PROGRAMS AVAILABLE AT HURON

EXPLORING OPPORTUNITIES PROGRAM (EOP)

The Exploring Opportunities Program is for students with an interest and aptitude in the manufacturing, construction or transportation sectors (e.g., Precision Machining, CNC programmer, millwright, industrial millwright, industrial millwright, industrial millwright, industrial millwright...). Students may accumulate up to 5 credits while gaining valuable work experience and developing the essential skills and work habits needed for a career in the manufacturing industry. This program benefits you if:

- you are interested in participating in an Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYAP)
- you are interested in the option of Accelerated Level 1 College Apprenticeship Training during the school year
- you are considering participating in the Specialist High Skills Major Program (SHSM) in Manufacturing, Construction or Transportation.

Some certifications that may be included by the program are: CPR, First Aid, WHMIS, Fall Arrest, Propane Safety and CAD. Second semester offers a great opportunity for you to be able to earn a college credit while still in high school through our "Dual-Credit" Program with Georgian College (weekly training on Fridays in May/June in the Engineering Technology Division at Georgian College).

Sample courses: 2-5 credit package (there is the possibility of taking this as a 2-credit program if needed)

Gr. 11 or 12 College Math, 1 credit (other courses available based on student need)

Manufacturing, construction or transportation related Technology course, 1 credit

Co-op course, 2-3 credits (depending on hours accumulated)

COURSE NOTE: This is a package designed for students over 16 years of age with a minimum of 16 credits registered in a secondary school. Demonstrated aptitude and interest in the manufacturing, construction or transportation sector is a requirement. For an application package, contact the Guidance Department at Huron Heights.

The Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM) is a ministry approved specialized program that allows a student in ANY PATHWAY (College, Apprenticeship, Workplace, University) to hone in on skills in a specific sector while earning a high school diploma (OSSD). By using only a few of your electives, you can earn a SPECIALIZED DIPLOMA including industry standard training as you discover opportunities that will help you develop your personal learning goals. Everything will be documented on your transcript as proof that you have filled the requirements needed to earn an SHSM diploma. Begin by selecting SHSM on the right hand side of your screen of your course planner.

SOCIAL JUSTICE CERTIFICATE

Mission - Our mission is to promote the knowledge, skills, values and practices to meet the social, economic and environmental challenges of sustaining social justice.

Certificate Requirements: Students may earn the social justice certificate by fulfilling three requirements:

- successful completion of seven courses with an average of 70% from designated social justice course groupings: economic, social, political and environmental;
- successful completion of 80 hours of community service;

Service TRIPS - Students may participate in an organized service trip in their senior grades to another community. Possible trips: might visit a Canadian community or an overseas community.

BSP/ASP - Before School/After School Program
