Message from the Principal

Dec. 23

As a school we continue to have discussions and provide reminders to all students regarding appropriate usage of washroom spaces. The staff are regularly entering the washroom areas to move loitering students either onto class or to find available spaces at lunch within the school (Cafeteria, Library, Student Services, etc.). We know that when students are gathering in the washrooms it makes it uncomfortable for others to enter the washroom for the purposes it is intended. We also know that when students are gathered in the washrooms inappropriate and unsafe activities such as vaping, fighting, vandalism etc. take place.

Recently we have found a trend of groups of students (4-5 at a time) locking themselves into the larger accessible stall designed to accommodate wheelchairs and sitting on the floor in a group. Please know that as a staff we are committed to ensuring safety in all areas of the school and do enter the 'public' spaces' within the washrooms regularly to monitor the behaviour of students and move students along. When we have found students clearly loitering after having been warned we have escorted them to the office and called parents. Last week we also posted 'No Loitering' signs in the washrooms. The next step in this progressive discipline is to begin issuing suspensions to students who continue to impact the moral tone of the school and have a disregard for the directions of staff in this regard. This is a step we are hesitant to take as we want our students in classes, however, we cannot allow a small group of students to have a negative impact on the rest of the student body through their choices and disregard for the needs of others and directions of the staff.

Vaping in schools, on school property or within 20 metres of school property is governed under the Smoke Free Ontario Act, and consequences could include suspension and possible fines up to \$5,000. Students who are caught vaping will have the vape confiscated to be picked up by a parent and they will receive a written warning and engage in some education. A second offence will result in the administration contacting the Tobacco Enforcement Officer and they will come to the school and issue a fine (and those under 16 would automatically receive a summons to attend court). Over the past year we have purchased over 100 Chromebooks for use by students throughout the school. Through the pandemic, both students and staff have realized some of the many benefits that technology as a tool in the classroom can provide for collaboration, application of skills and task completion. Initially 100 Chromebooks seemed to be adequate to fulfil the need. That is no longer the case. Unfortunately, we are not in a position as a school to provide a Chromebook for every student that does not bring technology each day, however, there are a number of students in our building for whom this is the only technology they have access to and it is important for them to have it available. When we run out of Chromebooks in the morning many students will try to rely on their phones. Although this is ok for short tasks, it is not productive and leads to much distraction in the classroom. If you have a portable laptop or Chromebook that your child could bring to school we would encourage you to have them bring it. If through this holiday season you have the means and could purchase a Chromebook as a gift for your child (or for an upcoming birthday, etc.) they would make good use of it (you can find them for as little as \$300). We will continue to have the Chromebooks available each day for those that need them but we know that our inventory exceeds the demand and are hoping that as a school community we might be able to support those that are unable to access technology (or even forget it at home one day) by having our Chromebooks more easily accessible in the library. Thanks for your help to support learning in the classrooms for all students.

This semester the staff at Williams have been focusing our learning on Identity Affirming Classroom Spaces as well as Equitable Assessment Practices. Within each department teachers have been mapping their assessments based on overall curriculum expectations in their subject areas and looking at a variety of ways to collect assessment data from observations, conversations and products in the classroom. The following fundamental principles are the underpinning of our work in assessment:

- Equitable assessment is flexible; not all students need to demonstrate learning in the same way. How students learn should inform the ways we \rightarrow assess individual students.
- → Students learn in different ways and have different strengths; we can honour this by allowing voice and choice in how they demonstrate their learning.

To best serve each student, we need to prioritize assessment as and for learning. Evaluation is only based on evidence of learning gathered connected to the overall curriculum/program expectations.

This is extremely important work as part of the overall equity strategy of the board and we are all continuing to learn and apply our learning in order to best support the achievement of each of our students as individuals. Just as a teacher would differentiate instruction to meet the needs of various learners in the classroom, Growing Success (2010) does not require all students to be evaluated in the same way. Students need to be evaluated based on standards connected to overall expectations. Students must be evaluated as compared to these standards, not as compared to other students. As teachers reflect on the work they have done in their classrooms this semester and the learning we have done through the pandemic on differentiated assessment opportunities you will begin to see varied approaches to assessments that align with these fundamental principles. Teachers are in the process of finalizing how students will demonstrate their learning of all the overall expectations for the final 30% of their grade. In the new year we will provide a schedule of what the culminating days will look like from January 26-February 2 and individual teachers will be providing information to students specific to their classes as they design final assessments that are aligned with the work that has been done throughout the semester. Please don't hesitate to reach out to your child's classroom teacher, a subject department head or the administration if you have any questions.

At this time we would like to thank Mr. Tsigaridis for all of his contributions to our school this semester. We have been grateful to have his experience, care and concern here supporting students and staff. Mr. Tsigaridis will be returning to a well deserved retirement after December 20th when our permanent Vice Principal, Ms. Mitchell returns to the school.

All the best for a joyous holiday season and time with family and friends over the break. We encourage all our students and staff to step away from the classrooms and the class work over the break so that they may come back refreshed in the new year.

Attendance Procedures

Extended Absences

<u>Planned absences of three or more consecutive school days require the completion of an "Extraordinary Absence" form at least one week in advance of the leave</u>. The form is available in the Attendance Office. The process includes obtaining signatures from teachers and a school administrator. It is the student's responsibility to catch up on all work missed.

Parents/guardians should contact the Attendance Office to indicate when their child will be absent. The Attendance Office can be reached at 905-727-3131 ext. 100. If the attendance secretary is busy please leave a voice message OR send an email to <u>drgwwilliamsss.attendance@yrdsb.ca</u>. If a student leaves school resulting in a late or an absence to a class period, they are to go to the attendance office to sign out. If a student arrives late for Period 1 and before 8:45 a.m., they are asked to report directly to their class where their homeroom teacher will let the office know the time of arrival. If the 8:20 bell has rung, students are asked to stand in the hallway for the anthem and announcements to be completed before proceeding to their period 1 class. For any other period, whenever a student arrives at school after the first scheduled class period has begun they are to report to attendance to sign in.

Students are expected to be in class by the times listed above.

Students, parents, and staff have a role to play in ensuring that students attend classes regularly and punctually. Students are responsible for:

- attending all scheduled classes, and being on time;
- being prepared for classes, and participating fully in the planned learning activities;
- reporting absences (preferably in advance), and presenting proper documentation to staff, and covering the material missed when they are absent.

Absences must be both valid and authorized by a parent. Examples of valid reasons include illness, bereavement, medical appointments, court appearance, etc. If no phone call, e-mail, or note is received by the school, the absence will be considered "truant". Truancies are unacceptable.

Students who have been signed out of classes by a parent/legal guardian cannot remain on school property.

Parent(s)/guardian(s) and students aged 18 and older and students who have declared their independence must report all absences, late arrivals and/or changes to departure plans to the school in a timely manner. Where possible, notify the school in advance by calling the school and leaving a message on the answering machine or emailing the school's attendance address.

If a student is unable to attend school and will miss more than two school days, homework may be requested from the Guidance Department and picked up at the school. Teachers require 24 hours to complete homework requests. If a student is absent due to a prolonged illness, he/she may be required to provide a medical note.


Safety and Community Notices

York Regional Transit (YRT) has announced a new Route 32 northbound trip, beginning September 14, to meet the afternoon bell time at Dr. G. W. Williams. This information won't be reflected on their website until November 6 but is included in this <u>flyer</u>.


We continue to work with YRT to provide an improved experience for our students riding the 426 buses at the end of each day. Please remind your students to line up single file to board the buses and to stay behind the sidewalk (on the field) until the buses arrive and begin loading. This is important for everyone's safety.

Driveway and Parking Lot

At the end of the school day, the front driveway loop is closed to regular traffic from about 2:50 to 3:10 pm. Only school taxis and buses are to use the front driveway loop at the end of the day in order to create a safe place for our students with special needs. Once all the school taxis and buses leave the front driveway loop around 3:10, regular traffic may use this area. To support our efforts to ensure physical distance, we ask that you make arrangements to meet your students at the nearest exit from their classroom (in one of the parking lots) or off school property (down the street, around the corner, etc.). Please see the maps below to support your efforts.



There is one-way traffic in our front driveway loop. In the front driveway loop, drop off/pick up students on the right side; drive through only on the left side. For safety reasons, do not drop off/pick up students on the left side.



If you MUST come to the school, enter via the West lot (beside the track, closest to Yonge Street) and drive around the school to meet your child. DO NOT block the driveway waiting. There is one-way traffic in the west entrance and on the south (back) side of the school. It is two-way traffic on the east side of the school, however, during the end of the day pick-up time you will notice the admin directing all vehicles to enter the west lot ONLY so that we have a constant flow out of the east lot. This makes a significant positive impact on safety for all and makes it easier and less stressful for everyone. When you are able to enter the east lot, do not make U-turns anywhere in the east parking lot from Dunning Avenue to the south parking lot. Making a U-turn in this area creates an unsafe condition for pedestrians and other vehicles. If you need to turn around, please pull into a parking spot and carefully back out.



Please note that Dunning Avenue is a **no stopping zone**. This is noted by the signage along the street and on the map above you can see the red arrows on both sides of the street.
