
Good Neighbour Relationships

The students of ECSS have a shared responsibility with our community partners to ensure an inviting and clean environment for our neighbours and our community. Students are asked to respect the property and privacy of our neighbours. Although the Al Palladini Community Center, the Pierre Berton Resource Library and the Business establishments at the Plaza are public facilities, they are to be treated as private property by our students. Students are not to loiter in, or near, these establishments. To be inside Al Palladini Community Center, students must have a Community Center membership and they must be participating in community activities. We are proud of our students as they are ECSS ambassadors wherever they go in the community.

School Safety

In the interest of safely dropping off and picking up your child and to help traffic move smoother, we ask parents not to drop their children off or stop in the wheelchair bus area. Cars stopping in the wheelchair bus area block traffic behind them causing it to be slower for everyone and our wheelchair buses are unable to drop off and/or pick-up our students in a timely manner. In addition, the lanes directly in front of the main entrance are emergency and bus lanes, please do not use these lanes to drop off or pick up your child. If you drive your child to school, you know that it can be quite busy. You can avoid the morning rush by dropping your child off before 7:45 a.m., carpooling, or encouraging your child to walk or make use of public transit.

OSSLT READING & WRITING TIP SHEETS

Tips for Reading: General Strategies

Type of information	Definition	Strategies
Explicit	Information that is directly stated in the text	Skim and scan
	The answer is in the text	
Implicit	Information that is indirectly stated The best answer requires making an inference based on clues in the reading	Use clues from text (bold, italics, keywords) Make predictions while you read
Making Connections	Relating something you read to your background knowledge (something you've read, heard, seen) or personal experience (something you've felt or done).	Ask questions while you read Re-read

Before Reading

- Read the questions first
- Skim the text, looking for bolded words, headings

During Reading

- Highlight or underline main ideas and supporting details
- Make text-to-text, text-to-self and/or text-to-world connections while you read
- Ask questions as you read
- If you don't understand something, re-read

After Reading

- Answer the "easy" questions first
- Re-read your answers



Tips for Open Response Reading Questions



Read and reread the question carefully


Answer using specific details from the text

Check to make sure you have fully answered the question

Keep your answer to 100 words



Tips for Writing Short Writing Tasks



 \mathbf{S} tate your opinion or the main idea in the first sentence

Support your reasons with specific evidence (quotes from a reading, examples from your life, other texts, fake or real)

Show (explain) how evidence supports opinion/why it's important

Always reread the question to make sure you've answered it fully



Finding Main Ideas & Supporting Details

Main idea

Supporting Details

Central theme, event, or conflict

Specific details related to main idea (facts, statistics, examples)

Often implicit (not directly stated)

Almost always explicit (directly stated)

In a Paragraph:

- Look at first sentence (topic sentence)
- Look at last sentence (concluding sentence)

In a News Report:

- Look at headline
- Look at first (lead) paragraph (contains who, what, where & when)

In a Narrative:

- Look for the problem (conflict)
- Look for the resolution (solution)




Writing About Main Ideas & Supporting Details

Main Idea:

- Use the question to start your answer
- State in your own words

Supporting Details:

- Reference a specific line or paragraph number
- Quote part of the text



Tips for All Written Responses

What you should be doing in ANY written response

State idea or opinion



Support with specific and relevant evidence



Show how evidence connects to idea/opinion





Checklist for Short Writing Tasks

Topic Development

- Topic Sentence: State your idea or opinion
- f U se specific details to support your answer
- Provide an explanation of how details connect to opinion
- ☐ Answer the question fully (use all 6 lines)
- □ Concluding Sentence: Re-state idea or opinion



Writing Conventions

- ☐ Read your work "out loud" (mouth it) to make sure it makes sense
- Remember to capitalize **MINTS** (**M**onths and days **I N**ames of people and places **T**itles **S**tart of sentence)


