Student Bussing Eligibility

Did you know that students' bussing eligibility changes throughout their school career? Your son/daughter's eligibility to ride the school bus may change according to their grade and distance from home to school.

Below are the provisions for eligibility identified in the Board's Transportation Policy #680:

All YRDSB students in Grades JK-3 who live within 1.2 km of their school are not eligible for transportation

All YRDSB students in Grades 4-8 who live within 1.6 km of their school are not eligible for transportation

All YRDSB students in Grades 9-12 who live within a transit served area are not eligible for transportation.

The Grade Ones Visit with their Engineer-in-Residence In April, the Grade Ones were once again thrilled to spend the morning with their Engineer-in-Residence, Fabio Saposnik. As a culminating activity for their "Materials, Objects, and Everyday Structures" unit, the Grade Ones were given a CHALLENGE: build a model garage which would fit a miniature (lego) car and a miniature Fabio, and keep them dry. As a class, the Grade Ones decided that 15 sprays of a water bottle would be a fair trial. The students planned, designed, built and tested their garages, with the materials that were available: paper rolls, paper boxes, popsicle sticks, straws, egg cartons, tape, glue, and string. Waste Audits: How are we doing?




This year the Eco Team is once again trying to make sure that all your waste is going in the right bin. Many classes this year have done an excellent job in placing their different types of waste into the different bins. Earlier this year, members of the Eco Team did a week-long waste audit of the classroom recycling bins. There was also a whole-school garbage & recycling audit performed by the students of 7S under the supervision of Mme Los. Although there have been some problems in some classes on some days, the results have been good to excellent in other classrooms with the help of announcements, assemblies, and reminders from classmates and staff.

The caretaking staff in particular, have been helping to ensure that garbage, recyclables and organic waste are disposed of properly. Every day at 1:20, student helpers take their bags of recycling and compost to the gym lobby where the caretakers are waiting. This new system allows the caretakers and students to have a useful chat about which items go where. We're confident that this new system, together with the commitment of staff and students, will result in improved results with regards to waste management.

Remember to always put your waste in the right bin to help our beloved environment!!! If you notice someone putting compost in the recycling bin, remind them of the correct container. We hope that all classes will continue to dispose of their trash in the right place which will ultimately help our environment!

BAG 2 SCHOOL: An HGB EcoTeam Fundraiser



(http://www.bag2school.com/can/about_us/) This simple fundraiser teaches students about the importance of recycling and re-using, and it fosters environmental awareness at a young age. The students and their families will be making a positive impact by reducing the amount of textile waste in our landfills.

The only thing families need to do is to donate clothing that is no longer of use to them. Bag2School will come here to collect the donations and will give a cheque to the school based on the quantity of textiles collected. The more you give, the more we get! The funds raised will go towards a water-bottle filling station for the school.

How it works:

Re-using: More than 65 lbs. of clothing and textiles are discarded each year by the average person in North America. Most of the discarded textiles still have 75% wear left. Extending the life of clothing by just 3 months of active use would lead to a 5-10% reduction in each of carbon, water & waste.

Recycling: Clothing that can't be re-used can be recycled. The textile recycling industry turns old clothes and other textiles into insulation, upholstery stuffing and ingredients for paper products without producing any new hazardous waste or harmful by-products.

Please look through your closets and set aside clean clothes, soft toys, belts, purses, shoes (tied together) and boots (tied together) that you no longer want. Special bags from Bag2School will be available soon, but you could put the items in a plastic bag (e.g., shopping bag or garbage bag) for now. Items may be left in the front lobby of H. G. Bernard P.S. starting Monday, May 5. The last day to drop off your donations at the school is Monday, May 25.
