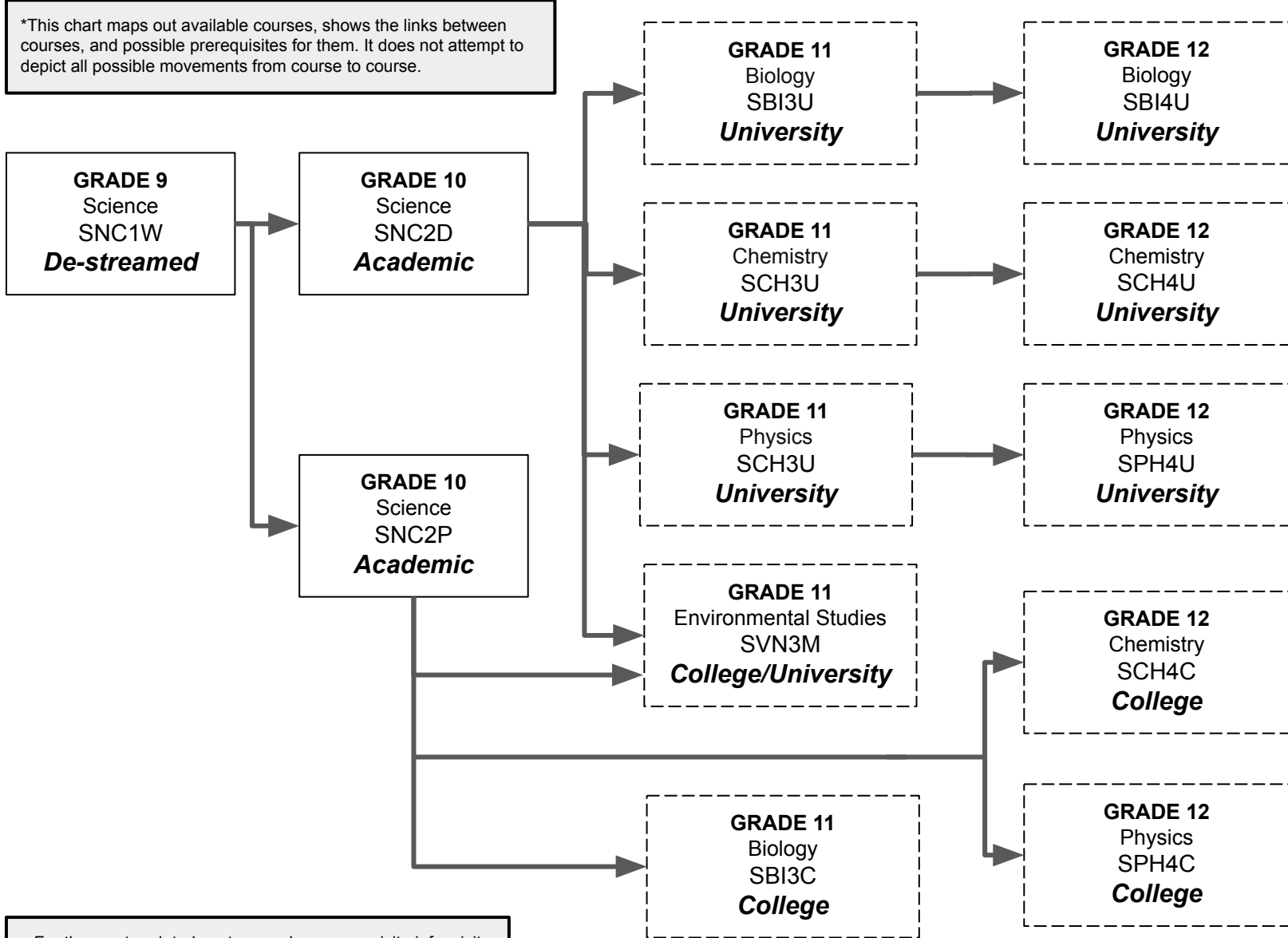

- Bachelor of Science

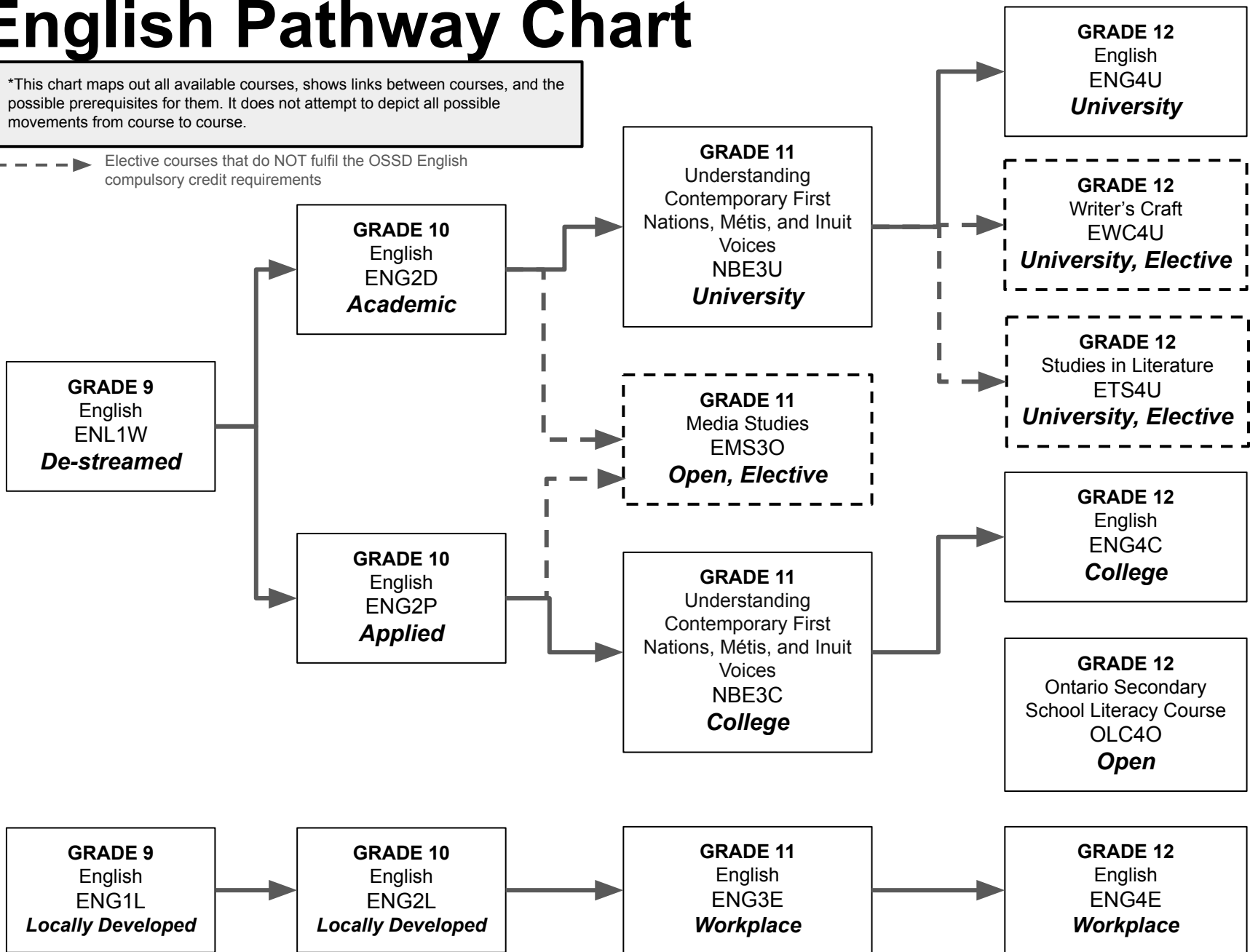
SPH4C or SPH3U are recommended for students pursuing a Skilled Trade requiring math (ex. electrician).

English Pathway Chart

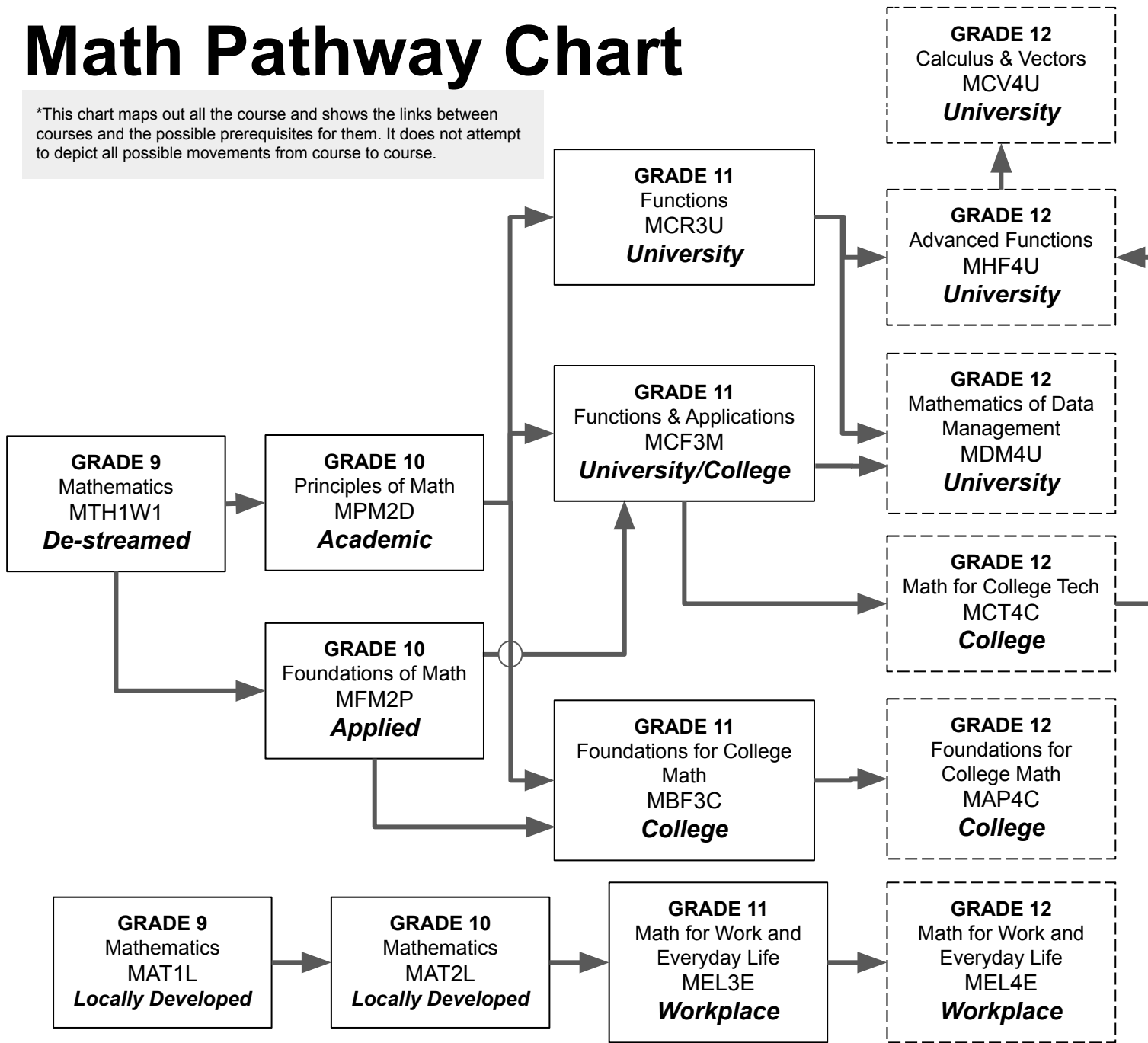
*This chart maps out all available courses, shows links between courses, and the possible prerequisites for them. It does not attempt to depict all possible movements from course to course.

MAP4C or MCT4C1 is usually a required course for students pursuing a Technology or Technician diploma program. Examples include:

- Civil Engineer Technician
- Electrical Engineering Technician
- Aviation Technology

MAP4C or MCT4C are recommended for students pursuing a Skilled Trade requiring math (ex. electrician).

Math Pathways

- If you are interested in college programs, you should be enrolled in MBF3C or MCF3M
- If you are interested in pursuing math related university programs, and you found OR are finding MPM2D challenging, it is **HIGHLY** recommended to take both MCF3M and MCR3U
- MCF3M will help to strengthen skills from MPM2D **WHILE** introducing concepts you will learn in more detail in MCR3U

New Course

CHT301-World History since 1900: Global and Regional Interaction (Intro to History of Film)

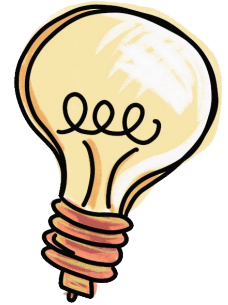
This course will serve as an introduction to the history of the film medium. Students will watch a number of films from the silent era to the present. Students will learn about the origins of cinema, from its humble beginnings, to the silent era, through to the transition to sound and colour. Some emphasis will be placed on the representation of race and gender in certain films studied, such as the representation of indigenous peoples in a film like *The Searchers*, or homosexuality in *Philadelphia*. As this is an open class, more challenging concepts such as Soviet Montage, Italian Neorealism, and the French New Wave will be discussed in the grade 12U IDC course.

Grade 11 NBE3C/U courses explore themes, forms, and stylistic elements of a variety of literary, informational, graphic, oral, cultural, and media text forms emerging from First Nations, Métis, and Inuit cultures in Canada, and also examines the perspectives and influence of texts that relate to those cultures.

What is the
34 CREDIT THRESHOLD
and how does it apply to me?

➔ **Did you know that...?**

- You need 30 credits to meet Ontario Secondary School Diploma graduation requirements. Most students will complete these credits within four years. If needed, you may earn up to 34 credits within five years.
- While enrolled in your first four consecutive years of secondary school, you may go beyond 34 credits.
- After secondary school, going beyond the 34 credit threshold is possible with:
 - E-learning • Night School • Summer School
 - Independent Learning Centres • Adult Day School

➔ **34 Credit Threshold does not apply...**

- if you have an Individual Education Plan (IEP)
- if you are not enrolled in secondary school
- To English as a Second Language (ESL) core language courses and/or English Literacy Development (ELD) core language courses

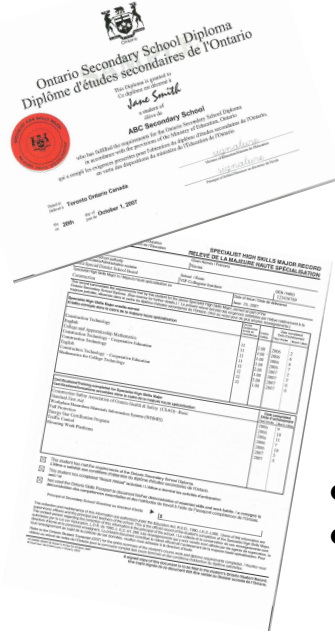

Dual Credit

- What Is It? - How Does it Work?

- take a first year college course one day/week
- 2 for 1 → Earn a college credit that can count toward a diploma or certificate + a bonus high school credit
- Spare on your HHSS timetable

- All free! (tuition, books, transportation, materials, etc.)

Dual Credit is a good fit for Gr.11 or 12 students who...

- Want to explore a career option
- Plan to go to College
- Are looking for something different from what's offered in high school
- Are behind in credits or at risk of not graduating
- Are in a SHSM program
- Like hands-on courses

TYPICALLY NOT FOR STUDENTS WHO ARE UNIVERSITY BOUND

COOPERATIVE EDUCATION

- This program is for students going to **university, college, apprenticeship or work.**
- Allows students to earn grade 11 or 12 credits in a **workplace setting** while exploring a career of their choice.
- Two co-op credits can be counted towards the compulsory groups.
- 2 credit coop code select coop2
- 4 credit coop select coop2am and coop2pm



The OYAP program – students earn high school credits and hours towards their apprenticeship in a trade.

College Admission Guidelines

- High school diploma required
- English- ENG4C1 or ENG4U1 - for all Diploma Programs
- Other requirements may require MAP4C1, SBI3C1, SCH4C1 or SPH4C1
- Additional requirements may include an interview, portfolio, audition, English Entrance Test, Math test, portfolio, etc.
- Degree Programs will require 6 U or M courses
- Consult specific college programs for entrance requirements

- High school diploma required
- English – ENG4U1
- Plus 5 other gr 12 U/M level classes (**(NOT Gr 11 Courses) Total of 6 Gr 12 U/M Classes**)

- Universities **may** consider Gr. 11 and 12 (“U” and “M”) courses for admission &/or prerequisites
- Schools are looking more at “**consistency**” between grade levels
