

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

18 compulsory credits

Students must earn the following compulsory credits to obtain the Ontario Secondary School Diploma:

Plus one credit from each of the following groups:

4	credits in English (1 credit per grade)*
3	credits in mathematics (1 credit in Grade 11 or 12)
2	credits in science
1	credit in Canadian history
1	credit in Canadian geography
1	credit in the arts
1	credit in health and physical education
1	credit in French as a second language
0.5	credit in career studies
0.5	credit in civics

In addition, students must complete:

1	12 optional credits [†]
1	40 hours of community involvement activities
1	the provincial literacy requirement

Group 1:

- English or French as a second language**
- a Native language
- a classical or international language
 - · social sciences and the humanities
 - · Canadian and world studies
- · guidance and career education
- cooperative education***

Group 2:

- · health and physical education
- the arts
 - · business studies
 - French as a second language**
 - cooperative education***

Group 3:

- science (Grade 11 or 12)
- technological education
 - French as a second language**
 - · computer studies
 - cooperative education***

^{*} A maximum of 3 credits in English as a second language (ESL) or English literacy development (ELD) may be counted towards the 4 compulsory credits in English, but the fourth must be a credit earned for a Grade 12 compulsory English course.

^{**} In groups 1, 2 and 3, a maximum of 2 credits in French as a second language can count as compulsory credits, one from group 1 and one from either group 2 or group 3.

^{***} A maximum of 2 credits in cooperative education can count as compulsory credits.

[†] The 12 optional credits may include up to 4 credits earned through approved dual credit courses.

THE GRADE 10 LITERACY TEST

 A Diploma requirement. Administered in Spring of the grade 10 year.



- A test based on language and communication (reading and writing) expectations of curricula up to and including grade 9
- Accommodations, deferrals and exemptions may be appropriate for some students
- If the standard is not met in the first attempt, schools will provide support; test is re-administered until student successfully completes the test or the Grade 12 Literacy Course

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT









- A diploma requirement
- Encourages civic responsibility, promotes community values and reinforces importance of volunteerism
- Complete 40 hours before graduation
- Can begin in summer of grade 8
- Must obtain approval before starting involvement
- Student responsibility to keep record of activities
- Guidelines and forms will be provided to help track community involvement
- A great way to explore career interests







- Work with the community around Innovation, Creativity and Entrepreneurship, Coding or Mathematics.




