



Will the Boundaries be Changing?

- Planning Staff will be commencing a boundary review process in winter 2024 for Dr. G.W. Williams SS and Aurora HS prior to the opening of Dr. G.W. Williams SS replacement school in northeast Aurora.
- The <u>proposed boundary</u> would include:
 - Adding the Highview PS and Regency Acres PS feeder schools (south of Kennedy Road to Bloomington Road between Bathurst Street to Yonge Street) to Aurora High School.
 - Section B choice area (Batson Drive to Industrial Parkway South between Yonge Street and Industrial Parkway) is designated to attend one high school, Aurora High School, which removes this area from the Dr. G.W. Williams Secondary School attendance area.
 - If approved, the boundary change would take effect September 2025 for incoming grade 9's.



NEW - Graduation Requirements

Students must earn at least two online learning credits to get their Ontario Secondary School Diploma.

Opting out

Parents who wish to opt out or exempt their child from the online graduation requirement must complete the opt-out form or through their child's My Pathway Planner account.

The Grade 10 Literacy Test

 A Diploma requirement. Administered during the grade 10 year



- A test based on language and communication (reading and writing) expectations of curricula up to and including grade 9
- Accommodations, deferrals and exemptions may be appropriate for some students
- If the standard is not met in the first attempt, schools will provide support; test is re-administered until student successfully completes the test or the Grade 12 Literacy Course

Community Involvement

- It is required that all students complete 40 hours of community involvement.
- Can start in summer after grade 8.
- Recommended that student's obtain approval before starting involvement to ensure eligibility.
- Student responsibility to keep record of activities.
- Guidelines and forms will be provided to help track community involvement. They are available in the Guidance Office and on our website.
