

- Seek advice → talk to teachers, guidance counsellors, parents/guardians






# Use the Tools in My Blueprint to Help You Learn and Plan



# Tracking your Graduation Requirements


Students can track all of their graduation requirements in My Blueprint by looking at the "Graduation Indicator" at the top right of their high school plan:

# Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT)

- Evaluates reading and writing expectations up to and including grade 9
- If you have not written the OSSLT yet or if you were not successful, you can write it this April.
- If not successful, you will have another opportunity to write in the fall or you may decide to take the Ontario Literacy Course (OLC4O).

NOTE: Students can only take OLC4O after they have had

2 opportunities to write the OSSLT

If you are not sure about your plan for completing the Ontario Literacy requirement, see your guidance counsellor.

# Community Involvement

- Have you finished your 40 hours?
- Why do this?
  - Encourages civic responsibility
  - Promotes community values
  - Reinforces importance of volunteerism
  - Volunteer experiences can be included on a resume, post-secondary application, or scholarship application
- You are responsible for keeping records of activities. Forms available in the Guidance Office and online.
- Submit completed forms to the Guidance Office
- Recommendation: Finish your hours by the end of Grade 10

NOTE: Guidance only tracks up to the <u>required 40 hours</u>. If you do more than 40 hours, you need to keep your own records.



# Online Learning Requirement



- Students are required to complete at least 2 online learning credits
- Courses available in grades 11 and 12
- Students can opt out of this requirement with parental permission.
- Opting out can be done during course selection
- If a student opts out, there is <u>no impact</u> on their graduation or post-secondary status.

# 12 Elective Credits

# An opportunity for students to:

- Build skills
- Balance workload and/or increase mental well being
- Explore interests
- Build an educational program that suits their individual interests and personal pathway
- Plan for post-secondary requirements

In grade 11, students have a lot more choice in terms of the courses they take. More choices require more careful and thoughtful planning!

# Course Types/Levels in Grade 11 & 12

- Course types/levels in grade 11 and 12 are different than in grade 9 and 10. In grade 11 and 12, the course types/levels are destination-based:
  - University (U)
  - College (C)
  - College/University (M)
  - Workplace (E)
  - o Open (O)
- Students need to think carefully when selecting course types/levels for grade 11 courses. Consider:
  - Academic strengths and challenges
  - Work habits
  - Pathways plan and prerequisites needed for gr 12 courses
  - Recommendations of subject teachers
  - Recommend 70% minimum in an academic course in grade 10 to take the U-level course in grade 11

## Course Types/Levels for Grade 11 English

#### Grade 11 English

- The English course for grade 11 is called English:
   Understanding Contemporary First Nations, Métis and Inuit Voices. This course emphasizes the development of literacy, critical thinking, and communication skills through an Indigenous lens.
- Students will need to choose one of the following compulsory English courses:
  - College NBE3C1
  - University NBE3U1
  - Workplace NBE3E1.

NOTE: Applying to any Bachelor's Degree program at a university or college requires University-level English.

## Course Types/Levels for Grade 11 Math

#### Grade 11 Math

- There are 5 levels of Math to choose from (see prerequisite chart on next slide):
  - College (MBF3C1)
  - University (MCR3U1)
  - College/University or "Mixed" (MCF3M1)
  - Workplace (MEL3E1)
  - Advanced Placement (MCR3UE) speak to your Math
     Teacher if you are considering AP

**NOTE:** Some other subjects have both College (C) and University (U) options (e.g. Science, Computer Science, Social Sciences, Canadian and World Studies, etc.)

Remember to consider what is needed for your post-secondary pathway when choosing types/levels for your courses, as well as your strengths, challenges and work habits.

# Important Things to Remember when Selecting Grade II Courses

- Grade 11 students must select <u>8 courses</u> and <u>3 alternates</u>.
   Students cannot have a spare until they have earned 24 credits.
- Students who select repertoire (band or choir) will have 9 courses. DO NOT select a 9th course unless you are taking repertoire
- Students need to carefully consider what courses they need to take, and what types/levels they need. Consider:
  - Strengths, challenges and interests
  - Grade 11 prerequisites required for grade 12 courses
  - Graduation requirements that still need to be completed
  - Post-secondary requirements
  - Take courses you enjoy and that allow you to have a balanced timetable
  - Try new courses that you are interested in exploring further

# Course Selection Strategy for Grade 11

#### Prerequisite planning → Design backwards!

Start thinking about and researching potential post-secondary pathways and think about ...

- What courses do I need in grade 12?
- What prerequisites do I need in grade 11 so that I can take the courses I need in grade 12?

# Course Selection Strategy for Grade 11

#### Get out of the passenger's seat!

Many students ...

- Select courses without any thought or research (rock, paper, scissors approach)
- Take courses that they THINK they need
- Listen to other people without considering other options
- Believe "myths" about post secondary destinations.
   Make sure to double check the things you hear!

Put yourself in the DRIVER'S SEAT and consider options that show flexible thinking and creative pathway planning, and DO YOUR RESEARCH!!

# Course Selection Strategy for Grade 11

#### Consider Experiential Learning Opportunities!

Students have experiential learning options available to them in grade 11 and 12:

#### Cooperative Education

- Combines classroom theory with practical experiences in the workplace
- Strengthen employability skills and gain work experience
- Earn credits while exploring opportunities

Make sure to join the co-op google classroom and complete the co-op application if you select co-op!!

- OYAP (Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program) Develop knowledge and skills by doing a co-op placement in the skilled trades
- SHSM see next slide



SHSM is a specialized program that allows students to focus their learning on a specific sector. Bur Oak SS offers 3 sectors:

- Business
- Energy
- Health and Wellness

Students who are enrolled in a SHSM sector have the opportunity to:

- Earn sector-related certifications
- Participate in experiential learning opportunities specific to their sector
- Earn a "Red Seal" on their diploma to indicate that they completed the SHSM program

All students who enroll in SHSM **must take co-op** and need to take certain sector-specific courses. Please see your guidance counselor for more information.



# New for 2025-2026

## High Performance Athlete (HPA)

The High Performance Athlete (HPA) program is an option for students competing at the **provincial**, **national and/or international level in eligible sports.** It is designed to provide high performing student-athletes with timetable support to enable them to attend their regular training and compete during times that would typically conflict with otherwise-regular academic programming.

Student-athletes who compete at the provincial, national, or international level in a qualifying sport may be eligible to enrol in up to two Day School Online Courses during the school year.

There are **strict requirements** to be part of the HPA program. Please speak to your guidance counsellor before selecting HPA courses.

# OYAP Focussed Apprenticeship Skills Training (OYAP-FAST)

The Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program Focused Apprenticeship Skills Training (OYAP-FAST) allows students in Grades 11 and 12 to participate in more apprenticeship learning through additional cooperative education credits while completing their OSSD. Students who complete this program will receive an OYAP Focused Apprenticeship Skills Training Diploma.

To participate, students must meet the OYAP eligibility requirements:

- Be at least 15 years of age or older
- Have completed 14 credits toward the OSSD
- Be enrolled as a part-time or full-time student in a secondary school or continuing education program
- Complete an OYAP Participation Form during a cooperative education placement in a skilled trade

# OYAP Focussed Apprenticeship Skills Training (OYAP-FAST)

To earn a OYAP Focused Apprenticeship Skills Training Diploma, students must:

- Have signed parent/guardian consent if the student is under 18 years old
- Earn 8 to 11 co-op credits with their placement component in the skilled trades
- Register as an apprentice by securing a Registered Training Agreement (RTA) before completing an eighth co-op education credit.
- Complete all OSSD requirements.

If you are interested in this program, speak to your guidance counsellor and add this course to your selections for next year.




# How to Select your Courses


Go to the <u>YRDSB website</u>, scroll down and click on "Online Student Tools".




Then scroll down and click on "My Pathway Planner".





Then, select "High School" from the menu on the left side of the page.






When you are on your high school plan, click the + Course button to add a course, or click on the "Courses" tab at the top of your high school plan.

Read the information, scroll through the available courses in the drop-down menu, and select the desired course. Then click "Add Course"


Students may select up to a maximum of 2 online learning courses per year in grade 11 and 12.

# Make sure to add alternates that you actually like!!

It is VERY IMPORTANT that you select your alternate courses with the same thought and care that you put into choosing your other courses.

We will use these courses if there is a conflict when we are building your timetable.

We are asking all students to select <u>3</u> <u>alternate courses.</u>



# If you are considering Summer School

- Registration for summer school courses will happen in <u>April.</u> We do not know which courses will be offered until then.
- In April: Listen for announcements and check for messages on the guidance google classroom about summer school registration.
- If you are thinking about taking a course in summer school, <u>you still MUST choose it</u> on your course selection as <u>summer</u> school is not guaranteed.
- Please give us a heads up if you are considering summer school by filling out the google form at <u>bit.ly/BOSSsummerplan</u>. This form is also available on My Blueprint under "Course Selection Resources"



#### Review Course Selections

This will take you to a new screen where you can review your course selections. Please note:

Once you are sure you are happy with your courses, click "Submit Course Selections".



After submission, make sure to check your messages in My Blueprint. We will send back your submission if there is an issue.

# Parent/Guardian Approval

You will be prompted to provide an email address for your parent/guardian. They will be sent an email listing the courses you selected. Your parent/guardian must approve your courses. Your guidance counsellor will not approve your course selection if it is not approved by your parent/guardian. Check messages in My Blueprint for any concerns from your guidance counsellor.

# Important Reminders

- ★ Students must select <u>8 courses</u> and <u>3 alternates</u>
  - Students who select Repertoire (Band or Choir) will have <u>9</u>
     <u>courses</u>. DO NOT select a 9th course if you are not taking repertoire.
- ★ Select alternates that you like and would be willing to take!
- ★ You may choose a combination of course levels: university, college, college/university, workplace, open. Your plan should be personalized to YOUR strengths, interests and pathway plans.
- ★ Make sure you have the grade 11 courses you need as prerequisites for the grade 12 courses required for your post-secondary plan.
- ★ Make sure you have a plan to complete all compulsory courses.

REMEMBER: The choices you make will determine which courses we are able to run. There is very little flexibility to change courses later as our school is VERY FULL!!
