### The Junior and Senior Concert Bands at the OBA Festival

## **Tips For Reading Comprehension**

- Go back and reread.
- Read ahead to clarify meaning.
- Identify what it is you don't understand: a word, a sentence or a concept/big idea
- If it is a word read beyond it and see if the meaning is clarified or think about the text and infer what the word may be about
- If it is a sentence in a picture book, look at the pictures
- Keep sticky notes with you as you read, write down any questions that come to your mind as you read, write down any connections that you make

### March Math Tips...

Selecting Tools and Computational Strategies is one of the Mathematical Processes Expectations outlined in the Ontario Math Curriculum Document. Also outlined in the document is the following:


Students should be encouraged to select and use concrete learning tools to make models of mathematical ideas. Students need to understand that making their own models is a powerful means of building understanding and explaining their thinking to others. Using manipulatives to construct representations helps students to:

- see patterns and relationships;
- make connections between the concrete and the abstract;
- test, revise, and confirm their reasoning;
- remember how they solved a problem;
- communicate their reasoning to others

<u>www.mathies.ca</u> is site designed for students and parents with various virtual learning tools (manipulatives). This site can be accessed for free and students can use tools similar to those used in a classroom when completing homework tasks and/or reviewing concepts. In addition to the tools are also games and parent support information.

While our students had a day away from the school, our staff were exploring new ways to approach the math curriculum using manipulatives and inquiry based learning. Together, they were able to see math problems from the perspective of the student and the struggles they may face when solving math problems. ### **INTERNET SAFETY NEWS**

### **ROBLOX: AN INTERNET GAME OF CONCERN**

The Canadian Centre for Child Protection wants to make parents aware of concerns in a popular gaming environment called Roblox. It is a user-generated gaming environment where children are encouraged to create adventures using their avatar, play games and connect with friends in this multiplayer environment that claims to have over 44 million active users.

The Canadian Centre's **Cybertip.ca** program (you can sign up for **Cybertip.ca** alerts) has received a number of reports concerning Roblox and its chat content. Parents should be on the alert with any app or site that offers direct messaging chat features.

Through the chat feature, children can easily be exposed to inappropriate conversations or redirected to inappropriate content on other sites. Before your child starts playing a particular game, explore it yourself first. See if there is an interactive (chat) component in the game. Is this an optional feature that can be turned off? Are there other optional features that can be turned off or on to improve safety? Does the game allow for a way to report inappropriate activity? Does an online search of the app or game find media articles that involve child safety-related concerns?

### We highly recommend parents teach their children to:

- ⇒ Check with you before using new apps/games or sharing any information online. At this age, online interactions should always be supervised by a parent or safe adult.
- $\Rightarrow$  Not respond or click on messages or links from someone they don't know.

- ⇒ Tell you if they come across something or someone while playing an online game that makes them feel uncomfortable and that they can tell you without fear of getting in trouble.
- ⇒ Ask your permission before ever accepting a request from another gamer to move over to a video chatting site or other chat platform.
