Dear Parents,

This is the time of year when we begin to make decisions for next school year. The Ministry of Education has maintained a cap for primary class sizes (students in grades 1-3). We anticipate having combined classes, as we organize the school based on enrolment projections and ministry guidelines. When organizing classes, we take into account a number of important factors to provide an optimum learning environment for your child for their class placement. These include: class size, a range of student performance levels, gender balance, special needs and promoting positive social relationships, in order to develop ideal learning environments at Hartman PS.

Should you have any information that you believe is relevant to your child's placement next year (e.g., conflict with other students, learning styles, twins' placements), please contact the school office and / or submit a brief letter to the principal. Teaching assignments see continual adjustments to the end of the school year and sometimes into the summer months, so we ask that you do not make a specific request for a staff member. Thank you for understanding the criteria we consider for all of our students to achieve the best learning environment for all of our students.

Parking Reminders

The front of our school is our Kindergarten Kiss and Ride. We have a number of spots for parking out front and we would encourage you to use these if you are picking up or dropping off your child and need to park. The Town of Aurora has been issuing tickets to vehicles parked in the fire route.

Hot Weather is Coming—Appropriate Dress and Sun Safety

The hot weather is upon us and we want to take the time to remind our community of a few sun safety tips. In order to stay safe in the sun all students should wear clothing to cover their arms and legs, wear a wide-brimmed hat and apply sunscreen SPF 30 of higher before coming to school in the morning. Students are encouraged to drink lots of water and to bring a reusable water bottle to school. This year we have now installed 3 water bottle filling stations at Hartman.


