For those who are new to the Hartman school community, our school has an 'Arts Focus'. This simply means that the arts are used as an approach to effectively engage students with the curriculum. The Arts are fundamental components of all cultures. Therefore, it can also provide students with an opportunity to see themselves reflected in the curriculum. When the Arts are integrated into the curriculum, this allows students to make connections with the curriculum and to demonstrate their knowledge and understanding in different ways! This is why, as you walk through the hallways at Hartman or enter classrooms, you will see beautiful art work posted! This is also the reason for bringing quality arts performers into the school, so that students get many opportunities to view, discuss and learn from artists in the community. Cook up some fun in the kitchen with your family!

The Dietitians from York Region Public Health are pleased to launch *Cook Up Some Fun!* - a campaign designed to help families with children aged 2 to 14 years plan, shop, cook and enjoy eating meals together. The campaign provides valuable how-to information, tips and resources to families about cooking together. It also provides lesson plan ideas for how

teachers can introduce food skills into the curriculum. When families have fun cooking together and developing food skills, they tend to eat together more often.

Research shows that children who eat with their families are more likely to have healthier eating habits and better nutrition, be a healthy weight and have less chance of developing eating disorders. Eating together not only provides an opportunity to teach manners and social skills but it's linked to better language and literacy development as well as improved school performance. Teens are less likely to participate in risky behaviours such as smoking and drinking when they eat with their families more often.

Roots of Empathy

Our school has been invited to participate in a program called Roots of Empathy (ROE). Roots of Empathy is an evidence based program that has shown dramatic effect in reducing levels of aggression among children while raising social competence and increasing empathy. This year the program is running in our three kindergarten classes by our DECE'S Mrs. Brennan, Mrs. Rahman and Mrs. Riddell who have been trained as ROE instructors. This program teaches children about feelings, their own feelings, and the feelings of others. Once every three weeks, a baby and her parents will visit the classroom. A ROE instructor will gather the children in the classroom around a green blanket and together they watch the baby grow.

The children predict and cheer when their ROE baby reaches the 'developmental milestones' of the first year: "She can roll over!" "She can crawl!"

The ROE Instructor also coaches the children in observing the baby and reading the cues the baby gives as to how the baby is feeling: "Is the baby happy or sad?" "How can you tell?" And we use this discussion as a lever to talk about their own emotions and to understand how their classmates feel: "Do you smile when you're happy?" "How can you tell if your friend is happy?" Being able to understand how other people are feeling is called **empathy**. In this experiential learning, the baby is the "Teacher" and a catalyst the instructor uses to help children identify and reflect on their feelings and the feelings of others. The ROE instructors will be teaching using specialized lesson plans for the nine themes of the program.

Substitute Peanut Butter

A substitute peanut butter product is being marketed to consumers as a safe alternative for children to bring to schools in place of peanut butter. We ask that parents refrain from including these kinds of products in your child's lunches or snacks. These products tend to look, taste, and smell very much like peanut butter. While the product is nut free, it mimics a known allergen that causes anaphylaxis in some children to the degree that it is indistinguishable from the allergen. It is a convincing substitute, opening up the possibility that it can be confused as peanut butter, or worse yet, peanut butter could be confused as this soy-based product.

The safety and well-being of our students is our first priority, which is why our schools have procedures in place

Extreme Weather Conditions

Policy and Procedure #152.0, Inclement Weather Days *Outlines the commitment of the York Region District School Board to having each school within the Region open every instructional day. Recognizing that emergencies such as the breakdown of essential services or inclement weather can occur, the safety of students and staff shall be the prime consideration when decisions are made.

If road conditions force the cancellation of bus services, the following stations will be informed as early as possible, and will broadcast pertinent information to the community.

As outlined in the Inclement Weather Days policy and procedure, parents/guardians are responsible for:

- being aware of where they can obtain information about bus and/or school cancellations, such as, but not limited to, radio, television media, the <u>Student Transportation Services</u> website, and on the school's voicemail recording;
- using their best judgment to decide whether to send their children to school on inclement weather days when buses are cancelled but schools remain open;
- understand that if they choose to send their child to school on an inclement weather day, that their child should remain at school for the day and not request to leave through the main office during the day, unless due to a real emergency;
- being aware of the Extreme Hot and Cold Weather and UV Protection Guideline * and ensuring that their child(ren) are prepared for the weather conditions;
- following the school's safe arrival procedure on inclement weather days if their child is not planning to attend;
- recognizing that on inclement weather days, there are no lunch service arrangements, special lunches or special events/field trips and therefore should send a lunch with their child;
- making arrangements to have their child picked up at the end of the school day, if they transport their child to school, on days when school buses are cancelled; and
- making every attempt to ensure their child knows where they are to go if they arrive home early and cannot enter his/her home.
