School Improvement Planning for Student Achievement & Well-Being

Education Quality and Accountability Office



At David Suzuki P.S., we use various sources of data to monitor how we are doing in terms of student achievement and well-being. One of the data sources we've recently taken the opportunity to analyze is the EQAO data from last Spring. A team of teachers looked closely at the data to determine specifically how our students performed related to Literacy, Math and some attitudinal data.

Our students did well in Math in the areas of Data Management, Number Sense and Numeration and Geometry. One of the areas where we recognize a relative weakness is in Measurement. This is true across both Grades 3 and 6. Some ways families can support math learning at home by:

- Including your child in everyday activities with a number of steps.
- Playing games and do puzzles that involve number, geometric and measurement patterns and relationships.
- Solving problems with your child, and talk about the different ways each can be solved.
- Having your child explain why he or she has chosen to solve a problem in a particular way.
- Encouraging your child to see that math is everywhere (e.g. grocery store)!
- Highlighting how we use math all of the time (cooking, pumping gas).
- Encouraging your child to see that all areas of math are related (e.g. number sense & measurement are connected).
- Encouraging a growth mindset around math we are all mathematicians!
- Letting your child know that you think mathematics is important.

When we look more closely at the students' performance in reading, we notice that one of the areas that persists as a challenge is making connections. This skill requires children to connect and draw on experiences with different texts, in real life and across curriculum areas. Some ways families can support literacy at home are to:

- Engage regularly in conversations that encourage responses beyond yes and no answers.
- Express and share opinions and encourage your child to support his/her ideas by using language of reasoning.
- Respond to texts (books, movies, shows) with your child through evaluative conversations to foster deeper comprehension.

Using the analysis of the EQAO data in conjunction with classroom assessments, we are able to recognize areas of strength and need within our school. As educators, we use this information to inform our School Improvement Plan for Student Achievement and Well-Being. This is the tool we use to help determine areas for professional learning as a staff. Moving forward we will be participating in professional learning in the areas of Math and Literacy.

Children who turn four or five years old during 2017, live within the school boundary and whose parents are public school tax supporters will be eligible to register for kindergarten. - Birth Verification of student, which may include, but not limited to, birth certificate; statement of birth; birth registration; refugee claimant form; permanent resident card; confirmation of permanent residence (not application for); baptismal certificate; passport; citizenship card; First Nation, Métis, Inuit ancestry; record of landing; substitute registration of birth or adoption; or other Ontario government-sanctioned document approved by the superintendent of schools
- Custody/Adoption documentation if applicable
- Proof of Residency of the student two documents, one from each of the categories below showing the home address;
 - ⇒ Category A notice of tax assessment, current rental/lease agreement, agreement to purchase including proof of purchase provided before the pupil attends the school, or property tax bill,
 - ⇒ Category B—utility bill, bank statement or driver's license

French Immersion Information Sessions and Registrations



Information sessions for the French Immersion (FI) program will take place at French Immersion schools on January 19, 2017 at 7 p.m. Please visit <u>YRDSB's website</u> in January 2017 (to find the FI program location for David Suzuki Public School. FI registration will begin January 20, 2017. Parents or guardians of Senior Kindergarten students entering Grade 1 in 2017, and wishing to enroll in the FI Program, can visit or call the school office and request an *Office Index Card - short version*. The Office Index Card must be signed by the principal of the home school. Parents or guardians

then take this form, along with one piece of identification showing their address to the designated FI program location to register between January 20 and February 10, 2017. This eliminates the need to provide duplicate enrollment information or to pre-register.

YRDSB's FI Accommodation Plan provides long-term consistency and equity of access to all students in York Region and will enable YRDSB to continue to offer the FI program to all who wish to enrol. The FI program will be offered in Dual Track or Single Track settings, in a variety of configurations. In order to meet community needs and optimize available space in our schools, a community's Grade 1-8 FI program may be provided over more than one school during the course of a student's FI education. This will allow flexibility in addressing community needs and the opportunity to use existing space in schools. More information is available on the <u>Board's website</u>. Please note: Some of the FI accommodation plans will require facility modifications or the development of new schools and will require short-term transition plans that might include overflow while we work toward the long-term vision. Overflow refers to situations in which the Board directs students to attend a school other than their community school or optional program for a specific period of time, as defined in Policy #108.

French Immersion Information Nights will take place at all French Immersion school locations offering a Grade 1 program on January 19, 2017 at 7 p.m.

Grade 7 Milne Outdoor Conservation Trip



Throughout the two days of December 5th and 6th, both grade seven classes had the opportunity to visit Milne Outdoor Conservation Center and were able to learn about natural disasters and the effects on a person or place. The students worked together in a culminating task to gain a better understaning of various disasters and how the victims of these devastations are affected. As the day began, Ms.Wilson's class was introduced to the different natural disasters, and steps needed to organizing a community. Medical care, clean water, shelter, food, and communication would be necessary when rebuilding an area.

We were then taught the economic state and development of all places in the world, and what would happen if a random city was affected by a

tsunami or another natural disaster. For example, if Canada experienced an earthquake, we would have plenty of money to recreate our cities because of our high state of development. Approximately all citizens of Canada have an income of about \$64,000 per family per year. However, Kenya, for example, would not have much money due to their economic development, to rebuild their country after a natural disaster. As we took a look at all the countries of the world, we had to infer and ask questions about countries' income per family, student enrollment, and their economically developed state(high, medium, low, N/A).

As the day went on, our class was divided into teams in which we had a specific country as a guide during our group scavenger hunt. The premise of the game was to collect all the items that would be needed during a natural disaster. Our



teachers, Ms.Poupart and Ms.Cory taught us a finger method when locating a specific part on our map. Many groups such as Nepal, Indonesia, and Uzbekistan found this part easy, but when the shelter building task was introduced, many teams got a low ranked mark. In addition, each team was given ropes, poles, and tarps based on the rank of their countries development. Low ranked countries were given more essentials since that country would need it more at that time of need. After each team's tent was

complete, the teachers would give them a mark based on its sturdiness and whether or not it could withstand another aftershock if another natural disaster were to occur.

As a whole, I believe our entire class was given the outstanding opportunity to learn about the development and economic state of various countries. This advantage has not only affected myself, but all my classmates in the sense that if teamwork and diligence is applied to a task during a devastating time, the entire country can be re-joined once again by the working hands of all citizens.
