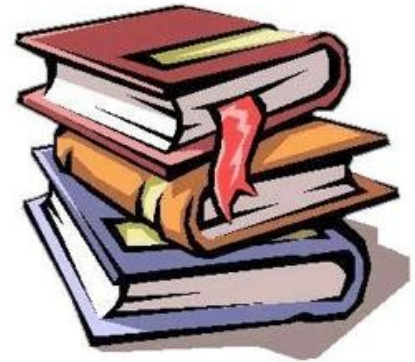
Curriculum Corner - Lifelong Readers

Learning to read is a complex process. In addition to developing decoding skills and strategies, it is important to understand the purpose of reading as an integral part of our lives. We want our students to become readers who:

- Read voluntarily and often
- Read a wide variety of materials
- Read to become informed on a wide range of topics
- Collect books and refer to favourites again and again
- Recommend books to others
- Talk with others about what they read
- Reflect on their reading
- Think critically about what they read

(Fountas & Pinnell, 2001)

Essentially, we want our students to become lifelong readers!



To foster a love of reading at David Suzuki P.S., we have been participating in the *Forest of Reading* program sponsored by the Ontario Library Association. This is the largest recreational reading program of its kind in Canada and offers eight reading programs. Fiction and nonfiction lists of titles are chosen to celebrate Canadian books, publishers, authors, and illustrators.

The grade one's and two's have been thinking critically and having conversations about stories through the *Blue Spruce* program. We have been reading about colours, magnificent things, tall tales, and trips to far away places. In addition, a group of students in grades five to eight have been meeting at lunch on Wednesdays and Thursdays to read the *Silver Birch* and *Red Maple* titles. We are all excited to be part of the voting process to choose this year's winner.

To evaluate the stories we are reading and help us vote, we have developed the following list of criteria to identify what makes a good story:

- Characters we like
- An interesting problem and solution
- Colourful, detailed illustrations
- Well described setting
- Catchy title and cover
- 'Juicy' words
- Different feelings
- Humour
- Adventure
- Message/lesson/big idea



Providing students with opportunities to talk about their likes and dislikes about stories is a great way to develop a lifelong enjoyment of reading. Talking about what makes a good story is a great starting point to engage our students in conversations about reading at home. **Happy reading Sharks!**

Staff Appreciation Luncheon

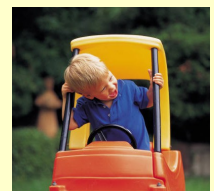

Hey Suzuki Families,

The grade 5 students in Ms. Orr's/Ms. Kilgour's class are sharing their water bottle PSA's on the morning announcements and in classrooms. We want to inform staff and students about the negative impact of using disposable water bottles, and persuade people to use reusable water bottles instead.



We have done some research, used a variety of forms of writing to communicate our thinking, and made connections to what we're learning about the human body, states of matter, and environmental issues.

Before, we thought bottled water was better or the same as tap water, and that recycling was an easy answer for getting rid of plastic water bottles.

Now, we think fresh water is a precious natural resource we can't take for granted, and that we should think about prioritizing reusing and reducing before recycling.

We know that water is essential for the survival of all living things, all around the world, including us!

We will continue to learn about water issues, looking at them from the perspectives of others', like First Nations people, past and present.

In the meantime, we will:

- Start reusing and reducing, as well as recycling
- Research ways to use garbage as a source of energy
- Use reusable water bottles

We want YOU to:

- Stop buying and using disposable water bottles
- Spread the word about the importance of not using disposable water bottles
- Check out some fantastic videos, including Bottle Gate, at thewaterbrothers.ca and download the free mobile app QUENCH – it shows GTA businesses, such as restaurants and retailers, who are willing to provide free tap water to visitors carrying reusable bottles (You can even sign up your business as an Official QUENCH Station.)

A Reminder to Subscribe to our Electronic Communications

Please go onto our school [website](#) to subscribe. These e-mail communications will only be used by our school, we will not be sending you junk mail or spam.

As a result, York Region District School Board requires your consent to receive any electronic messages which contain school advertising or promotions regarding school fundraisers, lunch programs, field trips, the sale of yearbooks, purchasing of student photos, books, prom or dance tickets, athletic events with an entry fee or similar events and offers.

In order to consent to receive commercial electronic messages we must already have your email address on file with the school to receive non-commercial communications.
