Sentence Sense:

Run On Sentences:

A run on sentence means you have too many complete thoughts in one sentence without correct punctuation.

Three ways to "fix" ROS:

Red Light: (come to a complete stop)

- Use a period, exclamation mark, question mark
- Use a ; (semi colon)
 - (If the ideas are related and you could replace it with a period and capital--put your finger over the semi colon to check!)

Yellow Light:

- Use a comma with *a joining word* between two complete ideas.
 - Joining words: and, or, but, nor, so, yet, for
 - We were served the wrong meals the food was cold. (ROS)
 - We were served the wrong meal, and the food was cold. (corrected with comma and joining word)

Green light: no punctuation needed inside a short sentence.

Sentence Fragments

A DEPENDENT CLAUSE (ladder) cannot stand alone in a sentence. It needs an independent clause (wall or complete thought) to be considered a complete sentence; it is not a complete thought.

Ex. While I set the table.

An INDEPENDENT CLAUSE is the main clause of a sentence. It can stand alone in a sentence; it is a complete thought. Every complete sentence must contain at least one independent clause. Ex. Jennifer made dinner.

A dependent clause will begin with a DEPENDENT CUE. Here is a list of dependent cues:

*<u>If</u> you see one of these words, you have a ladder; you must attach it to a complete thought (wall) with a comma.

*Good writing includes a mix of short independent clauses and dependent clauses attached to independent clauses.

*Make sure that you do not confuse dependent cues with the following transition words / phrases:

However Furthermore Similarly In contrast Besides Thus Therefore In comparison In fact Consequently For example Moreover Nevertheless For instance
