### Kiss'n' Ride: MORNING DROP OFF

We experience a high-volume of traffic in the mornings as families arrive on school property to drop off their children and then make their way out of the school lot onto Rota Cres and Napa Valley. We ask for your support and cooperation.

Staff are on duty to supervise students from the time they are dropped off on the sidewalk area until they make their way to the back of the building and into the school. Staff should not need to be directing traffic; however, where they need to offer reminders, we ask for your patience and expect your cooperation.

### This is how the Morning Drop off should work:

- Entry into the school lot and moving through the drop off zone is **one lane and one way only**. Vehicles may not pass other vehicles through this area.
- Drivers stop at the designated drop off point along the curb/sidewalk lining the area by the fenced in play yard.
- Students disembark when the vehicle reaches the designated drop off point and not before. They should exit the vehicle as quickly and independently as possible.
- Students disembark from the passenger side and onto the sidewalk area.
- Vehicles do not pull out and drive off until the vehicle in front of them moves forward.

### November is Hindu Heritage Month:

On December 8, 2016, the province of Ontario designated November as Hindu Heritage Month as outlined in the Hindu Heritage Month Act. November 2022 marked Canada's first official Hindu Heritage month.

Hindus first arrived in Canada at the beginning of the 20th century. During various waves of immigration, Hindus from all parts of the world continued to make Canada their home from the 1960s to present day. Canada is the proud home to nearly 830,000 Canadians of Hindu heritage, and many have settled in the Greater Toronto Area, including York Region.



"By proclaiming the month of November as Hindu Heritage Month, the Province of Ontario recognizes the important contributions that Hindu Canadians have made to Ontario's social, economic, political and cultural fabric. Hindu Heritage Month is an opportunity to remember, celebrate and educate future generations about Hindu Canadians and the important role that they have played and continue to play in communities across Ontario." - Hindu Heritage Month Act, 2016

Hinduism is considered by some as one of the world's oldest religions, dating back over 10,000 years. With over 900 million followers worldwide, Hinduism is the third-largest religion. Hinduism is a henotheistic religion that worships one God without denying the existence of other gods. Some of these deities include Brahma, Shiva, Paarvathi, Lakshmi, Ganesha, Muruga, Kaali, and Vishnu, along with others. Hinduism consists of many traditions and festivities that are celebrated throughout the year. Diwali, Navaratri, and Ganesh Chaturthi are some celebrations in which Hindus participate in Ontario, Canada, and around the world.

### November is Albanian Heritage Month:

November is Albanian Heritage Month as proclaimed by the Ontario government in 2015. Albania is situated in eastern Europe, and the main language spoken is Albanian. The majority of Albanians identify as Muslim followed by Eastern Orthodox and Roman Catholic. There are approximately 29000 Canadians with Albanian ethnicities. The month of November is significant to people of Albanian origin as it commemorates the Albanian Declaration of Independence which took place on November 28, 1912. Albania also recognizes Liberation Day, a day that Albanian



place on November 28, 1912. Albania also recognizes Liberation Day, a day that Albania was liberated from Nazi Germany forces after the Albanian resistance on November 29, 1944.

The proclamation of November as Albanian Heritage Month recognizes the diverse ways in which Albanian Canadians have contributed to the intricate social and cultural makeup of Ontario. It is a month to celebrate Albanian identity and acknowledge the histories and lived experiences of Albanian Canadians.

### Treaties Recognition Week - November 3 -9

"Today, some Canadians see treaties as artifacts of another era in their history, with no current relevance. First Nations people view treaties as "living" agreements that respect their status as nations, as recognized in the Royal Proclamation of 1763. They see this as



their "inherent right" referred to in Section 35 of the Canadian Constitution." (Maurice Switzer, "We are all…Treaty People" p.34)

During the week of November 3 - 9, we recognize the importance of treaties and bring awareness to the treaty relationships between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people in the province. There are 46 treaties in Ontario and we all have a responsibility to honour the treaties.

At Elder's Mills, some of the understandings we will be exploring next week include the definition of a Treaty. We invite you to engage with your child about their learning.

### November 4 - 10 marks the annual Holocaust Education Week (HEW).

Learning about the Holocaust in classrooms, schools, and workplaces across the YRDSB is critical to countering antisemitism and other forms of hate.

The Holocaust was the systemic, state-sponsored persecution and murder of six million Jewish people by the Nazi regime and its allies, and it's critical that we not allow this cruel chapter of modern history to fade from memory. During Holocaust Education Week, it is important to also acknowledge that other racialized people, the Romas, people with physical disabilities, and those who identify as 2SLGBTQI+, among others, were also targeted and murdered by the Nazis. Holocaust Education re-humanizes those who experienced and continue to experience the impact of the Holocaust.
