

- Many students <u>will not move</u> in a linear pathway from high school to a specific post secondary program and then to a specific job
- It will be a journey with a series of decisions
- Many occupations have not been "created" yet
- Workplace is evolving and self discovery of the ideal job is increasing

Student's options for continuing education

- Foundation programs or Pre programs (1 year)
- Diploma programs (2 years)
- Advanced diploma (3 years)
- Degree programs (3 or 4 years)
- Bridging programs from college to university
- Transfer programs between both colleges and universities
- Collaborative or Joint programs (diploma and degree)
- Graduate Certificates (1 to 2 years)

New face of Degree Programs

Degree through University	Degree through College
4 years Bachelor Degree	4 year specialized Bachelor Degree; some called Applied to indicate practical component
Requires six grade 12U or 12M courses	Requires six grade 12U or 12M courses
Theoretical	Theoretical plus practical
Coop available in some programs	Coop, work experience, internship available in all programs

Do your research first, select your school after!

Bad Idea #1:

Select the school and then figure out if there is a program you can apply for

Bad Idea #2:

Select the school and then research what you need as a prerequisite

Bad Idea #3:

Listen to other people about what you need to do rather than finding out yourself

Bad Idea #4:

Only have one plan in mind--keep your fingers crossed!

Suggested questions for parents and students

- What credential am I looking for?
- What schools offer this program or area of interest?
- What prerequisite courses do I need to take?
- What are the policies on repeated, failed courses or courses taken outside of day school?
- What is the "overall average" to be eligible?
- What other things do I need to include in my application?
