LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

We affirm that we are all treaty people and acknowledge that the York Region District School Board is located on the lands of two treaties. These treaties have been signed with the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation and the First Nations of the Williams Treaties who are: the Mississaugas of Alderville, Curve Lake, Hiawatha, Scugog Island; and the Chippewas of Beausoleil, Rama, and Georgina Island who is our closest neighbour and partner in education.

To honour this agreement we will take up our responsibility to be respectful of their traditions, knowledge and inherent rights as sovereign nations. We will respect their relationship with these lands and recognize that our connection to this land is through the continued relationship with these First Nations, and we acknowledge our shared responsibility to respect and care for the land and waters for future generations.

Culminating Activity Days

With the recent Ministry of Education and Public Health announcements, adjustments to the end of the semester are required to better support student achievement. As communicated earlier, final exams have been cancelled. Courses may still require the completion of culminating activities. The days that would traditionally have been used for exams, will be used for culminating activities (e.g., presentations, performances, demonstrations, portfolios, conversations, credit salvaging and conferencing). REQUEST FOR LEARNING MODEL CHANGE

The Ministry of Education has announced that students will be returning to face-to-face learning on Monday, January 17, 2022. As mentioned in our last communication, we are providing families with an opportunity to change learning models that will take effect January 17, 2022. This model change will be in effect to the end of June 2022. Families and students who are over the age of 18, wishing to make a learning model change, need to complete the Bur Oak SS – <u>Request for Learning</u> <u>Model Change Form</u>.

Those families who wish to switch their learning model for Semester 2, which begins Monday, February 7, 2022, will need to complete the Bur Oak SS – <u>Request for Learning Model</u> <u>Change Form</u> again. The form will close on Monday, February 14, 2022. Those wishing to make a change after February 14th will need to contact the school directly.

Please note that remote learning will not be approved to support vacation requests. If your request is NOT approved, you will be contacted. Requests can take up to 24 hours to process.

ATTENDANCE

Temporary Remote Learning CAN be requested for students who are absent from face to face learning with short term illness related to COVID 19.

Temporary Remote Learning CANNOT be requested for students who are absent with short term illness unrelated to COVID 19.

When reporting your child's absence, please include the following information in your message:

- 1. Child's name
- 2. Student number
- 3. Absence due to COVID 19:

If YES, may request remote learning for 5 or 10 days based on vaccination status. Please note that this is an option for your child if they are able to access learning remotely.

If NO, may NOT request remote learning and child will be marked absent.

Please read and review the letter in the BARK that provides York Region Public Health guidance and information.

Semester Two Course Changes

Course Change Requests Starting January 31st

From Monday January 31st until further notice, the Guidance Department will be closing appointment calendars. Should students wish to request a course change for Semester Two, please note the following:

Starting 8:15 am on January 31st students will be able to access a Change Request Form at <u>bit.ly/BOSScourses</u>

• Students must log in using their own GAPPS Account to make this request.

• Students should review course offerings by period located on the <u>Bur</u> <u>Oak Website</u>

• Once completed, parent/guardian will receive an email with instructions to confirm approval of request. Without receiving this, we cannot proceed with reviewing the file

• Parent/guardians are asked to check Junk/Spam folders in case the notification is filtered by your email provider

• Currently many classes are full and there are cases with Wait Lists already with students in line. Many changes will not be able to be made due to limitations of available space.

• Counsellors will inform students the status of their request via email once the request has been processed. Students are expected to attend all scheduled classes as listed until a verification of new schedule is provided to them by email

Due to the overwhelming number of requests, we kindly request that families refrain from requesting updates through email, phone or in person updates during this period. We will only be meeting with students to tend to urgent matters unrelated to the status of their courses for Semester Two.

We will open our calendars as quickly as possible to meet students. Please be patient and thank you for your understanding.



Message from Our Trustee Allan Tam

Dear families,

Thank you for your patience and support as schools closed to students and we moved to remote learning in January for two weeks after the winter break, following direction from the Government of Ontario.

It has been almost two years since the pandemic was declared and schools closed to students for the first time. Since then, we have all experienced significant changes and challenges in the way we live, work and learn. As a school board, we continue to be guided by public health advice and guidelines, our <u>values</u> as an organization and the goals set out in our <u>Multi-Year Strategic Plan</u>, all of which centre the well-being, learning and achievement of our students. We remain committed to sharing information with you as it becomes available. We also continue to update the Board website with resources and information, at <u>www.yrdsb.ca/school-reopening</u>.

On the website, you can also find information about the <u>Board of Trustees</u>, including more about my role as your trustee, committee meeting dates, and information about public participation and how you can attend public board meetings. Following <u>a review</u> completed earlier this year, trustees approved some changes to <u>committee structures</u> and <u>delegation process</u> to create a stronger governance model. As a Board, we are committed to good governance, serving the needs of our community and upholding the values of York Region District School Board.

With winter well underway, I want to remind families that this year <u>schools will close</u> <u>when an inclement weather day is declared</u>. This is as a result of the pandemic and the importance of adhering to public health guidelines.

There is much to look forward to in the months ahead.

This month, students in Grades 5 to 11 will have an opportunity to vote for the students who will represent their voices next school year, during the student trustee elections. Student trustees play an important role in our system, including participating in board and committee meeting discussions. The election process also gives students an opportunity to learn more about and participate in the voting process. Learn more at <u>www.yrdsb.ca/studenttrustees</u>.

Throughout February, we recognize Black History Month. In addition to recognizing the contributions of Black Canadians throughout history, we are continuing to Celebrate Black Excellence in our own community. I encourage you to <u>read or watch the stories</u> <u>of some of the many outstanding individuals in York Region, or nominate someone.</u> You may also be interested in some of the episodes available on our <u>TuneIn YRDSB</u> <u>podcast</u>, exploring Black History Month and beyond.

Later in February, our schools will become a sea of pink as we acknowledge Pink Shirt Day and stand together against bullying. Learn more about our work to <u>prevent and</u> <u>address bullying</u> and create <u>equitable and inclusive learning environments</u>.

Family Day and March Break are also approaching, and I wish you and your families a healthy, restful and enjoyable break.

As we move closer to the spring and summer months, many families who have children graduating this year are beginning to wonder what graduation ceremonies will look like in June. We all want to be able to celebrate this important milestone with our graduating students in person. It is a special occasion, recognizing their years of achievement and hard work. We recognize that it has been deeply disappointing to students, families and staff that we have not been able to hold in-person ceremonies as we have done in the past, as we adhere to health and safety guidelines. School board staff continue to meet regularly with public health and to review provincial guidelines, and as more information becomes available, we will continue to provide you with updates.

In closing, I want to acknowledge that as an education community, although we have faced many challenges and changes in the past few years, we have also seen our community come together in many ways to support our students and one another. I am proud to be part of this community and I want to thank our students, families and staff for the effort and care they have demonstrated.




