Thank you for your continued support and encouragement. Together, our efforts will ensure David Suzuki P.S. remains a school of excellence!



#### **Public Health Immunization**

In the 2017/18 school year, York Region Public Health will visit all elementary schools to provide school immunization clinics to Grade 7 students. The clinics offer vaccines for Hepatitis B, Human Papilloma Virus (HPV) and Meningococcal A, C, Y, W-135 at no cost.

Under the Immunization of School Pupils Act, meningococcal vaccine is required for school attendance, unless an exemption is filed with public health. Hepatitis B and HPV vaccines are recommended, but not required for school attendance.

Parents of students entering Grade 7 in fall 2017 will receive consent forms in the mail in June. Please complete the consent form and return it to York Region Public Health to allow your child to participate in the immunization clinics. Detailed instructions can be found on the forms and accompanying letter. If the consent form is not completed, your child will not be able to receive vaccines at the clinic.

Parents and guardians who do not consent should still complete the forms and return them, indicating that you do not authorize York Region Public Health to immunize your child.



If your child has missed a required vaccination on Ontario's routine immunization schedule, he/she can receive the vaccine at one of York Region Public Health's Community Immunization Clinics. These evening clinics are offered throughout the summer, giving students the opportunity to catch up before returning to school. #### **CURRICULUM CORNER**

#### **Developing Mathematical Thinking**



Solving word problems require more than just math. It is more than just reading the words. Students must learn to "read between the lines" and understand what they are expected to do mathematically.

The Ministry document What Works? Research into Practice: Word Problems explains to teachers and parents how to approach word problems with our students.

Below are a few suggestions from the document to support students' understanding of word problems.

- 1. Encourage students to compare two problems with different scenarios/situations but the same math concept.
- 2. Discuss the language used in the problems and how it relates to the math task.
- 3. Encourage students to edit word problems given to make it more understandable or more realistic.
- 4. Ask students to create and solve word problems relating to events in their lives.

For the last two suggestions, it is important to have some discussion of how the students' word problems are created and which parts of the students' experience and/or curriculum are important when solving these problems.

#### **GRADE 8 GRADUATION TRIP**








## **SCIENTISTS IN SCHOOLS**

They used a real thermometer to explore the effect of color on heat absorption and built a pinwheel that used renewable energy. This day was enjoyed by students and teachers.





#### **SCIENTISTS IN SCHOOLS**

On Tuesday, May 22, Mrs.Gertsakis's Grade 1 class had scientists in the school. We learned about solar energy. At one of the centres we had to shine a light on cars and bugs that had solar panels to make them move. At that centre we even had to connect wires to a solar panel and the other side was connected to a spinner, a radio, and a light. Then we had to shine a light on the solar panel to make the things work. At another centre we had to find ways to save electricity. We even played a game called power out. In power out the volunteer has to take a card. The card has a question and the volunteer has to read it out loud. The card might say for example: the power is out what are you going to do to entertain yourself? Then we have to answer it. At another centre we had to see which shirt keeps you warmer the black or the white. The black one keeps you warmer. Next we made bubbles. At the next centre we made pinwheels out of straws, beads, paper, and a pin. Then we did a fishing activity. Each fish had something on it and we had to sort them. The square basket was for renewable things and the circle basket was for non-renewable things. At the last centre we made a sun survival chain and learned about UV rays. At the end we got bracelets with beads that capture UV rays and if UV rays hit it will change color. We learned a lot. We had fun.

# **Our Inquiry on Chicks and Ducks**



During the months of April and May our Kindergarten students had the wonderful opportunity to raise and care for chicks and ducks. The students engaged in rich conversations amongst their peers by utilizing the processes of an inquiry stance which included questioning, observing and investigating the animals.

Raising the farm animals allowed students to expand their learning in many aspects. They developed the important life skills of turn taking, cooperation and caring for living things. Students also learned about the life cycle and engaged in conversations about the growth and changes they observed over the past several weeks. Students particularly enjoyed observing how the chicks and ducks used their egg tooth and bodies to break out of their shells. Students loved feeding, holding and watching the animals use their physical characteristics (e.g., webbed feet, wings) to adapt to their new surroundings.


