecture from world renowned conflict studies professor Dr. Gwynne Dyer and were offered an opportunity to participate in a national global solutions symposium wherein they proposed meaningful solutions to some of the world's worst challenges.

Finally, the Department of Geography and Environmental Studies is in a time of change as it welcomes Mr. Carnevale as the interim subject head as Mr. Hurlington take a leave of absence to work on his doctoral degree.
