

### **Report Cards**

There will be three report cards written and sent home throughout the year; the Progress Report Card, Term 1 Provincial Report Card, and Term 2 Provincial Report Card.



The Progress Report is designed to show a student's development of the learning skills and work habits during the fall of the school year. It also provides information regarding a student's general progress in working towards the achievement of the curriculum expectations of first term. Student progress will be reported in all subject areas as either 'progressing with difficulty', 'progressing well', or 'progressing very well', and teacher comments will provide guidance as to strengths and next steps.

The Provincial Report is sent home twice a year. The first term report is sent home between Jan. 20-Feb. 20, and the second term report is sent home towards the end of June. Both reports show a student's achievement of curriculum expectations introduced and developed throughout the term. They also provide an indication of a student's development of the learning skills and work habits that are so important throughout a child's academic life and beyond. The learning skills taught, modeled, and assessed are: Responsibility, Organization, Independent Work, Collaboration, Initiative, and Self-Regulation.



It's important to state that the primary purpose of assessment and evaluation is to improve student learning. The most successful classrooms have teachers who support all students, carefully plan activities related to the curriculum expectations, communicate clearly with students and parents, utilize ongoing and varied assessment tools, provide descriptive feedback, and develop a student's love of learning. It contains students who strive to overcome challenges, work cooperatively with others, ask questions and seek clarification, and make plans to achieve their goals. Finally, successful classrooms have parents and guardians working with both their children and the teacher as partners towards our shared purpose of making this the best possible year full of growth, excitement, challenges, and opportunities.

Hopefully this has provided some useful information about the assessment and evaluation that will take place throughout the school year. As always, please let me know should you have any questions, comments, or concerns, and I look forward to speaking with you more throughout the year.



# Assessment, Evaluation and Reporting



The students will be receiving their *progress report cards* on Wednesday, November 12. This Report Card will provide you with information on how your child is progressing so far, but it is not summative information, thus, there will be no *grades* provided. The front page will give you information on your child's Learning Skills and the second page will provide information on their academic progress.

Parent/Teacher/Student Conferences or Student-Led Conferences will be set up for the evening of November 13th and during the day on November 14th. We urge all parents to attend these conferences as they are opportunities for you to talk with the teacher and your child about his/her progress and about his/her strengths and needs. The conferences are scheduled on a tight timeline and so it will be important for you to come prepared with a list of questions, comments and concerns so as to make the best use of that time. Information regarding scheduling will be sent home shortly. You will also receive information on whether your child will be involved in Student-Led Conferences or the more traditional Parent/Teacher Conference. If you are unable to attend on either of these two days, please contact your child's teacher to set up an alternate time.

All Assessment, Evaluation and Reporting in Ontario schools, is now based on the policies and practices described in Growing Success: Assessment Evaluation and Reporting in Ontario Schools. A variety of Ministry and York Region parent brochures are available to you in over 22 languages including traditional and simplified Chinese translations, Hindi, Farsi, Tamil and Korean. Please take some time to look over the document entitled Supporting Your Child's learning through Assessment, Evaluation and Reporting on the links below. These documents are very useful in helping you to understand how teachers are assessing your child and what your role is in supporting your child at home. # Electronic Devices and other Valuables

Students are not to bring cell phones, handheld games, mp3 players, laser pointers, or any other electronic devices to school unless the student and parent have signed the school technology agreement. These kinds of devices are often very valuable and provide great temptation for theft. As David Suzuki P.S. and the Board are not responsible for theft or damage to personal property, parents and students are asked to leave all valuables at home.

If a student needs to bring a cell phone to school for safety reasons, it must be kept in his/her locker—during class and recess times. Any cell phones that are not put away, will be taken from the student and returned at the end of the day. If a cell phone is taken away more than once, it will only be returned to a parent and not the student.

Camera cell phones are not to be used on school property.

## **Traffic Loop/Parking Lot**

Parents familiar with morning traffic know just how congested traffic can be in the morning in front of the school and in the drop off loop in the parking lot. We strongly encourage students to walk to school. However, if you must use the loop in the morning, please be patient, drive slowly and be careful. The loop is for DROP OFF only, not parking. Parents should not leave the vehicle or wait in the loop at any time.

Once dropped off, students should proceed directly to the schoolyard or Kindergarten fenced area. There are two lanes of traffic in the loop. Children should not be exiting the vehicle on the driver's side between the two lanes of traffic as this is extremely dangerous. Your child should be exiting in the lane closest to the school and exiting out the passenger side of the vehicle so that he/she is stepping directly on to the sidewalk.

If you wish to park and walk your child to the schoolyard, please park on a side street. The Town of Markham parking enforcement could be making visits to the school area and we do not want any of our families being ticketed for parking illegally in the loop, fire route, or in handicapped parking spots by the loop.



# Bullying Awareness Week November 16th—22nd

Ontario has designated the third week of every November as Bullying Awareness and Prevention Week to help promote safer schools and a positive learning environment. At David Suzuki, our commitment to the well-being and safety of our students goes beyond this week and permeates our work as educators over the course of the entire year. Our daily inspirational quotes and reflections, our Character Assemblies and our Reflection Room and Restorative Discipline approach are all ways in which we help encourage students to be kind, respectful citizens who "stand up against bullying."

Bullying is defined as a form of repeated, persistent and aggressive behaviour directed at an individual or individuals that is intended to cause (or should be known to cause) fear and distress and/or harm to another person's body, feelings, self-esteem or reputation. Bullying occurs in a context where there is a real or perceived power imbalance.

Bullying can take various forms. These include:

- Physical hitting, shoving, stealing or damaging property
- Verbal name calling, mocking, or making sexist, racist or homophobic comments
- Social excluding others from a group or spreading gossip or rumours about them

Electronic (commonly known as cyberbullying) – spreading rumours and hurtful comments through the use of cellphones, e-mail, text messaging and social networking sites

Teachers, Parents and students together can heighten awareness of bullying and its impact on the school community by continuing to openly discuss the adverse effects of bullying and the actions to take if witnessing bullying or if being victimized by bullying. We believe that bullying is a community issue and together with you, our parents, we seek to find solutions. We ask all parents to encourage your children to report all bullying incidents to you, their teacher or their Principals and to coach your child with possible alternatives. Most importantly, treat the school as your ally - if you become privy to a possible bullying situation at the school, please contact us and share this information with us.

# Curriculum Corner

## Learning Skills and Work Habits

In the next couple of weeks, your child(ren) will bring home their progress report. The progress report will provide you with important information about your child's learning skills and work habits, and



serves as a conversation starter with teachers. You will have an opportunity to meet with your child's teachers to discuss specific strengths and next steps that will be areas of focus for your child throughout the remainder of the term.

The learning skills and work habits reported on include: responsibility, independent work, collaboration, organization, initiative, and self-regulation. Within those broad categories are many subsets of skills and work habits, such as persisting, creating, and questioning, that contribute to success both in school and life. Additionally, many of the skills are directly connected to academic achievement, such as the ability to access information, evaluate information, and communicate effectively.

International research has led to a broad consensus that strong learning skills and positive work habits are often an indicator of future success in school, at home, and in life in general. Parents, teachers, and students can work together to understand the importance of these skills, as well as to develop goal plans to support further growth. While understanding that the learning skills and work habits will look different as your child(ren) grow and mature, the following are sample behaviours that can help identify criteria for each of the skills.

#### Consider how well your child:

#### Responsibility

Manages his/her own behavior

#### Independent Work

Follows instructions with minimal supervision

#### Collaboration

Responds positively to the ideas, opinion, values, and traditions of others

#### Organization

Establishes priorities and manages time to achieve goals

#### Initiative

Demonstrates curiosity and interest in learning

#### Self-Regulation

Perseveres when facing challenges

#### **School Bus Challenges**

Unfortunately, we are still continuing to experience some difficulties related to punctuality with a couple of our busses. We appreciate that this can be very frustrating for parents who are waiting for their children to be dropped off or picked up. We are consistently in communication with the bus company about this and they assure us they are doing everything they can to be on time. The challenge is that we are the second run for the busses meaning that they pick up and drop off students for another school with an earlier start time prior to picking up and dropping off our students. Thus, if there is a problem of any sort on the first run that causes delay, we are automatically affected. This is the case for all schools with bussing – if you are an early start school, you are on the first run; if you are a later start school, as we are, you are on the second run and impacted by what happens on the first run.

We want to assure you that if the bus is late, your child continues to be supervised until it arrives.
