#### ADMINISTRATOR'S MESSAGE

PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Guardians,

Thank you for coming out to our "**Meet and Greet**" Evening at the beginning of the month. It is so important that our students see that the staff and parents are communicating and working together. Repeatedly we have examples of immediate improvement of student achievement and well-being with a simple phone call or meeting between teacher and parent. Another excellent communication tool is the agenda. Parents should be checking the agenda each night to see that their child has completed all tasks assigned for homework.

Teachers of students identified with exceptionalities have been preparing **Individual Educational Plans**; these plans have gone home to consult and inform parents about the accommodations and in some cases modifications to the Ontario curriculum for their children.

Teachers are contacting parents about developing **Growth Plans** for their child to support their success in certain subject areas. **Growth plans** are also prepared for students who have significant areas of need in the area of "Learning Skills" and "Work Habits". Those areas would include: Responsibility, Organization, Independent Work, Collaboration, Initiative, and Self-Regulation. See page 2 for the YRDSB K-12 definition of each of these above mentioned skills. We are dedicated to meeting the needs of each child in our school. With your support we will work together so that your child will be successful socially, emotionally and academically.

Progress reports will be going home on November 22, 2012. Parent Teacher interviews will be held on Thursday November  $23^{\rm rd}$  afterschool and evening and on Friday November 23 during the day.

Secondary School Parent information nights have already begun for our grade 8 students. See page 7 for the list of evening sessions at the various schools. Our John McCrae students in our mainstream program are designated to attend Bur Oak Secondary School. Our students in our gifted learner program are designated to attend Markville Secondary School. All students can consider applying to the following programmes: Healthy Active Living and Sport School at Bill Crothers SS, Arts Unionville at Unionville H.S. or the IB programme at Bayview SS. If interested in any of these regional programmes please attend the information nights and get applications in on time.

Our next school assembly is scheduled for Monday October  $29^{th}$  at 11:15 (for all Full Day Kindergarten Classes, as well as grades 1 and 2 students); at 12:00 (for all grades 3-8 students). The focus of the assembly: Healthy Living and Being an Upstander!

#### YRDSB K-12 Working Definitions of "Learning Skills and Work Habits" Fall 2012

Responsibility refers to a culture where students are respectful of themselves, others, and materials. By being accountable for fulfilling commitments, completing and submitting assignments based on agreed upon timelines, and managing behavior in acceptable ways, a student exhibits responsibility. A student who is responsible shows respect for others, recognizes needs of others, and accepts responsibility for consequences resulting from actions, behaviours, and contributions.

**Organization** involves creating and following a plan by prioritizing tasks, setting goals and revising the plan to complete a task on time. A student enhances their readiness and ability to learn and/or engage in an activity by having all resources available to complete a task.

An independent learner is a self-directed student whose thoughts, energy, and time are managed to successfully complete a task within a reasonable time frame. When working independently, students understand and follow the academic, personal and community expectations that have been established. Independent students identify, manage, and respond to the challenges that arise (e.g., time, next steps) when working towards achieving learning goals and expectations. They adjust plans and/or access resources (e.g., learning tools, strategies, people) to support their success.

**Collaboration** supports collective learning among students. It is the ability to relate well to others, to cooperate, to contribute and work in teams, cohesively with mutual respect. Students engage in critical thinking to build consensus, solve problems, make decisions, and resolve conflicts. Students who demonstrate collaboration can work interdependently, engage others, actively listens, constructively contributes, respectfully challenges ideas, thinks strategically and is open to new ideas.

**Initiative** is evidence of a student's internal drive to do what they believe needs to be done to improve their learning and/or the learning of others. Their actions are productive and may include risk taking, curiosity, innovation and advocating for themselves and others.

**Self Regulation** refers to how students think about their thinking and their learning (metacognition), how they take strategic action to learn (self-assessment) and how they engage socially and emotionally in learning (engagement). *Ministry of Education*.

Ms Cockburn and I have taken considerable time these last few weeks to visit classrooms to share with students some key messages and to hear from the students about how they will help our school to have an even more positive and inclusive environment. 
#### For our Grades 1 and 2 students, we focused the message on the following:

- **Boundaries** please see the map below so that you can remind your children that they need to stay in their specified location during recess
- Children are only to play with other children in their own grade or one grade up or one grade below
- When a child comes up to another child to ask if they can play, our students need to say "Yes you can play"
- Keep working on walking on the right side of the hallway
- Continue to use the exit and entrance B1
- No trading of items
- Be sure to dress appropriately for the weather (parents are advised to see the YRDSB message regarding extreme weather on page 9
- When we build something outside in the sandbox or the snow it is simply there for the particular recess period, we do not own it
- Second Chances we all deserve a second chance. All children need to be welcomed and should not be isolated.

#### For our Grades 3 - 8 students In addition to the above.....

- Exit/entrance A1 for the following classes: Mr. Skilling, Ms. Cusimano, Ms. Choy
- Exit/entrance B1 for the following classes: Ms. Hoffenberg, Ms. Ducheck
- Exit/entrance C1 for the following classes: Mr. Kassam, Mr. Cheung, Ms. Bragan, Mr. McGouran
- Exit/entrance D1 for the following classes: Ms. Wong, Ms. Gorgey, Ms. Ukposidolo, Ms. Grandbois
- Exit/entrance at portable for the following classes: Mr. Brandt, Ms. Barnes, Ms. Baj, and Ms. Cherbel
- **Students are not to bring knives of any type to school** if a knife is discovered we are expected to notify the Superintendent immediately. An automatic 20 day suspension could result with an automatic expulsion hearing.
- No tackling many students are interested in touch football but there is to be no tackling
- Seek adults for assistance unlike the younger students, these students will often wait a little too long before seeking adult assistance; encourage students to seek adult assistance early before the small issue becomes a big issue
- Our School Improvement Plan focus: recognizing that each student has different strengths and needs and those needs may require accommodations and modifications. And that all children despite strengths or needs are important members of our John McCrae school community.
- **Key Elements of Bullying:** power, targeted and typically repeated

All parents new to volunteering in school-related activities at John McCrae P.S. must have a Vulnerable Sector Screening (VSS) conducted by the Police Department before they can volunteer in any capacity at John McCrae P.S. Once you have received the VSS, bring it to the office and we will keep it at the school on file. In subsequent years you will need to sign the Annual Offence Declaration form at the school only. The cost of the VSS if you are a volunteer is \$20.00. You will not have to incur this cost in any future years that you intend to volunteer because you will complete the Annual Offence Declaration at the school at no cost.

If you are considering volunteering at the school ask your child's teacher to send home the VSS application as well as a letter from our school indicating that you wish to volunteer here.

Go to the police station in Aurora located at 47 Don Hillock Drive — completed in approx 1 week; or go to the police station at Hillcrest Mall, Richmond Hill — completed in approx 3—4 weeks.

If you have volunteered in past years, you need to complete the Annual Offence Declaration and Confidentiality agreement at the school prior to resuming volunteering in this school year.

#### JMPS STUDENT CHOSEN FOR THE LEGISLATURE

Parnika, a grade 8 student in Ms. Gorgey's class recently completed a 6 week term serving as a Legislative Page at the Legislative Assembly of Ontario. Originally, her term of duty was expected to be four weeks long, however Parnika was one of the few pages to be called in to help out when the Legislature was called back two weeks early. According to Parnika, "This was my first job and I absolutely loved it. I was incredibly fortunate to be selected for this once in a lifetime opportunity to work in the Legislative Assembly of Ontario. It is an excellent way to learn more about how our province is governed." She enjoyed every moment of her time in the Chamber and was particularly fond of Question Period. Parnika had the opportunity to observe all the debates firsthand and meet with party leaders such as Hon. Dalton McGuinty (Liberal), MPP Tim Hudak (PC) and MPP Andrea Horwath (NDP). One of Parnika's most treasured experiences was the opportunity to meet with Dr. Helena Jaczek, MPP for Oak Ridges-Markham, over lunch at the dining room in Queen's Park. "It is always a pleasure to meet with bright, high-achieving students like Parnika," says Dr. Helena Jaczek, MPP, Oak Ridges - Markham. The Legislative Page Program provides a great opportunity for young people to experience how government works and I encourage students to apply." During her term as a Legislative Page, Parnika served as a messenger on the floor of the Legislative Chamber and learned firsthand about Ontario's parliamentary system of government. One of her first tasks was to study, memorize and learn the faces, names, seats and ridings of all the 107 Members of Provincial Parliament. Pages such as Parnika play an important role in the Ontario Legislature. During a typical day in the program, Pages arrive at Queen's Park at approximately 8:00 a.m., dressed in their uniforms and then prepare the Legislative Chamber for the morning's debates. As the day progresses, Pages are involved in a number of activities including delivering messages and water for the MPPs in the Chamber and meeting with key legislative players such as the party leaders and the Speaker of the House. Pages are taught the legislative process and receive various assignments to develop their language skills. Most pages also have the opportunity to participate in a mock debate. They are also tutored in mathematics, and on Fridays, Pages participate in special educational activities or field trips. Parnika has become more independent as she has learned to use public transit during her daily commute from Mount Joy Station in Markham to Queen's Park. "I believe I've improved my leadership and team working skills. I've also gained valuable experience for jobs in the future," says Parnika. She cherishes the amazing field trips with fellow pages and has made many great friendships. She strongly recommends the Page Program and encourages other students to apply so they can have an amazing experience outside of the standard elementary school curriculum.

#### JMPS CROSS COUNTRY

Cross Country is a sport which helps build endurance, perseverance, and character through long distance running. The distances vary for all grades, ranging from 1200 metres in 4th grade to about 2600 metres in 8th grade. Although it may seem like a challenge, the results will surely pay off. All 120 participants from McCrae ran a good race, and some of them even made it to Regionals.

This year, Cross Country was organized by Mr. Cheung and Mr. Doucet , with the help of a few students. The field was measured and the distances were calculated to help the runners practice. Training was held at recesses this year, and many of our runners put in a lot of time and effort to receive the best results.

The Area Meet was held at the Markham Fairgrounds on October 15, 2012. Unfortunately, the weather was poor, with a low temperature and gusting winds. Our athletes arrived early and did a walkthrough before the first races. Despite the poor conditions, our runners did very well.

The following runners received ribbons at the Area meet:

Ceo, from grade 6, once again achieved a place in the Regionals. He improved greatly from last year, going from 13th place to 9th. He also did better than last year at Regionals.

Evelyn from grade 7, ran her hardest, placing in 9th. She beat her previous Regionals score as well. Also from 7th grade, Thenura placed in 5th place, and amazed John McCrae.

Raveen and Ahad from grade 8 both made it into Regionals placing in 2nd and 7th place respectively. Raveen earned himself 13th place in Regionals. Both runners also made it to Regionals last year, and beat their previous scores.

#### Talking to Your Children about Decision Making

It happens every day, we make decisions from the moment we wake to the moment we full sologe, Recurse we are bombunded with decisions every minute of every day it is easy to take for granted the processes we use to make those decisions. #### The Importance of Involving Children in Decision Making?

Children need to see themselves as compenset, confident beings. If we are mable to see them in this way it is likely they will not develop the confidence needed to make decisions as well as we might like them to. Children need the opportunities to challenge themselves, test their ideas, make ministen and learn from them. Learning bow to make decisions is an important life skill but put like any order skill it indicates the manual contraction. As perents how we engage our children in this learning process can make the difference between a competent, confident individual and one who lacks the confidence and white we take reconsolistive for their ways accreas.

#### Helpful Hints

- 1. With your child identify the choice that needs to be made and the options that are available. As your child's skill in identifying options that are available.
- Week with your child to gather information about each choice.
- 3. Help your child identify and evaluate the positive and negative outcomes of each choice. Can the decision be oversed? What can be learned from the experience of others who have had to make similar decisions? Any dress options to be considered?
- 4. Let your child make the decision.
- 5. Evaluate the choice. Did things work our as expected? If not, what is the next step?

The following memoraic might be helpful as a reminder for children of a systematic approach to decision making:

- I Identify the problem/decision to be made
- D Describe the problem/decision
- E-Evaluate the pros/cons of the various options
- A- Act by making a choice
- L- Learn from the decision

The average person makes over 1000 decisions each day.

#### **EXTREME WEATHER CONDITIONS**

All students are expected to go out for every recess unless the principal or vice-principal decides that weather conditions are such that it would be detrimental for students to be outdoors. Students are to come to school dressed for outdoor play and prepared to be outdoors up to 40 minutes after lunch. Weather, including temperature, wind chill, sun/cloud conditions and wind velocity, is continuously monitored and in extreme weather conditions, recess breaks may be shortened or students least indexes.

During the cold months of winter, students should be dressed appropriately for weather conditions:

- appropriately for weather conditions:
  Bring a change of clothes, including socks, in case a change is needed due to wet and cold weather
- Dress in layers of loose-fitting clothing
- Cover and protect exposed skin from the harsh elments
- Boots, hats, scarves, snow pants and mitts or gloves will help make recess an enjoyable time

During the hot sunny weather, students should protect themselves by:

- Seeking shade or creating their own
- Wearing a hat and suitable clothing to cover their skin
- Putting on sunglasses (that provide UV protection) to protect their eyes
- Applying sunscreen 20 minutes before exposure to the sun.

Parents sometimes request their children be kept indoors during recess times because they are not feeling well. Students with illnesses serious enough to prevent them from participating in physical education, recesses or other outdoor activities should remain at home until their condition improves. This will also benefit the students concerned and prevent the spread of this illness to others.

If road conditions force the cancellation of bus services, the following stations will be informed as early as possible, and will broadcast pertinent information to the community.
