Guidance Notes

Summer School Registration Opens on Tuesday, April 9, 2024

The York Region District School Board will once again be offering acceleration (in-person) and reinforcement courses during the summer. The hours for all courses are 8:45 a.m to 3:33 p.m. with two 15-minute scheduled breaks and a 40-minute lunch period.

- Acceleration courses start Wednesday, July 3 and end Friday, July 26.
- Session 1 for reinforcement courses start Wednesday, July 3 and end Monday, July 15.
- Session 2 for reinforcement courses start Tuesday, July 16 and end Friday, July 26.
- All In-person Acceleration courses are for students under the age of 21 with the exception of Adult Credit English as a Second Language
- Students register through their My Pathway (MyBluePrint) account they can register independently or come to Guidance for help

Acceleration Courses (18 days)

For students who wish to earn a credit in a subject they have not previously studied or those who wish to upgrade a mark in a course that they have successfully completed.

Students are encouraged to register early to avoid disappointment. Course offerings are not guaranteed as they are based on sufficient enrollment and teacher availability.

Students can only take one acceleration course during the summer session. Transportation is not provided for this program.

Registration opens April 9, 2024.

Online Learning

Courses that are specifically designed to be taught in a fully online format. Online learning does not require pupils and teachers to be face-to-face with each other. Classes occur online using an asynchronous model, with check-in opportunities with the teacher. The learning platform is Brightspace by D2L.

International Day of Pink

The International Day of Pink started in 2007 when a teenager faced homophobic bullying at a Nova Scotia high school for wearing a pink t-shirt. Students organized to wear pink as an act of solidarity. It is now a day of action on the second Wednesday in April every year.

April 10, 2024, is the International Day of Pink. The International Day of Pink is a day when communities across Canada and across the world unite to celebrate diversity and raise awareness about the need to stop homophobia, transphobia, discrimination and all forms of bullying. On this annual day in April, individuals wear pink to show respect for diversity and to demonstrate

support for learning and working environments which are safe and inclusive of people from all different backgrounds.

Although the first Day of Pink occurred 17 years ago, the 2SLGBTQI+ community and students continue to experience homophobia, transphobia and biphobia. Schools and workplaces need to commit to raising awareness, building inclusion and eliminating discrimination for students in 2SLGBTQI+ communities.

Autism Acceptance Month

For over 50 years, Autism Ontario of York Region (Autism Society Ontario) has been representing the thousands of people on the autism spectrum and their families across Ontario. This society is made of parents, professionals, and autistic self-advocates who focus on key issues that impact those with autism and their families.

Acceptance towards Autism is about making a difference; showing the world that Autistic people and the community have more in common with people than one would think. Acceptance also involves including the Autistic person in the problem solving, their education and their perception in the world. Acceptance strives to have the two communities working together to educate and spread the message that different is a strength. It is these differences that make the world such a great place.

The important thing is that you are recognizing and embracing World Autism Acceptance Month with the York Region District School Board this April. Sikh Heritage Month

The month of April is proclaimed as Sikh Heritage Month as per The Sikh Heritage Month Act of 2013.

Families are encouraged to join Canadians who will be coming together to celebrate how Sikh Canadians have made significant contributions to the growth and prosperity of Ontario and Canada's social, economic, political, and cultural fabric. On April 1, 2021, Minister Bardish Chagger issued the following statement from Ottawa:

"Canada is proud to be home to more than 500,000 Sikh Canadians, making it one of the largest Sikh diasporas in the world. Since the arrival of the first Sikh immigrants in the late 19th century, members of this community have contributed to Canada through their achievements in all areas of society and have helped shape the diversity found within it.

Sikhism's core principles include equality, generosity, openness, and compassion. Sikh Heritage Month is an opportunity to reflect on the pivotal role that Sikh communities have played, and continue to play, in building a stronger and consciously more inclusive Canada."

During the month of April, Sikh Canadians celebrate Vaisakhi, which marks the creation of the Khalsa and the Sikh articles of faith. Sikh Canadians widely celebrate Vaisakhi, also known as Khalsa Day, across Ontario.

Eid-ul-Fitr – April 10



Eid-ul-Fitr falls on the first day of Shawwal, the 10th month of the Muslim calendar, and marks the end of the month of Ramadan. On this day, Muslims who had been observing Ramadan break the fast and celebrate its conclusion. Please note that this date may change subject to the sighting of the moon.

The day traditionally begins early with a prayer ceremony at the community mosque. Since this is a day to celebrate the renewal of one's commitment to Islam, people may wear new clothes as a symbol of fresh beginnings. Families and friends typically visit one another and exchange good wishes, hugs and handshakes, and homes are often decorated to reflect the festive atmosphere of this special day.

On this festive and meaningful occasion for many members of the Islamic community, we wish students, parents and staff a happy celebration.

<u>Vaisakhi – April 14</u>

Vaisakhi, the Sikh New Year, is celebrated in April every year. Vaisakhi is also celebrated in some other parts of India.



For Sikhs, Vaisakhi celebrates the birth of the Panth Khalsa order (the Order of the Pure Ones) established by Guru Gobind Singh. It is at this time that Guru Gobind Singh gave the Khalsa order the five distinct symbols of purity and courage which would make Sikhs identifiable: the Kesh (unshorn hair);

Kangha (the wooden comb); Karra (the iron bracelet); Kirpan (the sword) and Kachera (underclothing).

Some of the ways that this day is traditionally honoured include visiting a place of worship (Gurdwaras), participating in a mela (fair), indulging in mithai (sweets), fruits and lassi (a sweet yogurt drink).

We extend good wishes to all members of the Sikh and Indian communities who will be celebrating Vaisakhi.

Ridvan - April 20

Ridvan (say "rez-VONN") is one of the holiest holidays for the members of the **Bahá'í** (say "BA-hi") faith. It is also known as the "Most Great Festival" or the "King of Festivals." It lasts for 12 days.

This year, Ridvan begins at sunset on April 19th and lasts until sunset on May 1st.

Of the 12 days, there are only three holy days in which people do not go to work or school. Instead, they gather for prayers and religious meetings. Musical and artistic performances are also included in the festivities.

Report It

Our schools should be safe, welcoming and inclusive places for everyone. It is important that students know what to do if they witness or experience inappropriate behaviour or incidents of hate or discrimination.

- There may be situations when you can safely step in and intervene and help.
- Talk to an adult at school, family member or other trusted adult.
- Report the event without the person involved knowing using our online reporting tool, Report It.

Report It lets you share information about inappropriate student behaviour or incidents of hate or discrimination. You can use the online form to report:

- bullying, drugs, cheating, vandalism, harassment, violence or any other inappropriate behaviour
- incidents of discrimination or hate, including anti-Indigenous racism, ableism, anti-Asian racism, anti-Black racism, antisemitism, classism, homophobia, Islamaphobia, sexism, transphobia or other forms of hate

You can report events that happen at school, at school-related events, online or off school property if it negatively affects a student or the school climate. You can also choose to make a report anonymously.

Complete reports are shared with the school to investigate and respond.

Acts of discrimination, hate and bullying are never acceptable. Using the Report It tool is a way of standing up for each other and for ourselves.
