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Administrators' Message



Happy New Year!

Wishing you and your family all the best for 2017!

On behalf of the staff of Glenn Gould Public School, we are very happy to welcome everyone back. We wish everyone good health and joy in the year to come. We have much to celebrate and many exciting adventures ahead.

The Glenn Gould community has once again demonstrated compassion and generosity by donating clothes and toys to support the York Region Policy Holiday Hero's Drive. Many thanks to the generous, empathetic families in our community.

We know with some certainty that our students will be graduating into a world that is based on the ability to think critically, problem solve and apply information. They will require competency with a complex set of skills in order to deconstruct, construct, co-construct and reconstruct meaning effectively. Students will require an education that has a solid foundation in basic literacy and numeracy skills but which also supports deep thinking and action.

To support this, the Teaching-Learning Critical Pathway (TLCP) is a promising model used to organize actions for teaching and student learning. The basic idea of the pathway is that classroom practice can be organized in a practical, precise and highly personalized manner for each student, with the intended outcome being increased achievement for all students. This model is an organizer for deep learning and inquiry. However, it should be noted that a teaching-learning pathway is not simply a technical exercise. It also involves new ways of working together as educators collaboratively focus on achievement and assessment, reflect on their practices and work together with a common goal in mind. This type of work is grounded in teacher expertise, creative thinking and new knowledge.

As part of this process, teachers this year will be engaged in job embedded professional learning opportunities focusing on math and modern learning. Teachers work together in small or large groups to discuss initiatives centred around curriculum expectations, assessment of and for learning, and critical thinking strategies. Job embedded professional learning provides teachers with opportunities to imagine ways and means to improve student learning by doing. It is about small, focused and precise steps that result in improving life chances for all students. The TLCP embraces the belief and understanding that all students can learn and all teachers can teach to high standards and articulate their practice.

As with any complex process, this initiative takes time, and intentional work. The benefit to students is critical in supporting their development and preparing them for the our ever evolving society.


Kindergarten Registration

Children who turn four or five years old during 2017, live within the school boundary and whose parents are public school tax supporters will be eligible to register for kindergarten. Dress Warmly for Cold Weather



All our students will be expected to be outside before, during and after school in all weather conditions (i.e., rain or shine, snow or heat). It is advisable for children to keep extra pants and socks at school in case they get wet. French Immersion Registration

Information sessions for the French Immersion (FI) program will take place at French Immersion schools on January 19, 2017 at 7 p.m.

Please visit YRDSB's website in January 2017 (<http://www.yrdsb.ca/Programs/fi/Pages/Program-Locations.aspx>) to find the FI program location for your elementary school location.

FI registration will begin January 20, 2017. Parents or guardians of Senior Kindergarten students entering Grade 1 in 2017, and wishing to enroll in the FI Program, can visit or call the school office and request an *Office Index Card - short version*. The Office Index Card must be signed by the principal of the home school. Parents or guardians then take this form, along with one piece of identification showing their address to the designated FI program location to register between January 20 and February 10, 2017. This eliminates the need to provide duplicate enrollment information or to pre-register.

Parking Lot, Bus Loop and Street Safety

Like you, we plan on your child arriving to and from school safely. For this purpose, the Board has provided the school with two separate driveways. **On the South side of the school, is a “Kiss’N Ride” loop for parents.** The parking spaces in the “Kiss’N Ride” loop are for school staff only. **On the East side of the school, is a “Bus Loop” for school buses and taxis.** Parents are asked not to use this loop for student pick-up, drop-off or for parking. Do not park your vehicle at the front of the school at any time. There is plenty of parking on many of the side streets for up to 3 hours. Feel free to park and walk your child over to our school.

Some students are not eligible for bussing while others are, as they live within the Board mandated walking distances. **We strongly encourage you to walk your child to and from school.**

Kiss N’ Ride and Bus Loop

The **“Kiss’N Ride”** loop is identified by signs and designated for parents and family members picking-up or dropping-off children. Please do not drop off students on Vellore Park Ave or Highmark Dr., as it is not safe for students to walk through a Kiss N’ Ride or Bus Loop.

We are requesting parents who are choosing to drop off their children in the morning to abide by the following rules:

1. Arrive to school between 8:50 and 9:00 a.m..
2. Drive all the way through the loop and only drop off your children in the Drop-Off zone. Follow the map provided)
3. Pull all the way up into the drop off zone—8 - 10 cars can drop off at the same time.
4. Students should have their bags ready on their laps.
5. To ensure a quick and safe drop-off or pickup, **parents are not to get out of the vehicle.**
6. Students are to exit from the passenger side of the vehicle ONLY.
7. Students should never walk through the parking lot or bus loop.
8. **End of day Pick-Up: You will have to circle the loop, exit onto Highmark and re-enter the loop if your child is not ready for pick-up at the end of the day.**
9. Park your car on the street if you have younger children who need assistance (in order to reduce congestion in the drop off zone).
10. Use your signal to merge when exiting the drop off zone.
11. Abide with instructions given by Glenn Gould staff monitoring the parking lot.



Math Tips for Families

Math Tips for Parents

Supporting math learning and encouraging your child to love math



You are a math teacher!

We all know that reading with a child helps literacy skills, and that playing sports in the backyard teaches the value of teamwork and being physically active. But where are the life lessons for mathematics?

The truth is that we all use mathematics many times each day, but often don't realize it. From trips to the grocery store to swinging in a hammock, math is part of our daily lives.

Don't underestimate your own math skills. You can help your child learn math!

"You are their idol. They look up to you. They don't do a good job listening to you, but they do a fantastic job imitating you." – Karl Subban, retired Toronto school principal and father of three NHL hockey players (P.K., Malcolm and Justin)

Math in everyday life

It is important to help children recognize that everyone uses math all the time. Here are tips to help your child have a positive attitude about mathematics.

- Make learning math a positive experience. Don't talk negatively about math to your child—it can lead to "math anxiety" (a proven cause of low achievement).
- Schedule math homework at the same time in a quiet location every day. Be available during this period to talk with your child. Create a math homework toolkit with pencils, erasers, ruler, protractor, graph paper, counters (beads or beans) and a calculator.
- When helping with homework, follow the method being taught. Don't teach short cuts that could confuse your child. Do not say, "Let me show you my way – it's simpler and faster."
- Be relaxed and positive. You are not expected to be an expert. You are there to encourage learning.

Math Tips for Families con't

- If your child becomes frustrated, stop. Remind your child of the things they have already learned how to do successfully, such as riding a bicycle, writing a paragraph or speaking a second language.
- Ask your child's teacher for strategies to use at home that reflect your child's learning style. If your child asks for help and you do not know the answer, be honest and say, "I don't know, but let's figure it out together." If you continue to be unsuccessful, you can also ask your child's teacher for help. This gives your child permission to ask for help as well.

Be a math role model

Children learn by imitating the people around them. Imitating a parent's positive attitude about education helps children develop healthy academic skills.


- Talk out loud as you do everyday tasks. Talking out loud allows children to hear how you think and helps them develop important skills for "thinking things out" and solving problems.
- Do informal math together. On rainy days, family evenings and vacation time, play math games such as *Dino Math Tracks*, *Dominoes* or *Connect Four*. Show your child that math is fun!
- Parents worry about the amount of time that children spend on the computer and the quality of online content, but many educational web-based games, such as *Mathfrog* and *Calculation Nation*, encourage mathematical skills.
- Watch educational television programs like *The Prime Radicals* on TVO or *Cyberchase* on PBS. These programs also have websites with activities to do together, including game apps, math crafts and songs.
- Grocery stores are a great source of math lessons. For example, you can talk aloud about how to weigh fruit on a scale or how to estimate the total cost of groceries as you fill your cart.
