<u>Treaties Recognition Week - November 6 - 12, 2022</u>

Did you know that the first week of November is officially Treaties Recognition Week in Ontario?

During the week of November 6-12, 2022, we recognize the importance of treaties and bring awareness to the treaty relationships between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people in the province. There are 46 treaties in Ontario and we all have a responsibility to honour the treaties.

"Today, some Canadians see treaties as artifacts of another era in their history, with no current relevance.

First Nations people view treaties as "living" agreements that respect their status as nations, as recognized in the Royal Proclamation of 1763. They see this as their "inherent right" referred to in Section 35 of the

At Elder's Mills, some of the understandings we will be exploring next week include the definition of a Treaty. We invite you to engage with your child about their learning.

Canadian Constitution." (Maurice Switzer, "We are all... Treaty People" p.34)

Qu'est-ce qu'un traité? What is a Treaty?

Our responsibilities to uphold treaties lasts as long as the sun shines, the grass grows and the rivers flow. A Treaty is a living agreement, a promise. We made a promise in 1764. The promises mean that First Nations agreed to share the land and that they have rights as Nations. Our Treaty promise is woven into a treaty belt, a wampum belt. Treaty belts are made from wampum and they represent promises made to last. The colours also have meaning and the designs are used to tell the history of the belt's creation. The treaty is a living promise that means all people are Treaty People. Do you know what our treaty belt looks like?



REMINDERS FROM THE OFFICE

Reporting Lates and Absences

- 3. Parents may choose to contact the school office at 905-893-1631 between 8:30 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. on the day of absence.

Communicating absences and lates using the above-mentioned options will support our school Safe Arrival process and minimize the need for automated call-outs. Thank you.

A note to families of students in portable classrooms:

Please be reminded that you must follow the same procedures for arrival and departure as with families of students in the building.

- If you are bringing your child to school, please drop them off at the end of the tarmac
 - Do not walk them up the stairs to the portable
- Arriving after the bell?
 - You must bring your child to the front entrance so they may be signed in at the office and their attendance recorded
- Picking up early?
 - o Inform the office and your child will be waiting to be picked up in the office
- End of day pick up?
 - Please wait at the edge of the tarmac for your child to come to you
 - o If in the Kiss'n'Ride, do not exit your vehicle or leave it unattended
- Need to speak with the teacher?
 - We have had several instances of parents disrupting the beginning of the instructional day for our students in the portable, requesting an audience with the teacher
 - Please call the school or the teacher to arrange an appointment time

Hindu Heritage Month:

On December 8, 2016, the province of Ontario designated November as Hindu Heritage Month as

outlined in the <u>Hindu Heritage Month Act</u>. Hindus first arrived in Canada at the beginning of the 20th century. During various waves of immigration, Hindus from all parts of the world continued to make Canada their home from the 1960s to present day. There are many Hindus who have settled in the Greater Toronto Area, including York Region.

"By proclaiming the month of November as Hindu Heritage Month, the Province of Ontario recognizes the important contributions that Hindu Canadians have made to Ontario's social, economic, political and cultural fabric. Hindu Heritage Month is an opportunity to remember, celebrate and educate future generations about Hindu Canadians and the important role that they have played and continue to play in communities across Ontario." - Hindu Heritage Month Act, 2016



Hinduism is considered by some as one of the world's oldest religions, dating back over 10,000 years. With over 900 million followers worldwide, Hinduism is the third-largest religion. Hinduism is a henotheistic religion that worships one God without denying the existence of other gods. Some of these deities include Brahma, Shiva, Paarvathi, Lakshmi, Ganesha, Muruga, Kaali, and Vishnu, along with others. Hinduism consists of many traditions and festivities that are celebrated throughout the year. Diwali, Navaratri, and Ganesh Chaturthi are some celebrations in which Hindus participate in Ontario, Canada, and around the world.


