

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS - NEW*

Online learning graduation requirement

Beginning with students that entered Grade 9 in the 2020-21 school year, students must must be successful in at least two online learning credits to earn their Ontario Secondary School Diploma.

The online learning graduation requirement also applies to adult learners that will be entering the Ontario secondary school system starting in 2023-24 school year.

Opting Out

Parents/Guardian who wish to opt out or exempt their child from the online graduation requirement must complete the opt-out form available from YRDSB. Exemption from the online learning graduation requirements may be requested by:

- the parent or guardian of the secondary student
- students who are 18 years of age or older
- students who are 16 or 17 years of age and have withdrawn from parental control

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS



What do you need to graduate from high school?

30 Credits: 18 Compulsory Credits and 12 Optional Credits

Compulsory credits are comprised of the following:

- 4 credits in English (5 credit per grade)*
- 3 credits in Mathematics (1 gredt in Grade 11 or 12)
- 2 credits in Science
- 1 credit in Canadian History
- 1 credit in Canadian Geography
- 1 credit in The Arts
- 1 credit in Health and Physical Education
- 1 credit in French as a Second Language
- 0.5 credit in Career Studies
- 0.5 credit in Civica

In addition, students must complete:

- 12 optional creditat
- 40 hours of community involvement activities.
- the provincial literacy requirement
- earn at least two credits through Online Learning ****

Plus ONE compulsory credit from each of the following groups:

Group 1

- English (including the Ontario Secondary) School Literacy Course)
- French as a Second Language, Classical Languages, International Languages
- Indigenous Languages
- Canadian and World Studies
- + First Nations, Mets, and Inuit Studies.
- Social Sciences and Humanities
- · Guidance and Career Education
- Cooperative Education***

A maximum of 3 credits in English as a Second Language (ESL) or English Literacy Development (ELD) may be counted towards the 4 computory credits in English, but the fourth must be a credit earned for a Grade 12 computory English course.

In groups 1, 2 and 3, a maximum of 2 credits in French as a Second Language can count as compulsory credits, one from group 1 and one from either group 2 or group 1.

A maximum of 2 credits in Cooperative Education can count as compulsory credits.

^{***} Families who wish to got out their child from the Online Learning graduation requirement should episit to their child's achool.

[†] The 12 optional credits may include up to 4 credits samed through approved Dual Credit courses.

Student's achieving an OSSD Red Seal Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM) diploms will have additional requirements based on their particular program.

GR. 10 ONTARIO SECONDARY SCHOOL LITERACY TEST - OSSLT

- A diploma requirement
- Administered in grade 10
- EQAO has shared that they plan to administer the test online this Spring.
- Accommodations, deferrals, and exemptions may be appropriate for some students
- If the standard is not met in first attempt, schools will provide remedial support; test is re-administered until the student successfully completes the test, or they earn the Grade 12 Literacy Course credit

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

- A diploma requirement
- Encourages civic responsibility, promotes community values, and reinforces importance of volunteerism
- Complete 40 hours before graduation
- Requires prior approval
- Student responsibility to keep record of activities

FULL TIME STUDENT STATUS

- Students are required to carry a full time course load
- This means Grade 9 11 students carry eight courses (four each semester with no study periods)
- Grade 12 students carry a minimum of six courses (three in each semester)
- Students must have earned 24 credits and be in grade 12 before they may have a study period

FULL DISCLOSURE

- Only successfully completed courses from grades 9 and 10 appear on your transcripts
- All grade 11 and 12 courses that you attempt will appear on your transcript whether you pass them or not
- Ask about the full disclosure date at summer school, night school, or e-learning school if you plan to drop a course and avoid full disclosure

APPRENTICESHIP OR SKILLED TRADE

- It is strongly recommended that you take Co-operative Education in grade 11 or 12
- Pay close attention to your Mathematics,
 Science, and English requirements
- In most cases you will first have to find your own certified employer (Journey Person) to train you
- In some cases you may then go directly to work with your Journey Person

APPRENTICESHIP OR SKILLED TRADE

- In some cases, you may train directly at a college
- In all cases, you will have to register with the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities (MTCU), and this is where your Co-op teacher can make a world of difference!

COLLEGE DIPLOMA

By the end of Grade 12, Ontario Colleges will require you to have:

- successfully completed ENG4C
- a mix of C, M, & U type courses
- not just open courses

UNIVERSITY OR COLLEGE DEGREE

- By the end of Grade 12, you must successfully complete 6 grade 12 courses with a '4M' or a '4U' code
- The average of these 6 courses varies by program and post secondary institution
- Be sure to check the average requirements
- These requirements apply to both University degree programs and to College Degree programs

 Mathematics.








