

Language Learning In Room 205

During the month of May the students in Mr. Sciberras' class were working on a heroes unit. We read information about Albert Einstein, The Buffalo Soldiers, Michael Jordan, and John Browning. We also learned the about what makes a person a hero, for example, helping other people, being brave, and persevering.

During the month our reading focussed on inferring. We began by first looking at pictures and inferred what is going on in the picture. Then we watched commercials and made inferences and then we read sentences and paragraphs. We always needed to support our ideas by looking at the actions in the commercial and in the picture and then using words that the author wrote when we looked at sentences or paragraphs.

One of the first writing activities we completed was ranking heroes based on a description and then we had to support our thinking. There were 9 hero descriptions given. Some of us chose "a person who, when walking his dog, saw a child drowning in a nearby river and risked his life to jump in the river to save the child" as the most heroic while others chose "a police officer, who works ever day to ensure that the city is a safe place for children and adults to live in".

We also studied different text features, such as captions, sub-titles, charts and graphs, the use of colour and borders. This was going to help us with our culminating task and help us to make choices with what we had to do.

With all of the skills we gained through our learning we then applied them to our culminating task which was to research a person we considered a hero. After the research was finished we had to come up with 10 questions based on the research. The 10 questions were to give the reader the most important information about the hero we researched. Our task was to create a trading card on the iPad using an app called Pic Collage. It was cool because we got to design the card using a lot of different colours and fonts.

This was a fun activity for us to do.
