A Message from the Administration

Throughout the school year staff at HG Bernard PS work to improve outcomes for students in the areas of literacy, numeracy, and school climate. This work is ongoing and is reflected in our School Improvement Plan. The plan reflects our focused and intentional work which builds on the system's work and aligns with the Board Improvement Work Plan, the Director's Annual Plan and the Trustees' Multi-Year Plan. Our plan at HG Bernard has three key areas: Literacy, Numeracy, and School Climate. Within each area we have identified needs, goals, strategies, and professional learning. This plan helps us identify where we are on the continuum toward addressing student needs and achieving school developed targets.

Our school's Literacy goal is to further develop our students' ability to engage in 'purposeful talk'. Purposeful talk is defined as 'coming to an intellectual exchange willing to see and hear something new in the exchange, and actually creating a newer, stronger understanding because of the exchange.' (Comprehension Through Conversation. Maria Nichols) Purposeful talk supports the development of critical thinking, and helps children learn how to analyze and synthesize information; it improves reading comprehension and writing skills.

In Numeracy our goal is to ensure students develop both conceptual understanding and fluency and flexibility with numbers. Students need to be able to problem solve, and explain and justify their solutions. Engaging in problem solving also helps students understand the relationship between numbers, and allows them to choose strategies and models to support their thinking.

Our Positive Climates goal is to create a school climate in which all students and staff feel a sense of belonging, and are able to take risks and participate fully. We know that if staff and students have a Growth Mindset (as opposed to a Fixed Mindset) and if students are praised for hard work and perseverance, instead of 'being smart', they have a greater potential for success. Through many initiatives we continually work to create an environment in which all students and staff feel welcome and included, regardless of gender, race, ethnicity, language, grades, appearance, religion or faith, sexual orientation, socioeconomic status (SES), physical/intellectual ability, or gender identity.

We use a variety of data sources to inform and revise our School Improvement Plan. We analyze report card data, Reading assessments, Mathematics assessments, surveys, incident reports, EQAO results, and other classroom-based sources. Professional learning strategies for staff at HG Bernard PS align with the student learning needs in the school. Monitoring of our progress toward the attainment of our goals and targets is ongoing. Our School Improvement plan tightly aligns with the York Region District School Board's objectives for increased student achievement and well being. We'll keep you posted on our progress.

On Wednesday, February 26 Earth Rangers came to H. G. Bernard. The students in Kindergarten to grade six participated in an interactive presentation focused on conservation. Students were

encouraged to *take action* to help protect endangered animals and their homes. By doing small things, such as turning off the taps when brushing their teeth, or turning the lights off when they leave the room, students can take steps to improve the environment. Earth



Rangers brought four guests with them to help deliver this very important message. They were Fantom (a black Pine Snake), Linus (a Harris Hawk), Sonic (a barn owl), and Dale (a Pine Marten). It was very exciting when Linus and Sonic swooped across the gym and almost touched the heads of some of our staff and students. Dale demonstrated his ability to climb branches on a tree when he walked across a rope suspended across two poles. Finally, students loved to see some of their teachers participate in an interactive drawing game to support the students understanding of how humans disrupt the habitat of some of these amazing animals.
