Big Box of Cards Fundraiser!

The Big Box of Cards is a set of 35 All Birthday cards for the low price of \$35.00 per box. Each family would have received a box on Tuesday, April 4th. In the bag with the box was a sheet of instructions. Here are some answers to frequently asked questions about this campaign:



Frequently Asked Questions:

- What do I do if I don't want to participate?
 - o Return the box with all the cards, in its original condition, to the school office
- What do I do with the order form that came with the box?
 - This is for your reference only. Keep track of the boxes you sell so that when you receive delivery of your orders you will know who purchased from you
- I've sold the box that was sent home, how do I get more to sell?
 - Use the box that was sent home as the 'sample' to show your family and friends
 - Once sales are finished, place your order on School Cash online and pay for the number of boxes sold
 - Boxes will be sent home at the end of April/beginning of May so that you can fulfill your orders
 - For example: If you sell 10 boxes, you will make a payment on School Cash online for \$350.00; we will send home 9 boxes with your child. You will use the one that was sent home as part of your order.

Don't forget our amazing prizes!! For every two boxes of cards your family sells, your child's name will be placed in a draw to win one of four \$25 gift cards at local retailers like Cineplex, Toys R Us, Indigo, Walmart and Amazon. There is also the possibility to award a Samsung 8" Tablet 'A' to the top seller if the school reaches sales of 400 boxes or more!



Where do the funds go?

Some of the program enhancements we have been able to provide for our students and our school through this year's fundraisers and in response to community input (EMPS Community Check in Survey open from Nov 2022 - Jan 2023) include: new instruments for the band, subsidizing costs of field trips, enhancing our collection of library books, adding books to our classroom libraries, equipment for gym and extracurricular activities, classroom games, guest speakers/presentations, STEM activities such as MakerSpace, Robotics and Coding. Our fundraising efforts also provide us the opportunity to allocate funds to modernize our library space (coming soon!)

Have a waste-free lunch to reduce environmental impacts of packaging by using drink containers, washable cutlery, and cloth napkins instead of prepackaged foods, juice boxes and pouches, and disposable utensils.

Community Clean-up

Suggested teacher action: Remind students to wear appropriate clothing to go outside. Remind students to wear gloves at all times. Remind students to not pick up broken glass, syringes and any other litter they do not feel comfortable picking up.



MESSAGES FROM THE OFFICE

<u>REMINDERS:</u> The partnership between home and school is an important one. We consult, collaborate and support one another in ensuring that our children are contributing in positive, caring ways to our school community and that our students feel safe in our school environment.

Positive Behaviour:

Students are encouraged to demonstrate positive character attributes (such as empathy, courage, respect for human rights and inclusivity). Standing up for one another and reporting when something does not feel safe is part of a caring and safe school environment. Students should report incidents that make them or others feel unsafe or uncomfortable including acts of racism, discrimination and bullying. Students can report incidents by:

Tobacco/Alcohol/Drug-Free Environment:

The use of tobacco, electronic products (such as vaping, electronic cigarettes and cigars and related products) and/or student possession of alcohol/illegal and restricted drugs, including cannabis, are prohibited on school property or within 20 metres of school boundaries. This also applies during Board or school-sponsored events and activities. This is in compliance with the Smoke-Free Ontario Act, which is enforced locally by York Region Community and Health Services and the Tobacco and Smoke-Free Environment Policy and Procedure. A progressive form of discipline, including suspension from school and fines (up to \$5,000), is in place for students who break the law. In accordance with the Smoke-Free Ontario Act (SFOA), exceptions are made for the traditional use of tobacco that forms part of Indigenous culture and spirituality.

Online Safety and Appropriate Use of Technology:

Students are continually reminded about the Appropriate Use of Technology agreement, including the importance of using respectful language and making positive choices when using electronic communications and social media tools.

Vaisakhi: The Sikh New Year, is celebrated in April every year. Vaisakhi is also celebrated in some other parts of India. For Sikhs, Vaisakhi celebrates the birth of the Panth Khalsa order (the Order of the Pure Ones) established by Guru Gobind Singh. It is at this time that Guru Gobind Singh gave the Khalsa order the five distinct symbols of purity and courage which would make Sikhs identifiable: the Kesh (unshorn hair); Kangha (the wooden comb); Karra (the iron bracelet); Kirpan (the sword) and Kachera (underclothing). Some of the ways that this day is traditionally honoured include visiting a place of worship (Gurdwaras), participating in a mela (fair), indulging in mithai (sweets), fruits and lassi (a sweet yogurt drink).



Good Friday: commemorates the passion and death of Jesus Christ. It is called Good Friday because Jesus' death on this holy day had to happen in order for the celebration of Jesus' resurrection on Easter to happen. Good Friday is a solemn, holy day for Christians. Good Friday may be marked by attending Church services and by observing a fast. Many Christians break the Good Friday fast after a candle-lit Easter vigil which occurs on the Saturday evening after Good Friday. The date of Good Friday varies from one year to the next on both the Gregorian (Western) and Julian (Eastern) calendars. Good Friday is also known as Holy Friday, and Great and Holy Friday. Good Friday is the Friday preceding Easter Sunday. For Christians, Easter is the most joyful



celebration of the church year. Christians all over the world honour the resurrection of Jesus from the dead on Easter Sunday. Western rite Christians observe Easter on the first Sunday after the first full moon that falls on or after March 21. Eastern Orthodox Christians celebrate it on the first Sunday after both the Spring Equinox and Jewish Passover. Once every few years the days coincide.

We wish our students and our families a very happy weekend!

To families celebrating Vaisakhi and Eastern Orthodox Easter, we wish you joyous celebrations!
