Administrators' Message

Dear Parents/Guardians,

It is incredible that April is upon us already and we are looking forward to the next three months. We know this will be a busy time for everyone. The York Region District School Board values positive mental health as fundamental to student achievement and well-being and our staff and students here at Elder's Mills have been hard at work focusing on our Mental Health initiatives.

We have been fortunate to have the West Interdisciplinary Team work with our students to develop their self-regulation skills. In the fall, the primary classes worked with the team to develop their understanding of self-regulation and particularly their understanding of Zones of Regulation. It is wonderful to hear students identifying what *zone* they are in, and articulating strategies they can use to keep themselves in the *green zone*. Over the past two weeks the junior students were involved in the workshop "Mind your Mind" where students learned about the parts of their brain that cause them to react and how to calm them using mindfulness strategies. Students explored mindfulness through the senses of sight, taste, touch, sound, and smell. The intermediate students were engaged in the workshop "Walk in my Shoes" that focused on how to show empathy towards others. Students participated in activities that challenged the way they view others, and ways to support peers when they experience difficult times.

On Tuesday April 10th and Thursday April 12th The York Centre for Children Youth and Families will be visiting the Grades 5 - 7s, to deliver an eight week program that consists of one hour weekly sessions to address the subject of bullying. The program is designed to empower children to respond assertively when confronted with a bullying situation. We are very excited about this opportunity.

Our Junior and Intermediate teachers will be participating in some professional development for the *Second Step* social-emotional learning program that they will be integrating into their classroom practice. This program focuses on empathy, emotion management and problem solving skills.

We are thrilled to announce that our school's *SpeakUp* grant was accepted and our students have already started to meet with the teacher facilitators to plan their projects to promote student well-being. Some of their ideas include "Mindful Mondays", "calming kits", youth wellness workshops presented by the Canadian Mental Health Association, and some community outreach. Celebrating Diversity



April 1 CHRISTIANITY - Easter Sunday celebrates the resurrection of Christ. It is the most important festival in the Christian year (Western Calendar).

April 1 CHRISTIANITY - Palm Sunday The Sunday before Easter (Eastern Calendar).

April 6 CHRISTIANITY - Holy Friday (Eastern) commemorates the passion of Jesus Christ, i.e. his submission to death by crucifixion. The Eastern churches focus on his burial.

April 8 CHRISTIANITY - Easter Sunday in the Orthodox churches. The church calendar year begins with Pascha (Eastern Calendar).

April 13 SIKHISM - Vaisakhi. This day celebrates the founding of the Khalsa order (Sikh religion) in 1699 C.E. by Guru Gobind Singh Ji. Many Sikhs choose to be baptized into the Khalsa Panth (Brotherhood of the Pure) on this day. Also on this day, male Khalsa Sikhs are named Singh (lion), female Khalsa Sikhs are named Kaur (princess). It is the most important holy day of the year for Sikhs.

April 13 ISLAM- Miraj-un-Nabi commemorates Prophet Muhammad's (pbuh) famous night journey (al-Isra) from Mecca to Jerusalem and his subsequent ascension (al-Miraj) to paradise.

April 13 HINDUISM - Chaitra/Chithirai New Year The first day of the Solar year is an agricultural festival celebrating the harvest. This day is also celebrated as the Tamil New Year, Varusha Pirappu, Vishu, Ugadi, Rongali Bihu and Naba Barsha.

April 13/14 BUDDHISM - Saka (New Year's Day). This is New Year's Day according to the Saka calendar. This day is both a religious and cultural celebration.

April 21 BAHA'I FAITH - Ridvan. Baha'u'llah, the founder of the Baha'i Faith, declared his mission as the most recent messenger of God. Baha'is observe the first, ninth and twelfth days of this period. The actual event occurred in a garden, called Ridvan (Paradise) in Baghdad, Iraq in 1863 C.E. Work and academic studies are suspended on this day.

How to Help Your Child at Home with Math



Why is a belief in our children's ability to learn mathematics essential?

Understanding mathematics builds confidence and opens doors to many jobs and careers. Understanding mathematics enables us to:

Solve problems and make sound decisions

- Explain how we solved a problem and why we made a particular decision
- Use technology (such as calculators and computer applications) to help solve problems
- Understand patterns and trends so that we can make predictions (for example, we can keep track of how much juice is consumed so that we know how much juice to buy each week)

• Manage our time and money (for example, we can calculate how much time we need to get to work, how much food we need to make meals and how much money we need to buy food)

• Handle everyday situations that involve numbers (such as figuring out when the next bus will arrive and dividing a recipe)


Before your child can learn mathematics, he or she needs to believe in his or her ability to do so. That's where you come in. You can be your child's first role model for learning. When you engage with your child in a supportive, relaxed atmosphere, your child will enjoy taking risks while having fun with math!

Top Tips for Parents

• Build strong, positive attitudes about math. When children feel positively engaged and successful, they are more likely to stick with an activity or a problem to find a solution.

• Begin with activities that meet your child's level of mathematical understanding. Early success in solving problems will build your child's confidence. Gradually move to activities that provide more challenge for your child.

• If you and your child are more comfortable in a language other than English, use it. Your child will understand concepts better in the language that he or she knows best.

It's time to remind children about being safe in our community.

It's a good time for parents to remind children about personal safety.

Here's what children need to know:

- Their name, age, telephone number, address, city and province. This can be done through rhyme or song.
- How to contact their parents at any time, by memorizing cell or work numbers.
- How and under what circumstances to call 911.
- To never approach or enter a stranger's vehicle. A responsible adult would never ask a child for directions or any other question for that matter.
- Make sure they know they have a right to say "no" to an adult, especially when the adult is asking them to do something they have been taught is wrong or feels uncomfortable. Reminding children of this right is important because children are taught from a young age to respect adults.
- To always tell parents where they will be and to never enter someone's home without their parent's permission.
- If home alone, never admit it when answering the phone. Never answer a knock at the door or speak through it. Adults can be very persuasive. Teach your child to call you if there is a knock at the door and if they fear for their safety, teach them to call 911. Make sure they know that police officers are there to help them and would not get mad if it were a false alarm.
- If they think they are being followed or are in danger they should run home or to a public place. If someone grabs them, they should try to get away, yelling and screaming while doing so.
- It is important to play in safe areas, never take shortcuts and stick with a buddy whenever possible.

It is never too early or too late to teach children the importance of personal safety. Common sense, communication and consistency are the keys. Remind children to alert a responsible adult if something strange happens that makes them feel uncomfortable. Remember, crime prevention is everyone's responsibility.
